General Expectations

- · Grades are based upon the demonstration of proficiency on units associated with a standard given during each formative or summative assessment. Formative grades in addition to summative unit assessments will be used to holistically determine your grade.
- **Summative:** Summative measures of achievement are taken when unit mastery is expected. (i.e., unit quizzes, culmination of a project, embedded assessments, etc.)
- **Formative:** Formative assessments measure the scaffolding skills and/or content embedded in the unit. Formative assessments are taken frequently, after a student has practiced a skill or become familiar with content. Examples of formative assessments include but are not limited to exit tickets, paragraphs, oral check for understanding, warm-ups, stages in a large project, etc.
- · Grades are based on achievement of Content Standards and Grade Level Expectations.



Class Expectations

Missing or incomplete assignments/assessments for this course: Superintendent Policies <u>6280 Homework</u> and <u>6281 Make-Up Work</u>, will be followed for this course.

Instructional Methods: A variety of instructional techniques will be used in order to provide students with many opportunities to learn and practice the language. These include: speaking practice, partner work, individual assignments, tests, quizzes, listening activities, writing activities, reading assignments, video activities, group projects, and impromptu and formal presentations.

Student Expectations and Responsibilities: Success in a foreign language requires **daily** practice! Students are expected to be in class every day, to participate in language activities and to turn in completed work on time. In addition to constructive classroom participation, it is an expectation of this class that each student studies independently on a daily basis to reinforce vocabulary and that day's lesson. This expectation of independent study carries over to the mid-term and final exams: cumulative final exams are part of the class and students are expected to study outside of class to prepare themselves.

Electronic Devices: (cell phones, iPods, etc.): <u>ALL cell phones</u> are to be <u>silenced</u> during the <u>entire class period</u> and placed in an assigned number pocket on the wall. If a student is using a cell phone during the class period or it makes a sound (beeps, rings, plays music, etc.), it will be taken away by the teacher. Student computers must only be used when instructed to do so. In addition, all backpacks and purses will be placed on the floor next to the student's desk or at the front of the classroom during the class period. Multiple violations of this policy will result in office referrals.

Testing Policy	Students will be assessed according to the Colorado World Language Academic Standards. Students will be evaluated upon 1) performance in all areas of communication, 2) knowledge and application of the target culture, and 3) vocabulary & grammar concepts. Students can expect ongoing assessments including at the end of each unit as well as at the midterm and year-end. These assessments allow students multiple opportunities to show their learning. Students must complete assignments and assessments in the time provided by the teacher.	
Retake Policy	If a student is unsatisfied with his / her grade on an end of unit test, a retake will be allowed under the following conditions: Student completes at least 1 remediation activity that is selected by the teacher (come in for extra help; additional practice pages; conjuguemos.com activities, etc.) Student re-takes the assessment outside of class time. Options include Academic Support, common off hour between teacher / student, or after school when arranged with the teacher.	
	 All retakes must be COMPLETED within 2 weeks of the date that the test was entered in Infinite Campus. The retake grade will be the final grade to be entered into Infinite Campus, replacing the original grade, whether higher or lower. 	
Assignments	Students will be informed as to the due dates for assignments, whether it is homework, a quiz/test, or a project.	



Late work Policy	An assignment is considered late if it is turned in after the teacher requests it. Late work will not be accepted.
Absence Policy	Students are expected to make up any work missed because of any absence. Students are responsible to check for missed work from Schoology. The student will have the number of days absent plus one additional day to make up missed work for an absence. However, long-term assignments (one week or more from the assignment date to the due date) are due on the stated due date, regardless of the absence and are not accorded extra days upon return to school. Long-term illnesses will be dealt with on an individual basis.
