About C. Allyn Hildebrand, O.D.

"I like eyes. I think they're the most interesting part of the body."

Without a doubt, Dr. C. Allyn Hildebrand has made the right career choice. A Doctor of Optometry at the Campbell Cunningham Laser Center since 1989, Dr. Hildebrand estimates that he has seen over 15,000 refractive surgery patients. That's a lot of eyes!

"I love the patients," he says. "I know it sounds cliché, but I love patient interaction and I like helping people see better. You can do a lot of tangible good, day in and day out, in eye care."

Dr. Hildebrand did his undergrad work at the University of Memphis (then known as Memphis State University). "I thought about medical school and was fascinated with surgery," he says. "I was lucky enough to become First Assistant in St. Francis Hospital, working in surgical procedures such as open heart, orthopedic, abdominal and plastics."

"I quickly developed a love for the medical field and wanted to find my place in helping people," Hildebrand goes on to say. It was around that time that Dr. Hildebrand discovered his special interest in the field of eye care. "It's that tangible gratification I was after," he says. "Once I entered the field, I really liked what I could do and Optometry was something I grew to love."

"I do nearly all of the post-op and pre-operative care for patients here at Campbell Cunningham Laser Center," Hildebrand says. "I also do primary eye care, including general eye exams, glasses and contacts, eye health and I also manage and treat dry eyes, glaucoma, diabetic and other eye diseases."

Every patient is special to Dr. Hildebrand. But, those with particularly challenging experiences with corrective lenses can be even more rewarding. "For me, it's patients who have had an incredibly bad experience in wearing contacts due to dry eyes. They are at the end of the line

when it comes to alternatives for glasses. In many cases, LASIK is the answer they are looking for.”

Dr. Hildebrand points to Intralase or Blade-Free LASIK, as a groundbreaking procedure made possible by advancements in software development. “It does a great job and increases the safety factor,” he says. “The flap is consistent and amazingly precise, allowing us to better predict outcomes.”

What brought Dr. Hildebrand to Knoxville and the Campbell Cunningham Laser Center? “It was the opportunity to work with the best surgeons in the region,” he says. “I have particularly enjoyed my relationships with Drs. Campbell and Cunningham as well as what I believe to be the most qualified and experienced staff in the area. We have great employees here who are knowledgeable, experienced and are a pleasure to be around.”

When Dr. Hildebrand isn't caring for eyes, he enjoys outdoor activities including hiking in the Smokies. Along with Dr. Cunningham, he hiked Mt. Rainier and Mt. Everest Base Camp. Dr. Hildebrand also enjoys running, biking and music and working with Lion's Club and InterFaith Health Clinic. He and his wife Lisa have two children, Sara and Austen.

About Daniel Horton, O.D.

Body Content

“It’s not like people are built in a Ford assembly line.”

As an Optometrist, Dr. Daniel Horton never stops reminding himself that not all humans are built the same. “People are different,” he says, “and different people respond differently to certain types of treatments. I want to make sure we treat each patient as an individual, closely monitoring his or her condition and carefully observing reactions to our treatments. Each patient is a unique case.”

Dr. Horton’s story is also unique in one aspect: “I knew from the time I was in the 7th grade that I wanted to be an Optometrist,” he says, “and I never looked back.”

Born and raised in Maryville, young Daniel began wearing corrective lenses at age 9. “I began seeing Dr. Peterson in Maryville,” he recalls. “He was wonderful and I could see that he really liked his job. I just knew that I could do some good in this profession.”

After graduating from Maryville’s William Blount High School, Daniel went on to earn a degree in biology from the University of Tennessee. He then crossed the state to attend Southern College of Optometry where he received his Doctor of Optometry in 2001.

“I was fortunate to do my Externship with Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun in 2000,” he says. “I worked under Dr. Cunningham, usually shadowing him and Dr. Hildebrand. It was a great experience.”

Dr. Horton firmly believes in first-hand observation. “Textbooks are one thing,” he says, “but actually seeing is totally revealing. I learned a lot of pathology by shadowing Dr. Cunningham. He encouraged me to sit with him and his patients while he was diagnosing and treating each one. I think what he saw in me was someone who wanted to learn and understand the eye from the inside out. And I think he appreciated my eagerness to help people.”

For his first year after school, Dr. Horton served as a fill-in around Knoxville and East Tennessee, practicing his new profession at a variety of offices. “The experience was rewarding,” he recalls. “I got to see patients from various parts of the area and I learned a lot about their backgrounds. I worked very hard at gaining their trust.”

Then, in 2002, Horton was invited to come on full time with Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun, where he’s now responsible for Primary Care and General Optometry. “Essentially, I treat anything that is wrong with the eyes, including pain, loss of vision and injury,” he says. “I also do quite a bit of post-cataract and post-LASIK. I’m very interested in all of it.”

Doctor Horton has his own patient base, with his time split among the Knoxville and Sevierville locations. Among his specialties are contact lens fitting, dry eye and allergy treatment (very important in East Tennessee), as well as attending to all sorts of eye diseases. He also does cataract follow-up care for Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun.

The “personal touch” is very important to Dr. Horton. “I really concentrate on listening to the patient,” says Horton, “spending the time it takes to thoroughly go over their condition, recent surgeries and follow-up expectations. I also want to be reassuring with patients in explaining what they need to know and how their condition and treatment will affect their daily lives.”

