Welcome to 4th Grade!

Dear Incoming 4th Grade Students and Parents,



Congratulations to all students for successfully completing the 3rd grade! We look forward to having all of you in 4th grade!

We realize summer vacation is a time to embody Habit 7 by Sharpening the Saw and spending time with family. However, it's also important to make time for reading, writing, and math. Many children lose up to 2 months of learning over the summer and then have to scramble in August to catch-up while learning new 4th grade material. Let's try to avoid this learning loss by making time each week for the following activities to ensure minds stay sharp and are ready for 4th grade. We will hit the ground running the first week of school and we need *everyone* to be ready to go.

As educators, we recognize the greatest impact on student growth is when we are all together as a team: student, teacher, and parent. As teachers, we will do our best to engage and push each child forward on his/her educational path. As students, to recognize that effort and attitude make all the difference. Students have a responsibility to take ownership with their learning, classroom/school behavior, and maintain positive relationships with their peers. And as parents, to support their children through the good days and the tough days, reminding them that feelings of confusion and minor frustration are often signals to "keep pushing and keep learning!".

Read, Read!

Reading is the foundation for all the work we will do together in 4th grade. Schedule some quiet time several days a week to keep up with favorite characters. Attached is the **Summer Reading List**. Students are expected to **read a minimum of 2 books from this list and complete corresponding activities**. These completed assignments will be **collected** and **graded** on the first day of school.

All students are encouraged to read more than these 2 books! Students can read additional titles from the list or from favorite authors. Please visit the public library and choose books that are of high interest and just right. The librarians are always happy to match children with the perfect book. Journaling

Keep a record of summer adventures by writing in a journal. Also take time to write creative new stories to practice the skills you learned in 3rd grade.

Math

It is *imperative* for all fourth grade students to quickly solve multi-digit addition and subtraction problems as well as recall the basic facts of multiplication, and division from memory. This quick recall will allow students to solve more complex problems like multi-digit multiplication and division problems and problems involving fractions. Please take time this summer to work with flashcards, on the computer, or activity sheets. We recommend students keep in the habit of using math vocabulary terms like sum, difference, product and quotient, rather than "the answer." This goes a surprisingly long way in preparing students for higher level math.

Example Problems: $5 \times 6 = 36 \div 9 = 9 \times 6 = 64 \div 8 = 64$

Attached you will find a variety of math review sheets. The activities were selected based on the 3rd grade standards that need additional attention plus a few topics to extend understanding. This packet will be **collected and graded** on the first day of school.

IXL: Student accounts should be available throughout the summer. Please log on from time to time to work on Reading, Writing, and Math

The 4th Grade School Supply list is attached.

Finally, the most important thing is to enjoy time with your family and stay safe over the summer. We look forward to meeting you on **Monday, August 22nd.**

During the first few weeks of school, we will work with your child to support them in setting up an organizational system that will help them manage materials in 4th grade and beyond. Throughout the year we will further address executive functioning skills through lessons that teach: time management, study strategies, goal setting, and decision making strategies.

Please review the list below, help your child to organize, and send the materials with your child Monday, August 22nd.. On the back, there are a few directions for organizing materials <u>before</u> bringing them to school.


Clubhouse Mysteries Book 1: The Buried Bones Mystery by Sharon M. Draper




Ninth Ward by Jewell Parker Rhodes




Because of Mr. Terupt by Rob Buyea


Brooklyn Bridge by Lynn Curlee

What Color is My World? How African-American Inventors Changed the Way We Live by Kareem Abdul Jabar




"Who Was", "What Was" "Where Is" (Series)


This is a great nonfiction series with lots of options to read about famous people, places, and events. Choose one book from the series to read in its entirety.
