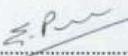

Executive summary

The first Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) certificate was awarded to Kathmandu University School of Arts (KUSOA) on 22 November 2018. As the first cycle of QAA is coming to an end, the school has expressed its interest to participate in the second cycle QAA and the Letter of Intent (LOI) has been submitted and accepted by the University Grants Commission (UGC) Nepal, the accreditation granting body. This Self Study Report (SSR) is prepared following the UGC's guidelines to submit a self assessment of the School before a peer review is carried out for granting the QAA certified status for the second cycle.

Maintaining the quality of education provided by educational institutions is crucial for the development of any society and nation. This Self Study Report analyzes the data and information available in our school to check if it meets the quality standards set by the University Grants Commission and finds out that the criteria and indicators to check the quality standards can be fulfilled. Based on a careful analysis of all data and information according to our institutional records, our school believes that it deserves the Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) certificate for the second cycle.

The first part of the report is divided into two sections. The first section provides information for the institutional profile, answering 29 questions. The second section provides benchmark-wise inputs for the institutional Self-Study Report. Eight criteria are assessed to evaluate the quality of the institution in all aspects of academic and administrative activities and procedures.

The second part of the report is a comprehensive analysis of the benchmark-wise indicators. The last semester of almost all programs (undergraduate and graduate) are dedicated either for an internship or for research (students have the freedom to choose). In addition to that, courses that teach about research (for example, Research Methodology) are compulsory in almost all programs.

Additionally, our staff run research projects and hire students as fellows to complete the research project. This helps both teachers/researchers as well as students in the teaching and research activities. PhD researchers are involved in teaching undergraduate and graduate courses during which they teach practical experiences of research to the students. This has created a nice interactive environment through an amalgamation of teaching and research activities in the classrooms.

Student Exchange programs: In order to provide our students and faculties with the knowledge and experiences from diverse backgrounds and cultural and geographic settings, as well as enhance their capacity to adapt and learn from multicultural environments, the School has been practicing student and faculty exchange programs with various national and international universities.

Videography and blogs: Students actively involve in videography and blogging. For example, undergraduate students of the BMS organize a blog ‘BMS Dispatch’ where they share their writings - <https://bmsdispatch.wordpress.com>. This helps them share their learnings and experiences with each other and with a wider audience and also help to get peer feedback.

Organization of seminars and workshops: One of the objectives behind encouraging students to organize workshops and seminars is to enhance their ‘personal relations’ skill. Organizing events makes students deal with the sponsors, potential participants, as well as resource persons. This helps students with communication, negotiation and argument skills.

c. Numerical skills ✓

Not all programs have (neither do they require) mathematical subjects but students have the freedom of taking courses from programs that include such subjects, such as economics (through the horizontal mobility opportunity). This provision helps students enhance their numerical skills, especially to those who are interested.

d. Use of information technology ✓

Internet Service in the school: Within the school premises, students, staff, faculties as well as visitors have free access to wired and wireless internet anytime.

Computers in the labs and library: All members of the school have access to the computers with internet connection in the library, in the computer lab and also in the media studio. Library resources are available from 8:00 to 19:00 six days a week and from 11:00 to 17:00 on Saturdays. Along with the written entrance examination, students are required to write their motivation, personal statements and also to attend an interview before getting admission to the School. With these practices, the School assesses students' needs and aptitudes for the particular course they are applying for. There are cases that a student applies for one course/program in the School but during the process of admission s/he knows more about other courses that are offered in the School and shifts to those courses.

One day per week is allocated for remedial class, counselling and whatever support students may be looking for. Latest Bachelor in Media Studies (BMS) and Masters in Media Studies (MMS) routine are attached as examples, and the days for independent study and extra classes are highlighted. **(See Annex - 9 > BMS_MMS_Routine updated_2024)**

We conduct internal assessments of the students throughout the semester. During the internal assessments, the faculty responsible for the course interacts and provides suggestions/guidance to students whose performance is relatively weak. And, students are free to consult the faculty member anytime (even by phone calls outside office hours).