“As a primary care doctor it’s my job to examine carefully, ask the right questions and try to uncover even the most unobvious of conditions,” says Horton. “For example, I had one patient who was experiencing double-vision. Essentially, all the tests came back negative, but I was determined to find a way to help the patient. I decided to refer him to a neurologist. It turns out he had a brain tumor. The neurologist was able to treat it successfully, but now every time I see the patient he calls me ‘the guy who saved his life.’ I suppose in some way, I helped, mostly by insisting that we find some sort of answer.”

Dr. Horton points out that particular symptoms in the eye can reveal some serious health issues. Many times, diabetes, strokes, aneurisms, high blood pressure and tumors can be suspected due to various indications through the eye.

Since his Optometry career began, Dr. Horton has seen some amazing advancements in the field. “One of those is Crystalens,” he says. “We now have a prosthetic lens that can accommodate the visual deficiencies brought on by age. Even more remarkable, we can essentially ‘fix’ the visual fields from near, far and up close and reading vision for cataract patients. That’s something we would never have dreamt of in school,” he says. “I take a lot of pride in being part of one of the select practices in the country that is doing state-of-the-art treatments like this.”

“We also have amazing new diagnostic capabilities,” he says. “Our OCT—the imaging technology that allows us to look through the layers of the retina as well as the mapping of the topographical irregularities of the cornea—is simply remarkable. It’s just one more tool that helps me make the right diagnosis for each individual patient.” As Dr. Horton always says, “patients are not assembly line products. Each one is unique.

Dr. Horton is happily married to wife, Jessica. When not diagnosing eye problems, he enjoys doing woodworking around the house, playing drums and occasionally running marathons. He may also be the only Optometrist in the country who’s also a “rib specialist” (a real wiz around the barbeque pit).

Dr. Stone grew up in Oneida and didn't always plan to be an optometrist. An accomplished French horn and mellophone player, she attended the University of Tennessee at Knoxville and graduated summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Music degree with a concentration in music education. About Alyssa Invergo Taylor, O.D., F.A.A.O.

“Healthcare was always on my mind”

With both her parents working in healthcare throughout her youth, it seemed only natural that Optometrist Dr. Alyssa Invergo Taylor would eventually steer toward a similar professional direction... though neither of her parents were involved in eye care. But it was her father’s potentially serious eye disorder and her own experience with needing glasses at a young age the exposed her to a whole new realm within the medical field and awakened a passion that would set the stage for her forthcoming career.

“Healthcare was always on my mind,” Dr. Invergo Taylor said. “I knew I wanted to be an Optometrist when I was in high school. My dad and my aunt have keratoconus, so that played a huge role in my decision. I went with my dad to all his eye appointments.”

Keratoconus is an eye disorder that occurs when the normally round cornea becomes thin and irregularly cone shaped, preventing the light that enters the eye from being focused on the retina properly and resulting in distorted vision. Combating conditions like this and a host of other eye disorders while improving people’s vision are what ultimately fueled Dr. Invergo Taylor’s urge to pursue a career in eye care.

Dr. Invergo Taylor was born and raised in Peotone, Illinois, a small town about 40 miles south of Chicago. In junior high, she became heavily involved in softball, continuing to play competitively throughout high school. She eventually caught the eye of a recruiter for Ole Miss and played

second base for the Rebels while pursuing her bachelor's degree. This was the beginning of her educational experience that led to fulfilling her dream of optometry.

Her fundamental motivation, however, remained the result of all those experiences with her father and the treatment of his keratoconus. With that firsthand exposure, Dr. Invergo Taylor fell in love with the multifaceted field, especially when she witnessed her father's quality of life greatly improve with the right treatment.

"It changed his life when he finally got a pair of contact lenses that fit him properly and he could see well," she said. "When I was young, he couldn't really go to my softball games and other events because his lenses weren't fitting well, and it was a dusty, windy environment that was terribly uncomfortable for him. Once he found a doctor who was able to fit him successfully, the comfort and vision improvement was a real game changer for him."

After graduating from Ole Miss, Dr. Invergo Taylor continued her education at Southern College of Optometry (SCO) in Memphis, Tennessee, where it was solidified that she definitely chose the right profession.

"I had a really great experience with the school I went to," she said. "I loved every part of it. I just loved learning everything about the eyes."

While at SCO, Dr. Invergo Taylor naturally gravitated more toward conditions affecting the cornea, obviously stemming from her father's experience with keratoconus. But she also had a surprising diagnosis of her own at that time followed by a revolutionary treatment option.

"Because of my dad's condition, I was always more interested in the cornea, specifically contact lenses and medical contact lenses," she said. "Actually, when I was a third year at SCO, I was diagnosed with keratoconus. Luckily, eye doctors caught mine super early, and now there are treatments to stop the progression that weren't available when my dad was diagnosed. So I was able to get corneal cross-linking done on both my eyes while I was a student. Thanks to that, I still have great vision. But that was still quite an experience to go through. That's what drove my passion in wanting to do a cornea and contact lens residency after graduation."

In corneal cross-linking, eye doctors use eyedrop medication and ultraviolet light to make the cornea stronger. It's called "cross-linking" because it adds bonds between the collagen fibers in the eye, working like support beams to help the cornea stay stable. The goal of this revolutionary treatment is to keep the cornea from bulging more over time.

Though corneal issues are admittedly her specialty, Dr. Invergo Taylor enjoys all aspects of comprehensive eye care.

