Using copyrighted works in the classroom

Creating digital resources to use in the classroom

When creating resources based on copyrighted works: Be respectful of the creations of others, following the guidelines indicated in the three online resources above. Resources containing copyrighted works should not be made freely available on the web or sold for profit.

When creating resources from scratch: You can share your own resources online as Open Educational Resources (or OERs), which are freely accessible and openly licensed resources used for teaching and learning. Most OERs are published with a Creative Commons license.

Creative Commons licensing

Creative Commons (or CC) licences are a type of copyright license that let creators (like you!) tell the world how they want their materials to be used:



(i) BY Credit given to original creator



(\$) NC Only non-commercial uses permitted



SA Adaptations shared under same terms



ND No derivatives/adaptations permitted

As an example, the CC license image in the footer of this document lets others remix, tweak, and build upon this document non-commercially, as long as they credit where it came from and license their new creations under the same terms.