Master's level students are given tutorial in the courses in which they are weak.

PhD students are required to enroll in courses in which they are judged to be weak by the concerned supervisor.

Similarly, we have introduced extra help sessions to students struggling with core economic courses in microeconomics and macroeconomics, and mathematical courses like statistics and calculus. These classes are mandatory for all students whose performance in course activities is below a certain threshold level and students have responded positively to this initiation by the department.

Keeping records of applicant information has helped to identify the demand of a particular course. For example, if the number of students applying for a particular course is constantly

high, the school tries to manage additional resources to increase the number of quotas for the course and vice versa. The admissions office keeps and analyzes such data to study the trend.

Keeping the records of students' grades has helped faculties to write recommendation letters for the students for higher studies or for job applications.

Information dissemination through the school website and other social media channels has increased the visibility of the school and hence the number of applicants who wish to study in the school has increased.

PART TWO

ANALYSIS OF THE DATA

2.1 Preamble

Kathmandu University School of Arts (KUSOA) is one of the seven schools of Kathmandu University which is a Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) certified higher education institution in the field of arts and social sciences. The first QAA certificate was awarded to KUSOA on 22 November 2018.

The school started by offering a Bachelor in Music program in November 1996. Since its inception in 1996, the school has continuously provided quality education to thousands of students who are working in various sectors after their graduation. Realizing the interests of students as well as the market needs, the school has expanded its academic outreach by starting new programs on a timely basis. Currently, under its four departments, KUSOA offers four-year bachelor (undergraduate) programs and two-year master (postgraduate) programs, on a semester basis, in the fields of humanities, music, fine arts and social sciences. The school started offering a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) program in 2007.

Similarly, the school also has two independent academic programs as well as five research centers that collaborate with national and international partners, and some of them run autonomously. By imparting high quality education to students with these academic programs and research centers, the school has emerged as a leading educational institution in the field of arts and social sciences in the country.

Library, media lab, art studio, and canteen facilities are available for students studying in the school. A large number of musical instruments are available in the music department, most of which are available for use in the class by learning students. The classrooms are air conditioned and are also well equipped with projectors, sound systems, smart boards and a good quality internet access to ensure quality education to all our students. Trainings, workshops and seminars are organized regularly according the calendar schedules and participation of students, faculties and staffs is encouraged also in such national and international events. This ensures the professional development and networking of our students, faculties and staffs not only within the school but also outside. National and international Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has been signed for enhancement of collaboration between the school and other educational and research institutions. As a result, many of our students, faculties and staffs go abroad for exchange studies and other related activities and return back to serve the country with experiences gained in different parts of the world. Similarly, many foreign students and professionals also come to our school; some as exchange students, some as full time students, and some as visiting scholars.

As the first cycle of QAA is coming to an end, the school has expressed its interest to participate in the second cycle of QAA and the Letter of Intent (LOI) has been submitted and accepted by the University Grants Commission. This Self Study Report (SSR) is prepared following the UGC's guidelines to submit a self assessment of the School before a peer review is carried out for granting the QAA certified status for the second cycle.

Since the resources get updated on a timely basis and institutional mechanisms and functionings change as and when required by the guiding policies of the University and the School, the latest Annual Report of the School available publicly on the School's website (<https://kusoa.edu.np/publication/annual-report-2022>) presents a clear picture of the latest status of the School.

Method of the SSR preparation:

An initial draft of the SSR is prepared by the **Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) Unit** of the School that looks after and coordinates the overall QAA process of the School. The report is presented and discussed in the **Head of the Departments and Program Coordinators (HoD Coordinators') meeting**, together with the dean of the School, that is being held every Monday. The report is reviewed thoroughly and a series of discussions are held. The same report is also presented in the meetings of the **Research, Development and Innovation (RDI)** committee, **Education Management Information System (EMIS)** unit, Admission Committee meetings and discussions are held.