"With my residency being in cornea and contact lenses, I mainly only saw patients who need medical contact lenses – scleral lenses, RGP (rigid gas permeable) lenses, custom soft lenses, orthokeratology too – just a lot of people who need these lenses," Dr. Invergo Taylor said. "I've

had a lot of really great patients, but a highlight of my residency is that I finally got to fit my dad. We changed him from a corneal RGP lens to a scleral lens and it helped a lot. That was really exciting for me.”

At EyeCare Optical, a division of Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun, Dr. Invergo Taylor is excited about all the latest innovations and industry expertise made available through the practice.

“I’m excited about the state-of-the-art technology for diagnostics and treatments available to my patients as well valuable collaborations with the skilled Ophthalmologists at Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun,” she said. “I see a lot of patients who have medical corneal issues, and I also do a lot of comprehensive and preventative care.”

Dr. Invergo Taylor is also excited to bring more exposure with orthokeratology to the practice, which is a type of myopia management where a patient wears a rigid lens on the eye at night (like a retainer) to help minimize the amount of nearsightedness and improve vision during the day. Though not as prominent in East Tennessee, Dr. Invergo Taylor confirms there is most certainly a growing need for this kind of treatment.

Whether its orthokeratology, contacts lens fittings, glasses prescriptions, or the gamut of other vision correcting treatments available at EyeCare Optical, Dr. Invergo Taylor is just happy to be providing such a valuable service to the people of East Tennessee in a region that she fell in love with during her undergrad experience.

“Going to Ole Miss, I got to see a lot of the south through traveling, and I fell in love with the area,” she said. “I love the Smoky Mountains and all the hiking in East Tennessee. It’s such a beautiful area.”

What happens during the Optomap exam?

During the exam, simply look into the device one eye at a time (like looking through a keyhole). The optometrist technician gently positions your head so you are looking at the ball in the middle of the circle and takes a photo – capturing the image in seconds. You will see a comfortable flash of light to let you know the image of your retina has been taken. The process is repeated with the other eye.

How does Optomap work?

Optomap images are created by non-invasive, low-intensity scanning lasers that encompass a widefield digital image of the retina without dilation drops. The image can then be filtered, allowing various layers of the retina to be evaluated. The digital image lets the eye care professional review it for a quick evaluation. The image is stored for future comparisons.

Why is it important to have the retina examined?

The retina (located in the back of your eye) is the only place in the body where blood vessels can be seen directly.

In addition to eye conditions, such as Glaucoma, retinal detachment, Macular Degeneration, eye tumors or eye cancer, signs of other diseases, such as stroke, heart disease, hypertension and diabetes, can also be seen in the retina. Early signs of these conditions can show on your retina long before you notice any changes to your vision or feel pain.

A traditional exam with dilation is especially important if you're at high risk of retinal issues. During a laser retina scan, such as Optomap, your eyes might or might not be dilated. Although these laser retina scans can detect some retinal abnormalities, the scans have limitations.

Who is a good candidate for Optomap?

- Almost everyone is a good candidate – just to name a few:
- Patients who can't or don't want to be dilated
- Children
- Patients with a history of eye problems (such as diabetic retinopathy or glaucoma)
- Patients who are light sensitive

What is the cost of this exam? Is it covered by insurance?

The cost for an Optomap exam is \$39.

As a general rule, if the images are taken as baseline documentation of a healthy eye or as preventative medicine to screen for potential disease, then it is not covered by most health insurance plans, including Medicare.

Astigmatism is an imperfection in the curvature of the cornea or lens of the eye. If the cornea or lens is irregularly shaped, the light that enters the eye isn't refracted properly, resulting in distorted vision. If the imperfection lies with the cornea, it is called corneal astigmatism. If it's the lens that is distorted, it's called lenticular astigmatism.

What are symptoms of astigmatism?

People with astigmatism often have blurry vision, both up close and far away. Objects may look stretched, wavy, or uneven – similar to looking into a funhouse mirror. Astigmatism can happen along with nearsightedness or farsightedness.

Other symptoms may include double vision, eye strain, tired eyes, headaches, and fatigue. Some studies suggest that astigmatism may also be linked to migraines in certain people.

What causes astigmatism?

The cause of astigmatism is unclear, but it is believed to be linked to genetics. Although doctors don't know why corneal shape differs from one person to another, they do agree that the likelihood of having astigmatism is inherited. It's a very common condition, affecting approximately one in three people worldwide.

Although usually present from birth, astigmatism can develop after an eye injury or eye surgery.

How is astigmatism diagnosed & treated?

An eye exam with the doctors at EyeCare Optical can determine if you have any astigmatism and the proper prescription for glasses or contacts.

Astigmatism is generally treated in one of three ways – glasses, contacts or surgery.

Eyeglasses for this condition contain a special cylindrical lens prescription that compensates for the astigmatism, providing additional power in specific parts of the lenses. Typically, single-vision lenses are prescribed for clear vision at all distances, but patients over 40 with presbyopia may require bifocals or progressive lenses.

Some patients may achieve better results with contacts, but not usually the standard soft contact lenses. Rigid gas-permeable contacts may be needed to compensate for the irregular shape of the cornea.

Though most people choose to correct their vision with glasses or contacts, astigmatism can also be corrected by reshaping the cornea through refractive surgery, such as LASIK or PRK. Through LASIK, a small flap is created in the cornea and some tissue is reduced, while PRK involves reduction of the outer layer of the cornea called the epithelium.

