### What is the day in the life like at your job?

I work in an office that decides appeals relating to

Pennsylvania's Right-to-Know Law. The law allows journalists or citizens to request public records, usually for the purpose of crafting news stories or government accountability. Besides overseeing a docket of appeals, I handle amicus curiae (friend of the Court) litigation for my agency, the Office of Open Records. This involves writing persuasive briefs for appellate courts to help inform their decision-making process.

#### What do you love about your job?

Government transparency is a great field to work in. My ultimate goal is to move into media law and help media organizations navigate obtaining public records and defending First Amendment litigation.

### What is challenging about your role?

Appellate litigation is tons of fun, and a strong intellectual challenge. Otherwise, I have to be prepared to argue at hearings and manage a full docket of appeals.

As a government employee, my salary has remained stable throughout COVID-19. I like being involved in First Amendment issues. It involves political strategy but at the end of the day, it's bipartisan. We can all agree that government transparency is a good thing.