The feedback received during these meetings are incorporated and the report is further presented to the **Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) meetings** that are held once a month. The **Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC)** of the School consists of representatives from the Student Welfare Council (SWC), from the School administration and from the IQAC of Kathmandu University. The IQAC provides detailed feedback and ideas for further improvement of the report. After a series of discussions and feedback from the IQAC, the SSR report is finalized which is then approved by the School's IQAC for submission.

On a technical side, the report is prepared using google docs. It is shared with all concerned faculties and staff and they can work together in this document online, from anywhere. Since our departments and programs are located in multiple places (Hattiban, Tripureshwor, Balkumari, and Dhulikhel), this is the most effective way to collaborate for the work. In this way, not only a particular person works for a particular section but we discuss multiple perspectives and update the report accordingly. A dedicated Research Assistant takes care of the formatting and technical issues of the report who also takes part in the meetings. The coordinator of the QAA unit coordinates the overall work and progress.

Strengths, Limitations, Opportunities, and Challenges (SLOC) Analysis:

Strengths:

- The mission, vision, goals and objectives are clearly defined
- Institutional policies are clearly formulated and updated regularly as and when needed
- A functional and well-maintained academic calendar
- Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) with international academic institutions
- A number of faculty and student exchange programs with international academic institutions
- Many academic programs are community focused and interdisciplinary
- Healthy and affordable canteen facility
- Competitive and qualified faculty members
- Regular updates to existing, and introduction of new, course syllabi
- Well equipped laboratories and media studio

- An automated library system
- Student evaluation throughout the semester (not only at the end)
- Small number of students in each class with close interaction with teachers
- Properly defined job responsibilities for faculties and staff
- Use of latest information technology (IT) tools in the classroom
- In-house employment offer to academically outstanding students after their graduation
- Publication of own academic journal and faculties' publications in national and international journals
- Scholarship opportunities to students
- Availability of bank counter within the School premises
- Regular meetings of the HoDs/Coordinators and Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC)

Limitations:

- Limited space for extracurricular outdoor activities
- Lack of transportation facilities to students
- Lack of hostel and accommodation facilities to students, and faculties and staff
- Limited funds for faculty development activities
- Difficulty in coordination between all units of the School since the programs/services are offered from multiple locations

Opportunities:

- More collaboration with international institutions for research activities
- Expanding job markets
- Collaboration with communities and industries
- More interdisciplinary programs (for example, Craft and Design program with School of Engineering, Yogic Science program with School of Medical Science)
- Attraction of more foreign students to exchange studies and short-term, non-credit courses

Challenges:

- Expansion of land/space and physical infrastructure
- Attraction of youth in foreign studies and their tendency to leave the country right after high school

2.2 Criterion Wise Analysis

CRITERION 1: POLICY & PROCEDURES

Objectives:

The purpose of ‘policy and procedures’ criterion is to show the existence of policies in the school that guide it towards achieving its mission, vision, goals, and objectives. Strategies and action plans are formulated based on the policies and a clear organizational structure exists to perform various academic and administrative activities. Activities performed follow a system-based approach of management of the school.

Current status:

Clearly defined vision, mission, goals and objectives exist which guide the operation of the school. Various policies are formulated based on which strategic plans and annual plans are prepared. A strategic plan (2019-2024) is in place to provide proper direction to school, and updates are made to align it with the strategies of the university - “Reimagining Kathmandu University, Strategic Plan 2022-2027”

The organizational structure of the school shows the various entities within the school which work together to achieve the envisioned goals and objectives. Job responsibilities of each unit are clearly mentioned in University Act and other related policy documents.

A clear organizational structure exists. The academic roles and administrative roles are clearly differentiated. Guidelines for internal quality assurance are prepared and implemented.

Performance appraisal forms are easily accessible. However, an online system of performance appraisal is also in place currently.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

On a technical side, not all policy documents are prepared in both English and Nepali language. Since all administrative staff of all levels may not be familiar with the English language, their understanding of the prevailing policies may be limited.