Blepharitis is a chronic inflammation of the eyelids, which can cause itching, burning, irritation, tearing, and crusting of the eyelashes and, occasionally, red eye. This condition can begin in childhood or develop later in life. Blepharitis may flare up only once but tends to recur repeatedly more often. Chronic blepharitis may lead to corneal scarring and decreased visual acuity if left untreated.

What are the symptoms of blepharitis?

Anterior blepharitis is the most common type. It happens when the body reacts to too much normal bacteria on the eyelids. This can cause redness along the edges of the eyelids and crusty flakes around the eyelashes. In some cases, eyelashes may fall out or the eyelid edges may change shape.

A less common form called seborrheic blepharitis usually causes less redness but more flaking around the lashes. It is often linked to flaky skin around the nose or hairline.

Posterior blepharitis, also known as Meibomian Gland Disease, affects the oil glands in the upper and lower eyelids. These glands can become inflamed and clogged, which affects the quality of the oil they produce. Since this oil helps keep the eyes comfortable, problems with the glands can lead to dry eye symptoms such as burning, tearing, blurry vision, itching, and overall eye discomfort.

What causes blepharitis?

There are several factors that may contribute to blepharitis. The most common of which include:

- Clogged oil glands in the eyelids (called the Meibomian Glands).
- Overgrowth of normal bacteria.
- Seborrheic dermatitis.
- Rosacea (a skin condition characterized by chronic redness).
- Lice or mites known as Demodex.

How is blepharitis treated?

Eyelid Hygiene: Strict eyelid hygiene is extremely important when it comes to the treatment of blepharitis. Warm compresses and eyelid scrubs are generally effective methods:

- **Warm compresses** should be applied at least two times a day for 10-15 minutes to heat and loosen the oil in the eyelids, which aids in the expression of the oil from the glands. This can be accomplished in a few ways. We recommend a commercially available microwave re-heatable mask that can be purchased in our optical shop. A warm washcloth can also be used as an acceptable alternative.
- **Eyelid scrubs** are equally as important as warm compresses to remove eyelid debris and crusted oil. Eyelid scrubs should be performed twice per day. Our recommendation is a commercially prepared hypochlorous acid solution, such as Ocusoft Hypochlor (available in our optical shop). Baby shampoo on a wet washcloth may be used as an alternative.

Antibiotic And Anti-Inflammatory Medications: Depending on the severity of your blepharitis, limited use of antibiotic ointments, topical steroids, or cyclosporine may be necessary to control the condition. For some patients, oral antibiotics, such as doxycycline, may prove helpful.

A cataract is the clouding of the eye's natural lens. Located just behind the iris, the natural lens helps to focus light on the back of the retina, which then sends the images to the brain. When the lens is cloudy, light and images can be prevented from effectively reaching the retina, resulting in decreased visual acuity.

What are symptoms of cataracts?

Cataracts often develop slowly, and symptoms may not be noticeable at first. Over time, vision continues to worsen as the cataract grows. While the exact cause of cataracts is not fully understood, they are extremely common and should be checked by an eye care professional.

Common symptoms include:

- Vision that gets worse with age
- Blurry or double vision
- Trouble seeing at night
- Seeing halos around bright lights
- Vision that worsens in sunlight
- Poor depth perception
- Difficulty telling colors apart
- Frequent changes in glasses or contact lens prescriptions
- Difficulty reading

These symptoms can also be signs of other eye conditions. If you have been diagnosed with cataracts or notice cloudy vision in one or both eyes, you are not alone. Cataracts are very common and usually develop with age, often starting around age 55. By age 65, more than half of Americans either have cataracts or have already had cataract surgery.

The good news is that vision loss from cataracts can usually be treated. Cataract surgery is one of the most common and successful procedures performed today. During surgery, the cloudy

lens is removed and replaced with a clear artificial lens. About 90% of patients notice improved vision after surgery.

How are cataracts treated?

Cataract surgery is one of the most common medical procedures performed today. More than 18 million cataract surgeries are done worldwide each year, including thousands performed by our affiliate ophthalmology practice Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun in East Tennessee.

Cataract surgery is an outpatient procedure and is performed at the Eye Surgery Center of East Tennessee, meaning you can return home the same day.

Thanks to modern advances, cataract surgery is quick and involves little discomfort. During the procedure, a board-certified ophthalmologist removes the cloudy natural lens of the eye and replaces it with a clear artificial lens, called an intraocular lens (IOL). This allows light to pass clearly to the retina, improving vision. The surgery usually takes only a few minutes and does not require stitches.

Cataract surgery is done on one eye at a time, with the second eye typically treated one to two weeks later. Most patients are able to return to normal daily activities within a day or two.

Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun offer the latest advances in lens replacement technology. Today's lenses may reduce or eliminate the need for glasses or contact lenses for near, far, and in-between vision, including reading. Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye)

Conjunctivitis, or more commonly known as pink eye, is an inflammation or infection of the conjunctiva (a transparent membrane) that lines the white part of your eye and the inside of the eyelids. This causes the tiny blood vessels to make your eyes look reddish or pink. Since the condition can be contagious, it is important to get diagnosed and treated by an Optometrist or Ophthalmologist as early as possible to prevent spreading it to others.

What are symptoms of conjunctivitis?

The most common symptoms of conjunctivitis include the following in one or both eyes:

- Redness
- Itching or burning sensation
- A gritty feeling (foreign body sensation)
- Increased tear production
- Discharge of pus or mucus that forms a crust while you sleep that may make it difficult to open your eyes when you wake up

What causes conjunctivitis?

There are several factors that may cause conjunctivitis. These may include:

- Viruses
- Bacteria
- Allergies
- A chemical solution splashed in the eye
- Foreign objects in the eye
- A blocked tear duct (typically in newborns)

Are there different types of conjunctivitis?

Yes, the different types of conjunctivitis result from the different root causes.

- **Viral Conjunctivitis:** This type of conjunctivitis can occur with a cold, flu, or other respiratory infection and usually begins in one eye, spreading to the other eye within days. Any discharge associated with this form is typically more watery than thick.
- **Bacterial Conjunctivitis:** This type is more commonly associated with discharge of pus, which can lead to the eyelids sticking together. It sometimes occurs in conjunction with an ear infection.
- **Allergic Conjunctivitis:** This usually occurs in both eyes and can produce intense itching, burning, tearing, and swelling in the eyes. It may even occur along with symptoms of allergies, like sneezing, scratchy throat, itchy nose, or asthma.

Can there be complications involved with conjunctivitis?

In children and adults, conjunctivitis can cause inflammation in the cornea that can potentially negatively affect vision. Prompt evaluation and treatment by your doctor for eye pain, a foreign body sensation, blurred vision, or light sensitivity can greatly reduce the risk of complications.

How is conjunctivitis treated?

Treating conjunctivitis depends on the type you have.

For **viral conjunctivitis**, there are no specific treatments. Your body will fight off the virus on its own, but a cool, wet washcloth applied to the eyes can help with any discomfort.

With **bacterial conjunctivitis**, your eye doctor may prescribe antibiotic drops depending on how severe your symptoms are.

Conjunctivitis brought on by **allergies** may be eased with certain eye drops recommended or prescribed by your doctor.

If the conjunctivitis is caused by a **chemical or other substance** in your eye, the eye must be rinsed with clean water immediately and thoroughly. Consult with an eye care professional right away if rinsing doesn't alleviate the problem. Certain eye drops or ointments may be recommended.

Conjunctivitis usually goes away on its own within one to two weeks. If your symptoms last longer than that, you should see your doctor at EyeCare Optical as soon as possible.

How do I prevent the spread of conjunctivitis?

Practicing good hygiene is essential in controlling the spread of conjunctivitis. For instance:

- Refrain from touching your eyes with your hands.
- Wash your hands thoroughly and often.
- Use a clean towel and washcloth daily.
- Don't share towels or washcloths with others.
- Wash and change your pillowcases often.
- Throw away eye cosmetics used during a flare up, such as mascara.

- Never share eye cosmetics or other personal eye care items.

Conjunctivitis is no more contagious than the common cold, so it's usually okay to return to work, school or childcare if you're unable to take time off – just be sure to stay consistent in your good hygiene practices.

Diabetes causes damage to small blood vessels throughout the body, including the delicate retina. The retina is the innermost tissue lining of the eye that receives light and transmits images to the brain. With diabetic retinopathy, damage from these deteriorating blood vessels can eventually cause visual problems.

Are there different types of diabetic retinopathy?

There are two types of diabetic retinopathy:

- **Background diabetic retinopathy (BDR)** is caused by retinal blood vessel leakage. Some of the small blood vessels narrow or close completely, while others can enlarge and form balloon-like sacs. These blood vessels leak and hemorrhage, causing swelling and the formation of oozing deposits called exudates. All of these changes in the eyes due to diabetes can cause decreased vision.
- **Proliferative diabetic retinopathy (PDR)**, typically begins in a manner similar to BDR. Closed blood vessels along with the development of new abnormal blood vessels lead to PDR. These fragile blood vessels grow on the surface of the retina or into the vitreous body, the gel substance that fills the space between the front of the eye and the retina. In some cases, these new blood vessels rupture and bleed into the vitreous body, causing vision issues.

What are the symptoms of diabetic retinopathy?

Leaking or hemorrhaging in the retina may be detected by a doctor even before vision is affected. Blurry vision could indicate retinal swelling. When bleeding occurs, vision may become very cloudy or completely lost in severe cases.

How is diabetic retinopathy diagnosed?

At EyeCare Optical, a division of Drs. Campbell, Cunningham, Taylor & Haun, a thorough retinal examination will determine the overall health of your eyes and any changes in visual function. A complete diabetic eye evaluation often includes a test called fluorescein angiography, which consists of injecting a water-soluble dye into a small vein in the hand or arm and taking a series of specially filtered, high-speed photographs of the blood vessels in the retina. The results of this test help the doctor identify and evaluate areas of leakage or new blood vessel formation. Results from the fluorescein angiography can also help guide precision laser surgery, which may be used to treat retinopathy.

How is diabetic retinopathy treated?

People with diabetes are 25 times more likely to become blind than non-diabetics. However, risks can be significantly reduced with regular evaluation and proper care. There are many treatment options to help combat the effects of diabetic retinopathy. Laser surgery is an option that involves focusing a powerful beam of laser light energy onto the retina. Another treatment is intravitreal injections of medicines into the eye to protect against vision loss.

Laser treatment and injections are often effective in lowering the risk of progressive vision loss and maintaining your present vision. These treatments require no incisions and may be performed at your doctor's office. If bleeding into the vitreous body has occurred, or if scar tissue is causing strain on the retina, a surgical procedure called a vitrectomy may be needed. This procedure is generally performed after other treatments have been attempted but proven unsuccessful.

Your tears make the surface of your eyes smooth and optically clear. The three layers that make up the normal tear film each have important functions that are necessary for good vision.

