**Take Risks:** Be willing to try new things, even if they seem scary, silly, useless, or otherwise challenging. **Be brave**. Step outside your comfort zone and into your power as a worthy member of this community. This is how we learn.

- ☑ Read and analyze various genres: novels, short stories, poems, plays, nonfiction, and essays
- Possible novel titles may include: excerpts from *The House on Mango Street* (Cisneros); *The Outsiders* (Hinton), *Night* (Wiesel), *Of Mice and Men* (Steinbeck), and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Shakespeare)

#### Literary Response & Analysis

Complete various written or discussion activities that demonstrate your:

- ✓ Comprehension of author's audience and purpose, vocabulary, genre, organization, plot
- Ability to make inferences, figuring out what the author is implying, beyond the obvious, surface-level meaning
- ✓ Ability to think abstractly
- Comprehension and analysis of character, setting, mood, theme, symbolism, point of view
- ✓ Comprehension and analysis of the author's style

# **CLASSWORK**

Below is a general outline of what English class might look like on a typical day:

**Warm-Up:** Students may complete a vocabulary practice, grammar practice, content review, preview for day's lesson or silently read a book of your choice.

<u>Mini-Lesson:</u> Teacher provides instruction, directions, models the skill, thinks-aloud, uses examples

Readers' and/or Writers' Workshop Time: Students practice and apply the skills or content focused on during the mini-lesson. Students will work individually, in pairs, or small groups. Teacher input, support, encouragement, and challenges are provided at this time. Each Friday/Assessment day will contain a writer's workshop and voluntary as well as assigned Open Mic presentations.

Homework assignments may include, but are not limited to the following tasks:
