1/7	Tenses	Narratives are written in the past tense as the story teller is retelling events real or imagined that have already happened.  However when there is dialogue (someone talking) we use present tense. This has the effect of making the reader feel more 'there' with the characters.  In the following excerpts from well known books: Highlight present tense verbs in green. Highlight past tense verbs in blue.  From 'A Wrinkle in Time'  Calvin licked his lips. "Where are we going?" "Up." Charles continued his lecture. "On Camazotz we are all happy because we are all alike. Differences create problems. You know that, don't you, dear sister?" From Wuthering Heights, "Now he is here," I exclaimed. "For Heaven's sake, hurry down! Do be quick; and stay among the trees till he is fairly in." From The Giraffe, Pally and Me, Roald Dahl I said, 'Who is your friend in the next window?' 'She is the Giraffe!' the Pelican answered. 'Is she not wonderful?