1. The **outer oily layer** is the first “lens” or optical surface that allows light to pass through when entering the eye.
2. The **middle watery layer** helps keep the eye moist and works to flush away debris.
3. The **inner mucus layer** serves as a reservoir for the eye’s natural defenses against inflammation and infection.

Together, these three layers must remain balanced to keep vision clear and the eyes comfortable. When the tear film is disrupted, the eyes can become dry, irritated, and prone to blurred vision or infection.

What are the symptoms of dry eyes?

Patients who have dry eyes may experience a multitude of symptoms, including burning sensations and redness; a feeling of scratchiness or gravel in the eyes; vision that fluctuates when blinking; contact lens discomfort; excessive tearing. Symptoms usually get worse when the patient is in dry or windy environments; following prolonged periods of reading; while taking certain medications; or when spending time in heated or air-conditioned areas.

What causes dry eyes?

Dry eyes occur when there are not enough natural tears produced or when the tears that are produced do not function properly. Dry spots form on the outer surfaces of the eye in either situation. In most cases, there is no underlying disorder that causes the dry eye, but in some cases, the dryness is linked with allergies, thyroid disease, arthritis, or other connective tissue disorders.

What are the treatments for dry eyes?

Although there is no cure for chronic dry eyes, the tear film can be supplemented to furnish the comfort that naturally produced tears provide. Artificial tears (either drops or ointment) are quite effective in treating dry eyes. Patients can also benefit from using humidifiers in their home or office, as well as side shields on their glasses. Spectacle lenses should be treated to protect the surface of the eye from harmful ultraviolet and infrared radiation. In many cases, temporary or permanent closure of the tear drains helps preserve the natural moisture layer of the eye. In severe cases of dry eyes, a combination of all these treatment options may be necessary to provide relief.

Punctal plugs have recently been introduced as a novel treatment for severe dry eyes. The tiny plug fits in the tear duct, unseen and unfelt, and helps the tear layer of the lower lid rise to normal, more comfortable levels. Talk to your doctor to find out if you may be a candidate for punctal plugs.

Farsightedness, also called hyperopia, is a vision problem where faraway objects are easier to see than close-up ones. About 5 to 10 out of every 100 Americans have farsightedness.

What are symptoms of farsightedness?

People with farsightedness are able to focus better on objects far away than ones close up.

In addition to blurry near vision, other symptoms include squinting or straining along with mild to moderate headaches.

If you experience any of these symptoms while wearing your glasses or contacts, it's likely time to schedule your next eye exam with an Optometrist at EyeCare Optical.

What causes farsightedness?

With normal vision, light passes through the cornea and is focused by the eye's natural lens onto the surface of the retina. When someone is farsighted, the eyeball is often too short from front to back or the cornea is too flat, resulting in the image of an object up close being focused behind the retina rather than on its surface (opposite of nearsightedness).

How is farsightedness treated?

Most farsighted people have good results with glasses or contact lenses that help to alter the way light enters their eyes. Depending on the degree of the farsightedness, correction may have to be worn all the time or only when better up-close vision is needed, like when reading or working at a computer. If your glasses or contacts prescription begins with a plus (+) symbol, that means you are farsighted.

Another treatment option for farsightedness is refractive surgery, which can reduce or eliminate the need for glasses or contacts. LASIK is an effective form of this procedure to treat farsightedness.

For extreme farsightedness, refractive surgery may not be the best option. In that case, your Ophthalmologist may suggest Refractive Lens Exchange (RLE) which permanently implants an intraocular lens (IOL) to correct the problem. In addition, corneal implants may be a future option to correct the vision in some cases.

Can farsightedness affect my eye health?

While farsightedness can become slightly worse as we age, it's very rarely progressive and serious. In most cases, farsightedness is considered simply an inconvenience that just requires glasses or contacts for clear vision.

What is the difference between farsightedness and presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a form of farsightedness that occurs solely due to age. As we get older, the natural lens of the eye becomes more rigid and much less flexible. This makes it more difficult to focus on objects close up. Presbyopia usually becomes noticeable around the early to mid-40s and progresses through the mid-60s. It affects almost all people by middle age.

Glaucoma is a classification of eye diseases that gradually “steals” the sight of those afflicted without warning or symptoms due to damage caused to the optic nerve – and often referred to as the “the silent thief of sight”. The nerve acts like an electric cable with over a million nerve fibers that are responsible for carrying the images we see to the brain.

Elevated eye pressure was once attributed as the main cause of damage to the optic nerve. Although eye pressure is definitely a risk factor, we now know that other factors are also involved because even people with “normal” IOP (intraocular pressure) can experience vision loss due to glaucoma.

Who is at risk for glaucoma?

Glaucoma can occur in anyone at any age. However, it's one of the leading causes of blindness in people over the age of 60. The chance of developing glaucoma increases if you are African-American or Hispanic; have a family member with glaucoma; are extremely nearsighted; over 35 years of age; have diabetes, hypertension, and/or any vascular diseases.

What are the different types of glaucoma?

Common types of glaucoma include primary open-angle glaucoma, angle-closure glaucoma, secondary glaucoma, normal-tension glaucoma, pigmentary glaucoma, and cataracts and glaucoma.

