Students will be able to discuss how health-related choices made today can affect a person's physical, mental, emotional, and social growth and development in the future. 	Erin's Law & Teen Dating Violence (OPT-OUT Available for full unit)
What will students know and be able to do after learning?	 Erins's Law Learning Students will be able to identify situations that are considered sexual abuse and be equip to reduce their vulnerability. Students will learn safe strategies for reporting concerns.
	Teen Dating Violence Students will be able to apply refusal skills and negotiation skills to potentially harmful situations such as arguments, disagreements, etc. Students will be able to practice identifying specific scenarios and ways to remove themselves from abusive or harmful behavior from others. Students will be able to identify various unhealthy and healthy relationship traits. Students will be able to identify trusted adults and resources to contact if harmful situations arise. Students will also be able to understand the various types of abuse, including warning signs and dangerous situations associated with teen dating and relationships. Students will be able to describe the effects (e.g., economic losses, threats to personal safety) of conflict and violence upon the health of individuals, families, and communities. Students will be able to identify resources to access if needed in harmful situations. Reassessment Expectations	Students will complete an Encore Reassessment Slip, located in Canvas, when requesting to reassess on a topic.
