The Freedom Machine is a new cinema release of archive film celebrating the bicycle from Scottish film curator Jo Reid, using 120 years of footage and accompanied by a hypnotic soundtrack from sound designer Catherine Hawthorne. It features archival material provided by the National Library of Scotland Moving Image Archive, Media Archive for Central England, BFI, Screen Archive South East, East Anglican Film Archive, Yorkshire Film Archive, London Screen Archive, plus sequences from Charlotte Bill's *Life of the Bicycle*.

The Freedom Machine is supported by Glasgow Life UCI Cycling World Championships, Film Hub Scotland and Glasgow Film Festival.

Introduction

While Susan B Anthony famously said the bicycle "has done more to emancipate women than anything else in the world", *The Freedom Machine* interrogates what freedom looks like for women cyclists. From opening a shiny new bike on Christmas morning to the grind of a daily commute, bicycles hold a multitude of meanings and opportunities for women across the world. Using archival footage from across the UK's film archives, *The Freedom Machine* shows the ways women have used the bicycle to find freedom and independence on the road, the race track and beyond.

Some of these stories within *The Freedom Machine* include: Jean Cameron's crusade to add trousers to the female post officer's uniform; sixteen year old cyclist Louise Garbett's ambition to become world champion; Aimee Pfanner's daring ride across the Thames in a hydrocycle, and cycling clubs that allowed young women to explore the countryside. These

stories show how women throughout the years have approached cycling as a political statement, a practical necessity, and for pure pleasure.

The archival material featured in The Freedom Machine encompasses over 100 years of history, with the earliest dating from 1899. With footage from eight different archives, it shows that the bicycle has never meant just one thing to one person; its impact has shaped and informed many women's lives.

The Freedom Machine contains over nine minutes of material from the National Museum of Scotland's Moving Image Archives, depicting the everyday reality for female cyclists across Scotland during the 20th century. From students in St Andrews travelling to class, to factory workers arriving at Birrell Confectioners ready for a day of work and children enjoying a post-cycle sandwich and glass of milk, *The Freedom Machine* celebrates both the trailblazing cyclists who changed the world, and the ordinary everyday women whose lives were changed through cycling.

Accompanying the archival footage is a soundtrack by Glasgow-based sound designer and composer Cat Hawthorn, who brought a bike into the recording studio to capture the percussive sounds that permeate *The Freedom Machine's* soundscape.

Cyclists who feature in The Freedom Machine

- **Beryl Burton**, five time cycling world champion (Yorkshire)
- Jean Cameron (Glen Clova), postwoman who challenged and changed the dress code of the Royal Mail
- **Tessa Sanderson**, shown cycling in an interview with Barbara Slater following an injury, Olympic gold medalist
- Louise Garbett, First ever winner of the white jersey at the Tour de France Feminin of 1984
- Aimee Pfanner, who pedalled from Calais to Dover on a "hydro-cycle"