The most common form of glaucoma is primary open-angle glaucoma, which affects about three million Americans. It occurs when the eye's drainage canals become occluded over time. The IOP rises because the necessary amount of fluid is unable to drain from the eye. Most people have no symptoms or early warning signs. If open-angle glaucoma is not treated, it can cause gradual loss of vision. The condition develops slowly and sometimes without noticeable sight

loss for many years. Luckily, this type of glaucoma usually responds well to medication, especially if caught early and treated promptly.

How is glaucoma diagnosed and monitored?

Tonometry – used to measure eye pressure. A technician will use a special device that measures the IOP.

Ophthalmoscopy – used to examine the interior of the eye, especially the optic nerve. The doctor will examine the inside of the eye through the pupil by using a magnifying lens to look at the shape and color of the optic nerve to determine if there are any issues.

Perimetry – a test in which the patient is asked to keep looking straight ahead and then indicate when a moving light passes their peripheral (or side) vision. This helps to draw a “map” of your vision.

Gonioscopy – a painless eye test that specifically checks for open or closed-angle glaucoma.

Nerve Fiber Layer Analyzer – uses a computerized machine to take pictures of the nerve fiber layer. This test helps diagnose glaucoma and monitor treatment.

How Is Glaucoma Treated?

Medicines – Glaucoma is generally treated with eye drops and/or pills in some cases. To be most effective, glaucoma medications must be taken exactly as prescribed. Your doctor will discuss side effects when the medications are given.

Laser Surgery – Laser surgery is being more widely used as a first-line and adjunctive form of treatment. After the eye is numbed with drops, the laser beam is applied to the trabecular meshwork tissue. The procedure only takes a few minutes and helps improve the rate of drainage. If the laser surgery is successful, the need for additional eye drops or, possibly, even the need for current eye drops will be reduced.

Filtration Surgery – This is generally performed when medications and laser treatments fail to control the eye pressure. During this procedure, a new drainage channel is formed to allow fluid to drain from the eye. Your ophthalmologist will thoroughly discuss all aspects of the surgery with you.

Is there a cure for glaucoma?

There is no cure currently for Glaucoma. It is a chronic disease that must be treated for life. However, there is much happening in research that raises hope that a cure may be realized in our lifetime.

I'm over 50, should I get tested for glaucoma?

The macula is the small nerve layer near the center of the retina where images form. Although only the size of a pinhead, the macula is responsible for producing the clearest, most acute vision along with controlling most of our central field of vision. If the macula is damaged, central vision is lost but peripheral vision remains intact.

What is macular degeneration and what causes it?

Macular degeneration is a slowly progressive disease that causes reduction in central vision. In its early stages, the disease may have a minimal or unnoticeable effect on the vision. As it progresses, however, fine details become more difficult to see, especially when reading. Vision may begin to appear distorted, or parts of objects may appear to be missing. Macular degeneration is classified by two stages – dry and wet.

In the dry stage, a scar develops slowly over the macula resulting in decreased vision. In the wet stage, blood vessels grow under the retina and begin to leak, eventually causing a large scar and severe loss of vision. The leakage is not connected to watery eyes at all.

No pain is associated with macular degeneration, and the exact cause of the disease is unknown. A person's heredity, age, environment, and general health may all be factors. Recent studies indicate that ultraviolet radiation exposure, as well as certain deficiencies in vitamins and trace minerals, may affect macular degeneration. Smoking has been linked to wet macular degeneration, which is the more severe form of the disease.

Can macular degeneration be treated or cured?

Currently, there is no cure for macular degeneration. However, there are treatment options and many good ways to live with and even reduce the risk of vision loss. Recent advancements in treatment of macular degeneration involve intravitreal injections of specialized medications into

the eye to slow or halt the progression of the disease. This new retina treatment technology can save many patients' vision, whereas previously they did not have these options.

Many macular degeneration patients improve their vision by increasing the light and contrast in their surroundings, which can be accomplished with high energy light bulbs and amber or yellow tinted sunglasses. Sunglasses can also help decrease ultraviolet radiation. Certain vitamins and minerals, such as vitamins A, E, C, and zinc, have been used to slow the progression of macular degeneration. Surgery has become a more frequently used option. Research is also being conducted in the transplant of retinal tissue. Early detection of macular degeneration by self-monitoring with an Amsler grid and stopping smoking are the two most proven ways to decrease your risk of vision loss. An Amsler grid is a small chart with numerous straight lines that form a grid to help detect early changes in vision by the presence of distortion.

Does macular degeneration cause blindness?

Even in the most advanced cases, macular degeneration does not lead to blindness, but the central area of vision may be significantly decreased. Peripheral (or side) vision remains intact. In these cases, a specialist in the field of low vision can often help make maximum use of the remaining vision. The progression of macular degeneration as well as individual responses to treatment options are highly variable. Multiple laser treatments might be necessary.

Myopia, more commonly referred to as nearsightedness, is a common refractive condition affecting millions of people worldwide. In fact, 1 out of 3 people in the U.S. alone are nearsighted. People with this condition have trouble seeing objects at a distance clearly because the distance from the cornea (front of the eye) to the retina (back of the eye) is too long, which causes images to be focused in front of the retina rather than on it directly.

Traditional glasses and contact lenses have been the standard for successfully correcting myopia in adults and children for years, but more recent developments have proven especially effective at managing childhood myopia. Orthokeratology can slow the progression of myopia in children and even help lower the risk of more serious eye complications later in life.

Myopia Management with Orthokeratology FAQs

What is orthokeratology and how does it work?

