Math 7 Syllabus

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Course Description: The standards for middle school continue the work started in elementary grades in these four strands: Data, Probability, and Statistical Reasoning (DPSR); Measurement, Geometry, and Spatial Reasoning (MGSR); Numerical Reasoning (NR); and Patterns, Algebra, and Functional Reasoning (PAFR). Woven throughout all four strands are concepts building on students' understanding with problem solving to provide context to the problems they are solving, which will foster critical thinking and collaboration skills.
