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Abstract :

The abstract submitted to Communautaire: Journal of Community Service must be written clearly, concisely, and descriptively in both English and Indonesian. The abstract should contain 150–200 words and provide a brief overview of the community service activity, including the background or scope of the activity, objectives, methods or implementation strategies, results and impacts, and conclusion. The abstract must represent the main content of the article and should be understandable independently without referring to the full manuscript.

The abstract section is placed separately from the main article text. It should be formatted using Calibri Light, 10 pt font size, single spacing, and justified alignment. The abstract should not contain citations, tables, figures, or unexplained abbreviations.

INTRODUCTION (Written in bold capital, Calibri Light 12)

The introduction section should provide a comprehensive background and rationale for the community service activity. This section should explain the social, educational, economic, health, technological, or environmental issues that underlie the program's implementation. Authors should describe the current conditions of the target community, identify the main problems or challenges, and explain the significance of addressing these issues through a structured community engagement approach.

This section should include a review of relevant previous studies or community service initiatives to demonstrate the current state of knowledge and practice. Authors should highlight the existing gaps, limitations, or unmet needs that justify implementing the reported community service program. The originality, contribution, and relevance of the activity should be clearly stated, including how the program provides solutions, innovations, empowerment strategies, or sustainable impacts for the target community.

The objectives of the community service activity should be clearly formulated at the end of this section. The introduction should establish a logical connection among the identified problems, the theoretical or empirical evidence, the proposed intervention, and the program's expected outcomes.

All references must follow the American Psychological Association (APA) 7th edition citation style using in-text citations, for example: (Strzelecki, 2024), (Feng et al., 2025; Grzybowski et al., 2024), and (Karalis, 2024; Finocchiaro, 2024). The introduction

should be written in a concise, academic style and supported by relevant, up-to-date scientific literature.

Articles submitted to **Communautaire: Journal of Community Service** must represent original work that has not been previously published or simultaneously submitted to other journals or academic publications. Manuscripts must comply with the journal formatting guidelines, including the use of **Calibri Light, 12-point font, single spacing**, and other requirements specified in the journal template.

RESEARCH METHODS

The Research Method section describes the design, implementation process, participants or community partners, data collection techniques, and data analysis methods used in the community service activity. Authors should clearly explain the approach, location, target participants, implementation stages, and evaluation procedures to ensure transparency and reproducibility of the reported program.

For qualitative approaches, authors should describe the research setting, researcher involvement, subjects or informants, data collection procedures, and analysis techniques. For quantitative or mixed-method approaches, authors should present the population, sample characteristics, measurement instruments, variables assessed, and statistical analysis procedures.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

Results

The Results section presents the findings obtained from the community service activities systematically and objectively. This section should describe the outcomes of the implemented program, including participant characteristics, achievement indicators, changes observed after the intervention, and evaluation results. Authors should present the findings based on the objectives and methods described previously without providing extensive interpretation.

The Results section should consist of approximately three paragraphs. The first paragraph should provide a general overview of the implementation outcomes, including the location, participants, program completion status, and the main achievements of the community service activity. The second paragraph should describe specific outcomes of the intervention, such as changes in knowledge, skills, behavior, community participation, institutional improvements, or other measurable indicators relevant to the program objectives. The third paragraph should summarize additional findings, evaluation results, sustainability aspects, or supporting evidence demonstrating the effectiveness of the implemented activity.

Quantitative and qualitative findings should be presented using appropriate tables, figures, graphs, or diagrams to improve clarity and scientific communication. Tables and figures should present information that cannot be explained efficiently in the text and should not duplicate it. Each table and figure must be numbered consecutively and referred to in the manuscript.

Tables should have a clear title placed above the table. The table should use simple formatting with adequate spacing and be prepared in **Calibri Light, size 10 pt.**

Figures, graphs, and diagrams should be numbered consecutively and accompanied by informative captions placed below the figure.

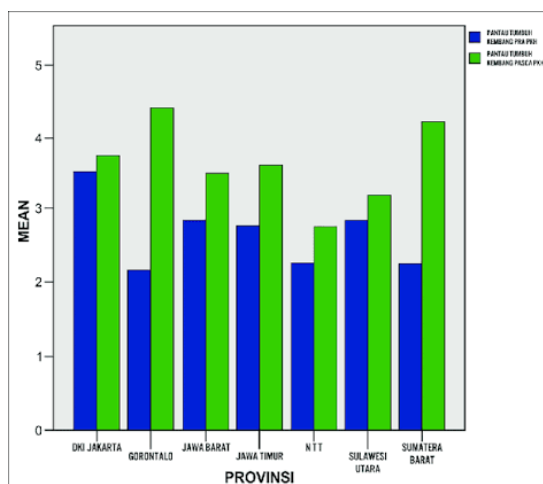


Figure 1. Monitoring of child growth and development results

Figures should be high-quality, relevant to the findings, and directly support the explanation of the results. Photographs documenting community activities may be included only when they provide meaningful evidence of program implementation and should comply with ethical considerations regarding participant consent.

Discussion

The Discussion section interprets the meaning and significance of findings from the community service activity by relating the outcomes to the program objectives, relevant theories, and previous studies. Authors should explain the effectiveness, contribution, strengths, and limitations of the intervention without repeating the results. The discussion should highlight how the program addressed identified community problems and provide a scientific interpretation of the observed changes.

The discussion should also describe the broader implications of the activity, including sustainability, future implementation strategies, and potential development of similar programs. Authors should provide critical reflection on the intervention's contribution to community empowerment, capacity building, and sustainable social impact, while avoiding unsupported claims or excessive generalizations.

CONCLUSION

The conclusion section should be written in a single paragraph summarizing the main achievements of the community service activity. It should clearly describe the extent to which the program objectives were achieved, the changes or benefits experienced by the target community or partners, and the contribution of the program in addressing the identified community problems. Authors should highlight the practical implications of the activity and may provide brief recommendations for future program development or sustainability. The conclusion should not repeat the entire

results section, introduce new findings, or include information that has not been discussed previously.
