The text of the abstract should be in one continuous paragraph. The body of the abstract, not including the title and the author details, should not exceed 2000 characters (not including spaces) in length. It should NOT contain sub-headings (Introduction, Aim, Results, etc). The abstract should be self-contained and should consist of text only. It should not contain any figures and tables should be included only if absolutely necessary. Abstracts should contain new information, either in the form of original research data or as a novel insight into an established issue. Abstracts reporting original research MUST include sufficient data to support any conclusion reached. It is not satisfactory to simply describe what was found (such as, “the treatment group increased their fitness more than the control group”) or to only include statistical results (such as, “associations were significant at $p < .05$ ”). References to the published literature should not be included except to describe methods used.

Papers should use 11-point Times New Roman font. The styles available are bold, italic and underlined. It is recommended that text in figures should not smaller than 10-point font size.

3.3 Tables and Figures

Figure captions and table headings should be sufficient to explain the figure or table without needing to refer to the text. Figures and tables not cited in the text should not be presented. The following is an example for Table 1.

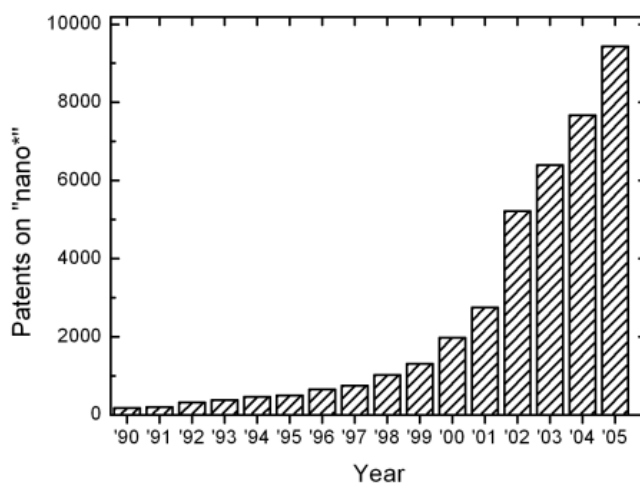


Figure 1: Number of patents on nanotechnology with time

Tables and figures should be placed close after their first reference in the text. All figures and tables should be numbered with Arabic numerals. Table headings should be centred above the tables. Figure captions should be centred below the figures as shown in Figure 1.
