

# Guide to the House System at LOINS

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## Introduction

## Structure of the House System

### 1. House Composition

#### A) House Students:

- **Student House Leaders**
  - House Captain: Senior student elected or appointed to lead the house, motivate members, and organize activities.
  - Vice Captain: Assists the House Captain and steps in when needed.
  - Prefects: Students with specific roles, including event organization, maintaining discipline, and mentoring younger students.
- **Distribution Criteria of Students:**
  - **Age Integration:** Houses include students from various year groups to help younger students learn from older peers and vice versa. This integration encourages mentorship and a collaborative learning environment.
  - **Sibling Inclusion:** Siblings are placed in the same house to support shared values and strengthen family bonds within the school community. This approach ensures that siblings can support each other and contribute to a cohesive house environment.

#### B) House Staff

Each house typically has a dedicated team, including a house leader (usually a staff member) and house mentors. These staff members guide and support the students in their house activities.

- **House Leader:** A staff member responsible for overseeing the house, supporting the captain and prefects.
- **Assistant House Leader:** A staff member assisting the House Leader in managing house activities.

#### C) Example of House Structure

- House Captain: 1 student
- Vice Captain: 1 student
- Prefects: 3 students ( from elementary)
- House Leader: 1 staff member
- Assistant House Leader: 1 staff member

## 2. House Activities

- **Academic Competitions:** Houses may compete in academic challenges and subject-specific contests to encourage learning and intellectual growth.
- **Sports Events:** Houses participate in various sports and physical activities promoting teamwork.
- **Culture, Skills, and Talents:** Creative competitions are often organized, allowing students to showcase and appreciate their talents and skills. At LOINS, we will be using this field for our first competition where students will design their own house emblem.
- **Community Service:** Houses may engage in community service projects, helping students understand the importance of giving back and working together for a common cause.
- **National and Social Events:** events such as national days and themed days, help build camaraderie, provide opportunities for informal interaction, and strengthen the sense of belonging.

## House Names and Themes

Houses are often named after notable figures, historical events, or thematic elements. They usually have distinct colors and symbols that contribute to house identity and pride. Common themes include courage, wisdom, strength, and loyalty.

At LOINS, our houses are named and themed to reflect key values and elements of nature, creating distinct identities and fostering a sense of pride.

  - Announcement of 2 students in each class who collected the highest number of points to their houses.
  - Announcement of the house that earned the highest number of points per division.