Policies are being amended on a timely basis to provide more autonomy to the school (from the university). The seventh amendment of “**Kathmandu Bishwabidyalaya, Aarthik Niyam 2049**” in Shrawan 04, 2074 has added Section 9 to provide more financial autonomy to the Schools, including the School of Arts.

Good practices:

Annual plans are prepared at the beginning of each fiscal year. Similarly, an academic calendar is also prepared and strictly followed. Departments prepare semester plans before a semester begins which has helped in the effective and smooth running of classes.

Critical appraisal:

All staff are not aware of the prevailing policies and a system to inform the introduction of new policies to all staff of all levels is lacking. However, the cooperation between all members of the school is laudable since they help each other in times of need.

Amendments to the policies are made on a timely basis to provide more autonomy to the schools from the university.

Online system of faculty/staff evaluation was introduced recently which has helped to make the evaluation process more systematic.

CRITERION 2: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**Objectives:**

The objective of this criterion is to show that the curriculum developed and followed for the programs offered in the school are strong, revised timely and include the latest developments in the field of the taught programs. This also aims to show the stakeholders' involvement in the process of curriculum development and revision and that the stakeholders' feedbacks are collected and taken into consideration during the process.

Current status:

The existing curriculum supports the academic goals and objectives of the school by offering courses on fine arts, music, communication and development studies which are integral components in the field of arts and humanities. New curricula are developed for the new interdisciplinary programs such as Yogic Science and Wellbeing, and Crafts and Design. Curriculum revisions are held regularly, often at the beginning of each semester. Students' feedback is collected after the completion of the course to check if students' expectations from the courses were met.

Elective options are made available to the students. Even horizontal mobility, i.e. the possibility to take courses up to a certain credit from another department, is possible which helps in all round personality development of the students.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

Opportunities for more students to go abroad for exchange studies would enhance their knowledge and learning, and would help them to gain international exposure. Convincing more funding agencies for their support for such exchanges would make the curriculum more appealing to students.

The school regularly makes efforts to find institutional and industrial partners who support students for such opportunities and signs Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) with them.

Good practices:

Some departments organize curriculum workshops at the beginning of each semester that allows the responsible faculty to make changes to the curriculum to include the latest developments in the field. Since it is not done individually but through a workshop, multiple perspectives are discussed and conclusions are drawn regarding what indeed needs to be changed/added and what may not be necessary. The course plans are provided to the students before starting the classes each semester. This practice helps students as well as faculties to keep track of the teaching learning progress during the semester.

International student exchange opportunities are offered that enhance their critical perspectives and understanding.

A Student Welfare Council (SWC) exists that is not politically biased but advocates and works for the welfare of the students themselves.

Non credit and short courses in fine arts, music make it possible for everyone to enroll to enhance their passion in those fields.

Provisions for in-semester evaluation of students are kept and updated accordingly, together with curricula updates.

Critical appraisal:

Overall, the curricular aspects are good. The process of updating and formulating new curricula is very nice and up to date. New, interdisciplinary courses are offered and curricula for such courses are formulated through participatory approach. More opportunities for student exchange programs with foreign universities should be provided; even funding support for such opportunities would make the school more appealing to prospective students.

CRITERION 3: TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION**Objectives:**

This criterion aims to show that the teaching learning process is effectively organized with well managed and well planned activities. The hiring of faculty members and the enrollment of students follow a transparent and systematic process.

Current status:

Merit based admissions for students and merit based recruitment of faculty members is in place. All such enrollments follow the policy of the university and the school. Academic plans are made at the beginning of each semester and course syllabi and evaluation criteria are provided and made clear to students before starting the course.

