

"A Word From The Lord"

Discussion Guide: Inspired By Pastor Willie Lightfoot Sr.

Summary

In this sermon titled A Word from the Lord, Pastor Lightfoot emphasizes that God's word is the most stable and powerful force available to believers, especially in uncertain and turbulent times. Drawing from Isaiah 55:11, Hebrews 11:1, and Psalms 119:105, the message reminds the congregation that God's word provides direction, identity, and promise. Just as biblical figures like Moses, Jeremiah, Mary, and Paul carried and trusted the word God gave them, believers today are called to do the same, regardless of how circumstances may look or feel. The sermon also stresses that faith comes by hearing the word of God (Romans 10:17), and that believers must not only hear the word but actively live it out as doers. God's word serves as a lamp to our feet and a light to our path, guiding us through dark and difficult seasons. The pastor encourages the congregation that God is still invested in each person's story, that His word will not return void, and that the best is yet to come for those who trust and stand on what God has spoken over their lives.

Intro Prayer

Heavenly Father, we come before You with grateful hearts, thankful for the opportunity to gather and seek Your face together. Lord, as we open Your word and discuss what You have spoken, we ask that You quiet every distraction and open our hearts to receive exactly what You want us to hear today. Let this not be about our own opinions or preferences, but about what You are saying to each of us personally. Speak clearly, Lord, and give us the courage to trust and obey Your word. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Ice Breaker

What is one piece of advice or encouragement someone gave you that has stuck with you for a long time, and why did it mean so much to you?

Questions

- Pastor Lightfoot described living in 'uncertain times' with shifting jobs, family pressures, and community violence. How have you personally experienced uncertainty recently, and how has your faith helped you navigate it?
- Isaiah 55:11 says God's word will not return void but will accomplish what He pleases. Can you share a time when you held onto a promise from God and eventually saw it come to pass?
- The sermon highlighted Moses, Jeremiah, Mary, and Paul as people who carried a word from God even when it was difficult. Which of these examples resonates most with you, and why?
- Pastor Lightfoot said a word from the Lord provides direction, identity, and promise. Which of these three do you feel you need most in your life right now, and what scripture speaks to that need?
- Romans 10:17 says faith comes by hearing the word of God. What are some practical habits you have, or could develop, to consistently hear and absorb God's word in your daily life?
- James 1:22 challenges us to be doers of the word and not just hearers. What is one area of your life where you feel God is calling you to move from simply knowing His word to actively living it out?
- Pastor Lightfoot used the image of a lamp and a light from Psalms 119:105 to describe how God's word guides us. Describe a 'dark season' in your life when God's word served as that lamp. What did that look like practically?
- The sermon closed with the encouragement that 'you are right at the brink of your blessing.' What word or promise from God are you currently standing on, and how can this group support you in trusting it?

Life Application

This week, identify one specific promise or word from God that applies to a challenge you are currently facing. Write it down, speak it out loud each morning, and make a conscious decision to act in a way that reflects your belief in that promise. Whether it relates to your health, your family, your finances, or your calling, choose to be a doer of that word and not just a hearer. At your next group meeting, be prepared to share how standing on that word impacted your week.
