Guidelines

Our goal or mission at <u>Associates for the Control of Excessive Suffering</u> is to optimally minimize, on a global scale, the occurrences of consciousness that we consider too unpleasant. We think this can best be done by creating a world center where people can act systemically and develop a new specialized field of theoretical and practical knowledge to control excessive suffering.

We think that our new global approach to suffering is needed to create institutions of knowledge and action capable of framing the kind of large-scale collaboration required between those who, in a wide variety of ways, work on suffering. Let's begin to give a concrete shape to such concepts as a "World Institute for the Study of Suffering" and a "Headquarters for the Management of Suffering in the World".

In the expression "Control of Excessive Suffering":

- We say "Suffering" to refer to any occurrence of consciousness that is felt as unpleasant.
- We say "Excessive" to convey that we are only concerned with pathological unpleasantness. We don't need to control all suffering, just the excess of it.
- We say "Control" rather than reduction, prevention, or abolition because we seek to regulate excesses of suffering, which may involve augmenting, allowing, or creating excessive suffering in a few obvious cases.

We regard our field of work as a specialty whose object of interest is the phenomenon of suffering itself and not what comes under the purview of other fields of expertise such as healthcare, economics, ethics, law, etc. Arguably, work concerning suffering in any of these other fields has another primary object of concern, such as health (illness), wealth (poverty), the good (the bad), the right (crime), etc. We can use what these fields do to carry out our mission, and vice-versa (other fields can use what we do), but let us all be careful not to confuse the different specialties, which are always concerned first and foremost with their own specific object.

Why do we promote a World Center for the Control of Excesssive Suffering?

- Because we value the alleviation of suffering, scientific knowledge, and technical mastery.
 We believe that suffering is a natural phenomenon that can best be mastered by a discipline specifically dedicated to its study.
- Because we hope that an initiative like this can constitute a game-changing advance, an important world first, a historic breakthrough.
- Because our initiative is a prerequisite "to organize the alleviation of suffering, steadily and sustainably" as proposed by the Algosphere Alliance.
- Because a World Control Center can help reduce the suffering that not only prevents the world from evolving towards happiness, but also makes its destruction look like a solution.
- Because the needs associated with suffering in the world are immense, they constitute a
 huge economic demand that calls for the provision of many new resources, goods, and
 specialized services. The World Control Center has the potential to generate a new
 large-scale economic prosperity based on the alleviation of suffering.
- Because a few researchers across the world are currently working on the systematic study of suffering, but they cannot go further in their <u>pioneering work</u> and succeed to a sufficient extent without the help of paid workers and expensive tools that would be an integral part of a World Center.
- Because the systematic measurement of suffering and its mapping across time and space, could serve as a compass for governance systems.
- Because if someone is concerned with a personal problem of suffering, for herself or others, the Center could help them through a personal reference service such as this <u>Information</u> <u>and Referral Centre</u> (which could be expanded to the whole world), and more generally through something like the project <u>Alleviating MY Suffering</u>, which could provide coaching or

- useful orientation on all aspects of personal suffering-alleviation (lifestyle, economy, relationships, health, ethics, civil life, etc.).
- Because if a medical or a social service specialist is looking for ways to make their work
 more effective in terms of concrete suffering-alleviation, the comprehensive approach of the
 Center would allow them to get a contextual map showing theoretical and practical paths that
 would otherwise remain invisible.
- Because if a decision maker or a policy planner needs to evaluate the pros and cons of an intervention in terms of suffering-alleviation, and thus make a dramatic difference in the fate of many individuals, then what, if not the kind of disciplinary approach that is proposed here, could provide relevant analyses?
- Because if an investor is made to worry about the serious infliction of suffering involved in the
 pursuit of a profit, the Center could provide a technical assessment and propose alternative
 ways of doing things at an affordable cost.
- Because if someone has a valuable idea for eradicating a cause of suffering, the Center might welcome and assist that person by all possible means.