The workload guidelines for teaching faculties are clearly defined, and student evaluation is done throughout the semester using multiple criteria, such as attendance, participation, presentation, written assignments, mid term exams etc. Faculty members

are encouraged to take part in conferences, workshops and seminars and also to organize similar activities in the school.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

Given the nature of courses offered in the school, such as fine arts and music, a large number of visiting faculties are to be hired based on their specialization. Since it is not possible to keep a large number of full time faculty to cover a tiny portion of the course, some programs are taught by many visiting faculties. However, the school has maintained the quality of teaching learning in such programs by hiring only the well qualified visiting faculties. Also the resources for teaching learning are made available anytime based on the need.

Good practices:

A transparent, merit based admission takes place.

There is a prior understanding between the teaching faculty and students regarding course syllabus and students' evaluation criteria.

Multiple skills, such as presentation, classroom participation, project work, group assignments are used for student evaluation, not only a single exam at the end of the semester.

Faculties are encouraged and supported to organize and take part in academic conferences and workshops to further enhance their knowledge and skills.

A number of memorandum of understanding (MOUs) have been signed with many academic and industrial organizations to cooperate in academic endeavors.

Evaluation of the faculties by students after a course is completed is done.

Critical appraisal:

Merit based recruitment of staff and admission of students has helped in maintaining the quality of education provided by the school. The policies for such recruitment exists and is followed all the time. Increasing the proportion of full time faculties in relation to visiting faculties is a challenge because of the costs associated with it.

CRITERION 4: RESEARCH CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Objectives:

The aim of this criterion is to show that the school allocates resources in a reasonable amount for the promotion of research and innovation activities. The publication of research articles in national and international journals as well as the publication of its own academic journal and recruitment of PhD candidates are the basis for fulfilling the objectives of this criterion. Through these activities, the purpose is to develop a culture of research practices among faculties as well as students.

Current status:

A Research Development and Innovation (RDI) unit exists in the school with a dedicated person looking after such activities. Internal funds are provided to faculty members for research on a competitive basis. In the same way, Phd fellowships are offered also on a competitive basis. Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) are done with various industrial partners and academic institutions, many of which are international, for the exchange of ideas and for collaboration for research activities. All faculty members have published research papers in various journals. Nine externally funded research projects are running at the moment which also hire students for work based on their interests. The school also allocates 5% of its operating budget for research activities annually.

The school publishes its own academic journal called BODHI annually and publishes interdisciplinary research articles. The journal is open access and is indexed in NEPJOL and is freely accessible.

Students are assigned project works/ research work to enhance their practical understanding. As a part of their course, students in the final year of their undergraduate and graduate studies conduct a thesis. Extension activities, such as blood donation and tree plantations are organized by students with support from the school.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

Academic publications by faculty members are promoted, however, encouraging undergraduate and graduate students to publish their thesis work needs to be practiced.

A separate policy for RDI activities is drafted to make the funding and other research processes easier to follow.

Efforts are ongoing to make the academic journal, BODHI, to an international standard journal.

Good practices:

The university as well as the school provide seed money to its faculties to encourage research.

Students are required to conduct a thesis or to do an internship which helps them to get familiar with the professional work environment after their graduation.

The school encourages and also helps the students to take part in extension activities such as tree plantations, blood donations, cleaning campaigns, etc.

Critical appraisal:

All faculty members are involved in research activity in one way or the other. However, their research activities can be increased. Since the school has already been publishing its interdisciplinary, academic journal, it should not miss its chance to make it an internationally recognized journal. The RDI policy needs to be revised in a timely manner and to make the process of seeking external funds easier. The internal funds to support faculties and PhD students should be increased which is, however, a challenging task.

CRITERION 5: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Objectives:

The purpose of this criterion is to show that the school has the required infrastructure and resources to keep the teaching learning process comfortable and effective, and also to indicate plans for the expansion and improvement of existing resources, especially the physical infrastructures.

Current status:

The main administrative and academic functions of the school are held from Hattiban in Lalitpur. However, the school has its infrastructure in various locations; in Balkumari, Lalitpur, in Dhulikhel, Kavre, in Gyaneshwor and Tripureshwor, Kathmandu, and in Haldibari, Jhapa. Academic programs are offered in Hattiban, Balkumari and Tripureshwor.

