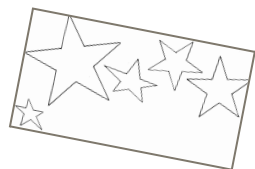

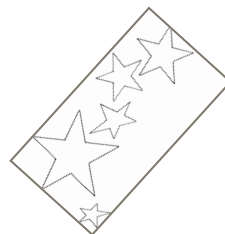
Forms are due at the end of each month, make ups are allowed until the end of the following month. High quality reports will receive a prize from the prize box.