Our enterprise is not the universal solution to the problem of suffering, and the best we can do might still be far from sufficient. Nevertheless, we are introducing a pragmatic specialty that seems indispensable. We will see soon if our plan is good enough. We think we can do a lot to radically reduce excessive suffering if, at long last, after millennia, we bother to care about it globally and systematically. Indeed, humanity's top priority right now, all things considered, might well be for compassionate workers from all areas to join forces and develop a common field of theories and practices aimed explicitly at controlling excessive suffering.

We do our job, talk about it, and let new associates join us on their own, if they wish, as they see fit. We work as we can, when we can, without undue haste: there is no need to rush or stress, despite the emergency cries of suffering, because on the large scale of the required revolution, things happen at their own pace and hardly depend on any single one of our actions.

Everything we do is subject to change at any time, especially in response to suggestions from participants.

If needed, property rights within our group could be modified. For example, we could create a collective entity that owns the things we use. Then, our initiative might become a legal organization that, once a year, elects a boss who has the final say but can be dismissed at any time by the general assembly or the board of administrators.

People who are professionally dealing with suffering need to take <u>self-protection measures</u> to avoid post-traumatic syndrome, compassion fatigue, and other potentially adverse effects. They must have a good physical and psychological constitution to start with, be immunized by a good wisdom system against memetic hazards, have co-workers who might help them, and metaphorically wear protective equipment against excessive exposure to heat, coldness,

dryness, pressure, lack of clean air, viral propaganda, and certain types of radiation such as bright lights or, worst of all, cosmic rays (of infinite suffering).



Background

<u>February 22, 2023</u>: Robert Daoust and Manu Herran start the *About Suffering* project to promote a new field of theoretical and practical research about the phenomenon of suffering.

March 9, 2023: Our website might be a basis for the production of the first comprehensive *Handbook of Knowledge About Suffering*.

From <u>June 21,2023</u> to <u>July 6, 2023</u>: A comprehensive science of suffering ought to be a theoretical and also a practical discipline because the reason we want to understand suffering is to have control over it. To emphasize the practical side of our initiative, we might call it the *Center for the Study and Control (or Management) of Suffering.*

From November 2, 2023 to November 25, 2023: Let us use and implement the concept of a global management. The management of suffering aims for practical results, but also involves a concern for knowledge. Let's call our group *Partners for a Global Management of Suffering* and our book *About Suffering: Our Evolving Action Plan*. The idea is to act, to do things systematically, directly, by ourselves, in order to implement, realize, establish a global management of suffering in the world.

From June 30, 2024 to September 09, 2024: At this stage, we need to change the way we operate in order to grow, involve more people, and use more money. To do this, we need to focus on getting people to react positively to what we're doing. But we have a problem: we haven't found anyone outside our group who shares our idea of a disciplinary specialty dealing with suffering. After much trial and error, we have come to the following findings: Partners for the Control of Excessive Suffering are the editors of Laying the Foundations for a Discipline About Suffering. Our undertaking has the characteristics of a global system: it involves simultaneously an organization (our partnership), a discipline (of theoretical and practical knowledge about suffering), and a practice (a series of 'actions' that seek to optimally reduce the quantity of excessive suffering in the world). We now realize that all the actions that we carry out as partners make up our global system. We also realize that the discipline is necessary to provide an 'objective' direction to follow, bring different people on the same path, and make it possible to act coherently, because it provides the terminology, taxonomy, metrology, methodology, bibliography, general synthesis, etc., that we must use in our organization and practice.

From October 24, 2024: Our goal and mission at Associates for the Control of Excessive Suffering is to optimally minimize, on a global scale, the occurrences of consciousness that we consider too unpleasant. We think this can be done particularly by creating a World Center for the Control of Excessive Suffering and by developing a new specialized field of theoretical and practical knowledge concerning the phenomenon of suffering.