Well maintained library, computer lab, art studio and media studio are available for students for their learning process. Inter-departmental and inter-school library services are available.

Internet facilities are easily available. Eduroam service is available for any visitors from participating institutions around the world. A dedicated IT person works to keep the ICT infrastructure/tools working properly.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

A new building, with generous support from the University Grants Commission (UGC) Nepal is made to fulfill the space constraints. However, infrastructure and space for outdoor activities are still not enough.

Funds to renovate the existing infrastructures in Tripurasundari and in Gyaneshwor are lacking. The Head of the Music Department is working hard to generate funds and to renovate the infrastructure in Tripurasundari, Tripureshwor.

Good practices:

Infrastructure for teaching learning is often shared with the School of Education and School of Management which has helped in optimum utilization of the available resources.

Critical appraisal:

The school has been expanding the physical infrastructure and other required resources for teaching and learning process based on the felt need as well as the availability of funds. Library and labs are updated regularly.

More open space for outdoor, physical activities of students is needed.

Infrastructure for academic activities needs to be expanded given the growing demand of programs, often interdisciplinary, and the advancement of technology. For example, a

Geographic Information System (GIS) lab with sophisticated softwares and high capacity computers for the department of development studies is needed. Similarly, funds for renovation of infrastructures in Tripurasundari and Gyaneshwor are needed.

Accommodation and hostel facilities for faculty, staff and students would further make it easier for them to focus on academic activities.

CRITERION 6: STUDENT SUPPORT AND GUIDANCE

Objectives:

This criterion aims to show that enough guidance and support services are provided to the students by the school. These services are provided in the form of information since the beginning of the admission of students, support for visa services for international students to the financial support/scholarships during their studies to tracking of the graduates through tracer studies after their graduation from the school.

Current status:

Program brochures are updated and published annually to disseminate information regarding the admission process and criteria to the prospective students. These are also published publicly on the school website. Support services and policies regarding admission, tuition fees, visa etc are published on the website for international students. Tuition fees for semester toppers are waived for each program, and other forms of scholarships - UGC formula funding scholarships, Lalitpur Metropolitan scholarships - are offered to deserving students. Guidance for students is provided for internship seeking, for job seeking after graduation by all faculties.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

A separate employment cell, or placement officer is yet to be managed. However, given that our school admits only a limited number of students based on the quota approved by the academic council, and our school has active MoUs with many academic and industrial partners, our faculties help the students for placement or for higher studies all the time. The faculty:student ratio is maintained in such a way that our faculties are able to provide enough placement and career advice and support services to our students.

Alumni association exists; however, its activities need to be increased.

Space for outdoor activities within the Hattiban premises, where the main administrative and academic functions are operated from, is limited and hence the school encourages and supports students to take part in activities organized by the university in Dhulikhel and also by other organizations/associations elsewhere.

Good practices:

Program brochures are updated and published annually so that the information regarding admission process and criteria are publicly available to prospective students. Support

services related to the visa application are provided to international students who require a visa to study in Nepal.

Faculty members, who are familiar with the students since the beginning, provide counseling and support services for job placements and recommendations for higher studies, and hence this practice has become more effective than establishing a separate placement cell and/or officer.

Only a fixed number of students are admitted based on merit and hence the quality of education provided by our school has been well maintained.

Critical appraisal:

Since students are admitted on a quota basis and guidance can be sufficiently provided by the teaching faculties, a separate unit for helping students for job placement may not have been felt yet. Such a unit may be established based on the felt need in the future.

The Alumni association should be encouraged to be more active and used to promote/increase the visibility of the school.

Tracer studies need to be conducted more frequently, preferably on an annual basis.

CRITERION 7: INFORMATION SYSTEM

Objectives:

This criterion aims to justify the existence of a system that keeps all the records of academic data and carries out the analyses. The summaries of such analyses are displayed publicly and the mechanism for stakeholder feedback exists.

