- Cultural Passport Assignment
  - Idea:
    - students choose from a menu of events
    - coordinate those event selections thematically based on the modules or weekly topics in your course
    - You could have students create a physical passport booklet (scrap book) to be stamped at events?
  - Sample Passport assignment prompts (revise to fit your course):
    - have them write a reflective piece or a <u>review</u>; perhaps the review can be posted to the Washington Square Quarterly alumni magazine? Or maybe the Spartan Daily might be interested in publishing 2-3 of the review?

  - Tool & assignments: <u>Hypothes.is</u> A social annotation tool that allows for simultaneous annotations by registered users (in the freestanding version) or all of your students (in the Canvas version)

  - Annotation using Hypothes.is integrated into Canvas @ SJSU

 Examples for events: annotate a musical score with the history of the piece or its composer; annotate a script in anticipation of a process lecture about a theatrical or filmed production; annotate any literary text with historical information and multi-media content.
