All Days: Resident Artists 2019

Build Peace 2019 will host two resident artists, both offering opportunities for participants to engage in art-making at the conference venues. On Day 1 & 3, the artists will be at the University of San Diego Rotunda. On Day 2, the artists will be at Espacio Migrante in Tijuana.

As an award-winning architecturally-trained designer, **Jayna Zweiman** creates large-scale participatory projects that amplify the voices of all who take part. She is Co-creator and Co-founder of <u>Pussyhat Project</u> and Creator / Founder of <u>Welcome Blanket</u>. Her work has been exhibited and acquired by museums around the world including: Victoria & Albert, The Smart Museum of Art, MODA, The Design Museum, Fuller Craft, The National Museum of Norway, The Smithsonian, among others. At Build Peace, we will work together on group Welcome Blankets, reimagining the length of the US-Mexico border as 2000 miles of yarn to make individual welcome blankets for new refugees and other immigrants. Diana Weymar has been an artist-in-residence at Build Peace for the past five years. Her international public projects include *Interwoven Stories* and *Tiny Pricks Project*. 15:30-18:00 Workshops (digital borders)

Peace Journalism and Fighting Fake News

Organizer: HasNa, Inc.; Location: Classroom 217A

This workshop seeks to develop an understanding of some of our basic responsibilities as both producers and consumers of digital information. This skill-building workshop will



have both theoretical and practical components. The first half of the workshop will focus on some basic principles of peace journalism and explore what we can do as citizen journalists to produce and disseminate conflict-sensitive information so as to close digital divides and reduce polarization. In the second part of the workshop, we will differentiate between misinformation and disinformation, and explore some basic tools that everyone can use to fight fake news that can often be a driver of conflict. This workshop is open not only to conflict resolution scholars and practitioners but to anyone who is an internet user and is interested in bridging digital divides.

Breaking Down Digital Borders: Constructing Alternative Narratives to Combat Hate

Organizer: FHI 360 / Integrity; Location: Room E

This workshop will be focused on breaking down digital borders by identifying the hateful language and constructing alternative narratives that can positively influence perceptions and behaviors. Online communication often influences offline behaviors, and hate speech, in particular, has in many countries fueled violence between and against particular groups. In contrast with direct counter-messaging which seeks to expose hate speech or other language and explicitly undermine it, alternative messaging can provide a strategic and effective means to transform these behaviors and reduce hatred or fear of certain groups.

Deconstructing Dominant Media Narratives: The Migrant Caravan and MediaCloud

Organizer: Columbia University; Location: Room F

This workshop will inform participants about how the dominant narratives surrounding the migrant caravan that moved from Central America to the U.S. were constructed. It will provide a hands-on introduction into the use of a publicly available media tool (MediaCloud) that enables students and activists to analyze the frames and hidden biases of media coverage.

<u>Feeding the Trolls: How Counterspeakers Resist Hatred Online and What Internet Platforms Should Do To Help</u>

Organizer: Dangerous Speech Project; Location: Room G

What do you wish was different about online platforms like Twitter, Facebook, and YouTube? The Dangerous Speech Project has conducted interviews with dozens of people who respond to hatred online – some in groups as large as 75,000 – to understand how and why they work, how building community makes these efforts sustainable, and what platforms could do to make their work more effective. In this workshop, you'll learn about the preliminary findings of this research, and we'll work together to develop more ideas that will be compiled into a policy brief about ways internet platforms can support peacebuilders, activists, and counter speakers.

Peace Design: Creative Empathy and Our InTangible Human Needs

The Peace Design process is innovating how and who designs interventions in conflict contexts with design principles. Through Peace Design frontline leaders and organizations are activated and resourced to shift power and co-design peace in their



communities. At the core of Peace Design is the practice of Creative Empathy: a trauma informed experiential methodology that channels intangible human needs to create tangible and exponential impact that builds peace. This participatory and experiential workshop will introduce participants to the Peace Design process with a special focus on how to design spaces and build culture based on creative empathy. The workshop will include case studies from Activate Labs work along the border and in conflict zones. Participants will leave with a clear understanding of the ten core intangible human needs and how to channel them in design.

