Our Goals for every student in CRE this year are:

- **I can make good choices even if I am mad.**
- **I can be okay even if others are not okay.**

Classroom expectations:

Think before you talk or act

Everyone deserves respect and kindness

Always do your best

Make sure you listen and follow directions

My job is to teach and to help all students learn. It is not ok to be hurtful or to disrupt learning for other students in our room.

When a child moves to the safe seat. This is the place for them to regroup and learn. I will have a conversation with them to make sure we understand one another and coach them with ways to keep them at their desk. I will continue to teach and if the student has decided to learn in this safe spot, they may return to their desk. If they are still struggling at the safe spot they will be sent to the buddy room and they could proceed to the Student Support Center (SSC).

If your child goes to the buddy room or Student Support Center (SSC) room, I will contact you. The teachers will talk with them and possibly help them with any work that they need to complete. When the student returns to my room from the buddy room or Student Support Center (SSC) they will return to the safe spot to show me they are ready to learn. If they are successful there, they may return to their desk.

Occasionally there will be students that cannot handle the safe seat, and will be sent directly to our Student Support Center (SSC). From the Student Support Center (SSC) room they will either return to the safe seat or go to the office.

There are certain behaviors that warrant a trip to the office skipping some of the other steps.

Each day starts out new with the opportunity to make the right choices for their behavior.

Student Desk > Safe Seat > Buddy Room > Student Support Center(SSC) > Office

We will be using positive reinforcement and encouragement with accountability and grace to ensure that all students are successful in our class.