Current status:

An Education Management Information System (EMIS) unit exists in the school that collaborates with all other entities of the school such as library, examination center, admissions office, etc. with aims to keep a centralized system for all data storage and management. Data and information that are not confidential are published publicly on the websites and also through publications such as annual reports, EIS reports, audit reports etc. Feedbacks can be provided by anyone through the websites, social media, email, phone, or orally by visiting the school.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

Since various sections of the school are entitled to perform specific tasks, for example, admissions office for the overall admission process, examination center for performing examination and keeping of such records, finance division to keep financial information, library for keeping library records, maintaining a single EMIS unit to keep every type of data has been challenging. However, the EMIS unit formed in the school has been trying to figure out the ways to handle the situation and how to proceed forward.

Good practices:

The website of the school is well maintained and almost all public information is being disseminated through the website.

Social media channels are updated regularly and the feedback is being collected from there.

Critical appraisal:

Establishing an Education Management Information System (EMIS) is not difficult technically, but training and encouragement to all entities to use the system may be challenging. The roles and responsibilities of other existing units, for example the admissions office, examination center may need to be revised when a comprehensive EMIS is made functional.

CRITERION 8: PUBLIC INFORMATION**Objectives:**

The objective of this criterion is to justify that the public information regarding the school is published openly, and monitoring and evaluation of the activities is done on a regular basis.

Current status:

All public information that is supposed to be published openly is made available through various means. Annual reports, audit reports are updated on the website. Educational information, except confidential information, are available on the Education Information System (EIS) unit of the university. News bulletins, academic journals publish relevant information. Chatbots on the website are used to provide information to whoever is interested. Monitoring and evaluation directorate of the university carries out the M and E of such activities.

Gap analysis and efforts to fulfill the gaps:

Instead of a separate public information cell, related information is published and made available by the respective sections/units of the school. Some publications are yet to be made regular.

Good practices:

The school website is well maintained and relevant information is regularly updated there for public visibility.

The process to provide feedback by stakeholders is easy, i.e. through social media, or email or telephone.

A Monitoring and Evaluation Directorate works to evaluate the activities performed by the school.

Critical appraisal:

Public information cell as a separate section is yet to be established but the information is being published by the responsible units/sections of the school that are disclosed through the website. The public disclosure using this process has worked well till date. Feedbacks are collected using feedback forms and chatbots in the website, through social media and email communication.

2.3 Summary of the SSR

This Self Study Report (SSR) is prepared in the format provided by the University Grants Commission and based on the data and information according to the institutional records kept by the Kathmandu University School of Arts (KUSOA).

The School of Arts started in 1996 AD by offering a bachelor level program in music. Since then, it has expanded its educational services in many areas of arts and humanities. To cater to the growing demand of quality education within the country and to pursue efforts to prevent the mass exodus of students towards western countries in search of quality education, the school decided to follow and get a status of quality assured institution by the University Grants Commission of the government of Nepal, for the first time in 2018. By keeping up with quality it provided since its commencement, and by pursuing efforts to enhance it further, the school has excelled so far, thanks to the support provided by all concerned stakeholders and our well wishers. Aiming to keep the status of a Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QAA) Certified institution, this SSR is prepared and submitted to the UGC for its review.

The school has well defined policies and action plans that aim to work towards achieving its vision, mission, goals and objectives set while establishing the institution. The curricula are revised and updated in a timely manner, providing knowledge on the latest developments. A conducive teaching learning environment exists in the institution and student admission and faculty recruitment follow a merit based approach. Research activities are encouraging and flourishing. Physical infrastructures are expanded based on need. However, more funds for expansion and renovation seem to be crucial. Student support is provided by all faculty and staff members of the school whenever requested by students. Educational data and information storage and management systems exist which may need to be further enhanced in days to come. Public information is disseminated through various means/media and stakeholders' feedback is collected.

The process of preparing the SSR has been a great learning experience. Critical reflection of the institution's own strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges has made it aware of those things and has aided in making plans for the future.