Day 2: Friday, November 15 (Tijuana, Mexico)

Day 2 will take place at the Escuela Libre de Arquitectura in Tijuana, Mexico, and will focus on the sub-theme of physical borders.

7:45-10:00 Border crossing & coffee / tea break

We will be crossing the border on foot at San Ysidro PedWest on Friday, November 15th 2019. **Participants should plan to make their own way to the border crossing at Pedwest (not PedEast) by 7:45 am.** Please meet in front of the Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf Coffee Shop, which is directly across the street from the crossing (the exact address is 4463 Camino de Plaza. San Diego 92173). We will leave promptly by 8:15 so we can all cross in time for morning sessions. **Participants are responsible for ensuring they have a visa to enter Mexico where required.**

The border crossing is located in San Diego, so it is not difficult to get there on your own. Here are some transport options:

- You can take the <u>San Diego Trolley</u> to which will cost around \$2.50. The Trolley drops you off in PedEast about 15 min walk from PedWest using the pedestrian bridge that connects PedWest to the eastern side of San Ysidro you can reach Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf. Here is a route.
- You can use a ridesharing or taxi service, which will cost approximately \$30 from central San Diego.
- If you have a car, you can drive and park at the border. Take I5 South to I805 south, exit at Camino de la Plaza and make an immediate right into the Border Parking Station 4570 Camino De La Plaza, San Ysidro, CA 92173. Here is a route. Parking costs about \$30 for Fridays. From the parking, you can cross Camino de La Plaza and head over to Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf shop. Drive time from USD on a Friday morning is about 25 min to 1 hour depending on traffic.



■ DO NOT PLAN TO DRIVE IN WITH A PERSONAL CAR ACROSS THE BORDER: you have to acquire car insurance at around \$30 a day and the return time by vehicle is between 2-4 hours on a Friday evening.

Stories that connect Latin America: the case of Radio Ambulante

One of the objectives of Radio Ambulante is to connect Latin America through stories. With seven years and more than 135 episodes published, this narrative journalism podcast in Spanish has become a reference and has helped to form a community of participatory and diverse listeners throughout the continent.

There are over 57 million Latinos in the US, making them one of the nation's fastest-growing ethnic groups, and yet they remain under-represented in the media. Media coverage often follows simplistic storylines, narrowly focused on immigration. Latinos have become a focal point of this debate, routinely described with dangerous, dehumanizing rhetoric by some of the country's most powerful politicians. Radio Ambulante's work, which embraces nuance and complexity, stands in sharp contrast to those incendiary narratives. Today, stories that humanize Latinos and Latin Americans, that illuminate the cultural connections across borders, are more critical than ever.

This keynote will explore lessons learned from the case of Radio Ambulante. What are the elements of a good audio chronicle? How can nonfiction narratives be used to make the cultural borders of Spanish-speaking countries fluent? What can they learn from the Radio Ambulante case who uses the stories to connect communities and resolve conflicts?

Dialogue, Healing & Transformation

Organizer: Repatriate Our Patriots; Location: Taller A

Being a truth-teller is a tricky thing, because what is truth if not just a projection of our own limited lens of what is. We believe that we can better focus on truth-telling by recognizing and naming untruth when we see it, especially around false narratives around the topic of borders and deportation. When we are willing to tell our own truth it frees others to tell theirs, and what we are left with is a collective of ever-widening opening windows of human existence. The wider the window opens, the better the chances are of creating lasting, sustainable change where all voices around the table are heard and have power. At this workshop, you will hear the stories of U.S. Veterans who have been deported as they sit alongside members of their families and friends, sharing how deportation and the physical border wall has changed their lives. As you listen, keep track of the places you notice defensiveness or discomfort; you will have an opportunity to share those feelings. As a participant, we hope that this experience becomes a catalyst for more creative participation in all the places your heart leads you. This is an interactive workshop where you will be encouraged to seek and inhabit the most inclusiveness of human spaces. All participants will leave with the first issue of a Deported Veterans 'zine, where they share stories, poems, recipes, and art.

