Activities and Skills for Practicing at Home

Basic Word Recognition and Phonics Skills

Use combined knowledge of all letter-sound correspondences, syllable
patterns (when two consonants come between two vowels in a word, divide
syllables between the consonants, like bor-der), and morphology (roots,
prefixes, and suffixes) to read unfamiliar words with multiple syllables.

Developing Understanding of What is Read

- Refer to details and examples in a text explaining what is directly stated in the text and making inferences.
- Determine a theme of a story, drama, or poem and summarize the text.
- Describe in depth a character, setting, or event in a text.
- Compare and contrast the points of view from which different stories are narrated.
- Compare and contrast texts that have similar themes and topics, including stories, myths, and traditional literature from different cultures.
- Determine the main idea of a text and explain how key details support the idea. Summarize the text.
- Describe the overall structure (sequence, cause/effect, problem/solution) of a text or part of a text.
- Explain how an author uses reasons and evidence to support particular points in a text.
- Combine information from two texts, on the same topic, in order to write about the subject.
