Fair Drug Restrictions Act

AN ACT

To Reform Substance Laws

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as "The Fair Drug Restrictions Act" or "The FDR"

SECTION 2. FINDINGS.

- 1. Currently Marijuana is banned by the federal government and treated as a schedule one substance
- 2. Many nonviolent offenders can be subject to mandatory minimum prison sentences and other unfair sentences
- 3. Not enough funding goes to rehabilitation for drug use

SECTION 3. Reforming Drug Laws

- a. The sale and consumption of marijuana by persons over 21 for recreational purposes is hereby allowed in all 50 states and all us territories.
- b. Any institutions selling marijuana will be subject to the same advertising restrictions as Nicotine products.
- c. Any sale of any marijuana product will be subject to a 5% federal sales tax.
 - i. Half of federal funding gained by this tax will be given to the NIDA whereas the other half will be dedicated towards the national debt.
- d. Any people in federal prisons or jails exclusively for non-violent marijuana crimes should be released immediately and anyone with a federal conviction for non violent marijuana crimes should have their record for said crimes expunged.
- e. No federal non-violent drug offense should carry a mandatory minimum sentence.
- f. Any persons currently federally incarcerated for drug crimes who were convicted before this law passed are entitled to be resentenced.
- g. No first time offender charged exclusively for drug possession should receive a prison sentence.