Borderline: a space of trust

Organizer: University of San Diego & Build Up; Location: Taller C

A community of scholars, activists, educators and random others have been working for over a year to understand *trust* – *between engineers and the vulnerable communities with which they work*. We wish to continue and broaden this conversation and consider trust with those who are working with communities *across borders*. We will juxtapose the notion of a simple border with the more complex concept of a *borderline*. Building trust across a border is complex and requires us to understand all of the dimensions we have



uncovered and have yet to discover. Building trust with those who are considered borderliners by the dominant power (social, political, economic or technological), shows us that our dimensions are too linear. We need a third dimension to create not a line but a space of trust – a critical dimension - pushing us to question our own assumptions. In this workshop we will develop our understanding of this space of trust, whilst considering also the necessary prerequisites underlying the right to build trust with vulnerable communities in the first place. We will share our dimensions of variation emerging thus far, use these to begin to critically question our own assumptions, interrogate our right to build trust and the necessary vulnerabilities that arise, and end with a call to action.

Geospatial Tools for Peace

Bringing people together from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe without a single mile travelled Organizer: Peace Direct; Location: Taller F

Online tools and digital innovation bring new opportunities for collaboration, learning, and exchange where physical borders, resource constraints and travel limitations separate people and communities and can keep them apart. But we know they also come with particular challenges. Peace Direct has developed a new online tool – Platform4Dialogue (www.platform4dialogue.org) – that facilitates collaboration, learning and exchange in a way that doesn't require people to occupy the same space and time. This workshop invites participants to learn from Peace Direct's experience, share their own experiences, and explore the opportunities and challenges of digital solutions.

Bridging physical and social borders through electronic voting in conflict regions

This workshop is being hosted remotely as a part of the Build Peace 2019 Online Hub. This workshop seeks to develop an understanding of how citizens' democratic participation in the negotiation of peace agreements could be improved. Both international armed cross-border conflicts (= 'traditional' wars) and internal armed conflicts (= civil wars and other new forms of political violence carried out either by state or non-state actors) pose a huge risk to human life and cause a wide array of negative



side effects. Not only the people living in the conflict zone, but also citizens of bordering regions, refugees or citizens of host countries are suffering under the social, political and economic burden of violence. The workshop explores the potential of electronic surveying and voting to overcome physical and social borders that often prevent citizens with a stake in the conflict to voice their worries and wishes for a peaceful coexistence of people, communities and nations.

We will be providing transport to the evening gathering location (Bi-national Friendship Park). Please meet outside of Espacio Migrante at 4pm to board a bus. We will also be providing buses from our evening gathering near El Faro adjacent to the Bi-national Friendship Park at 8pm. Buses will go to Chaparral, right outside the border crossing we

We Need a New Breed, Leaders, Stand Up, Organize: The Theology of Prince for Creative Resistance

The title of this talk is taken from Prince's 1981 song, "Sexuality" on his *Controversy* album. Prince's music and life promoted unity with God, freedom from corporate exploitation, and social transformation. Can understanding Prince's theologically-coded lyrics inspire listeners of various worldview perspectives to actually transform, lead, and organize?

Pamela Ayo Yetunde, J.D., Th.D., is a pastoral counselor and Assistant Professor, Pastoral Care and Counseling and Director, Interreligious Chaplaincy, United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. Today, the U.S.-Mexico Border is another institutionalized atrocity perpetuating cultural norms of violence, racism, & class separation. If "the real John Brown would please stand up" today, how might (s)he leverage Gene Sharp's nonviolent strategies for social change, together with the media potentials of Instagram, & make a positive contribution to the cause for border justice?