Orthokeratology (ortho-k) involves the use of specially designed contact lenses to temporarily reshape the cornea and improve vision. Ortho-k lenses are generally worn overnight to gently and gradually reshape the cornea while you sleep, often resulting in clearer vision during waking hours. This can possibly eliminate the need for glasses or contact lenses for distance vision during the day. The special lenses need to be worn every night for optimal vision benefits. Ortho-k lenses can help slow the progression of myopia in childhood and ultimately lead to a lesser degree of it later in life.

How does ortho-k slow the progression of myopia for children?

The custom designed contact lenses reshape the cornea temporarily and provide the eye with a “stop” signal for eye growth in childhood. It’s that signal that essentially slows the progression of myopia and helps prevent myopia-related eye conditions later in life. Children can continue their myopia management treatment throughout their childhood and teenage years or until myopic progression has effectively slowed or stopped (if determined appropriate by your doctor). At that

time, there will be the option of continuing ortho-k, be fitted for single vision glasses or contact lenses, or possibly elect LASIK vision correction if the patient is 18 or older.

Why is myopia management with ortho-k important for children?

The younger a myopic child is often translates to them having a higher degree of myopia in adulthood. When there's a higher degree of myopia, there's typically a more increased risk for developing potentially serious complications, such as retinal holes, retinal detachments, glaucoma, macular degeneration, and earlier onset cataracts, among other conditions. That's due to the increased length of the eye stretching the ocular tissues in the back, like the retina. That's why myopia is best managed with early intervention. When performed and monitored by qualified eye care professionals, such as the ones at EyeCare Optical, ortho-k can foster a lower degree of myopia in adulthood and decrease the risks of sight-threatening complications.

Can adults benefit from ortho-k as well?

Yes, ortho-k can be very effective at treating nearsightedness in adults. Many people choose this treatment type over traditional correction methods as it allows them to be free of glasses or contacts throughout the day. Ortho-k is particularly an attractive option for active adults, especially those who regularly participate in water sports. It's important to note that ortho-k for adults only offers the vision correction aspect of myopia, however, not slowing its progression. That's because an adult's eyes have already reached full growth. Whether used for children or adults, myopia cannot be reversed with ortho-k.

What are the benefits of myopia management with ortho-k?

In addition to improving vision and lowering the risk of complications developing later on, ortho-k can provide the following sought-after perks:

- Less worry about glasses or contacts being lost or damaged
- More freedom for adults and children who are active
- Easy daily maintenance
- Less seasonal allergy discomfort and irritation

How fast will my vision improve with ortho-k?

Most patients who choose treatment with orthokeratology experience improved vision in only a few days. Some with lower levels of myopia have reported their vision corrected after the first night. That may take longer depending on the individual prescription, however. In general, your vision should begin gradually improving each day as the cornea is gently molded by the lenses at night. Most people notice their vision staying clearer for longer periods of time after the first 7 to 10 days.

Nearsightedness, also called myopia, is a common vision condition that often begins in childhood or young adulthood. It makes distant objects look blurry while close-up vision stays clear. Today, myopia affects millions of people, and experts predict that nearly half of the world's population could be nearsighted by the year 2050.

What are symptoms of nearsightedness?

A person who is nearsighted has difficulty seeing things at a distance clearly but is generally able to see well for close-up tasks or reading. In addition to blurry distance vision, other symptoms include squinting, eye strain, and mild to moderate headaches.

If you experience any of these symptoms while wearing your glasses or contacts, it may be time to schedule an eye exam with an Optometrist at EyeCare Optical at one of our six East Tennessee locations.

What causes nearsightedness?

Nearsightedness occurs if the eyeball is too long or the cornea is too curved. As a result, the light entering the eye is focused at a point in front of the retina rather than on its surface, causing distant objects to look blurred. The condition typically begins in childhood and stabilizes in early adulthood. However, sometimes it can progress with age.

How is nearsightedness treated?

Most people who are nearsighted can see well with glasses or contact lenses. Depending on how strong your prescription is, you may only need correction for certain activities such as driving, watching a movie, or seeing road signs, or you may choose to wear it all the time for clearer vision and comfort.

If you're nearsighted, your eyeglass or contact lens prescription will include a minus sign (–) in front of the number. The higher that number is, the stronger the prescription needed to help you see clearly at a distance.

Another popular treatment for nearsightedness is laser refractive surgery, which can reduce or even eliminate the need for glasses or contact lenses. At our affiliate, Campbell Cunningham Laser Center, the available laser vision correction procedures include LASIK and PRK.

For people with a high degree of nearsightedness or thinner-than-normal corneas, laser vision correction like LASIK may not be the best option. In these cases, lens-based procedures such as EVO ICL or Refractive Lens Exchange (RLE) may be recommended. EVO ICL places a specialized lens in the eye while keeping your natural lens intact, whereas RLE replaces the eye's natural lens with an artificial one. Both options work similarly to contact lenses – but without the daily maintenance – and can provide long-term vision correction when laser surgery isn't ideal. Both EVO ICL and RLE are also available procedures at Campbell Cunningham Laser Center.

Can nearsightedness affect the health of my eyes?

While nearsightedness can become slightly worse as we age, it's very rarely progressive and serious. In most cases, nearsightedness is simply considered a minor inconvenience that just requires glasses or contacts for clear vision.

In relatively rare cases, nearsightedness can be more severe and associated with long-term changes at the back of the eye, sometimes called degenerative or pathological myopia. This form can increase the risk of vision problems and is estimated to affect only a small percentage of people compared with typical myopia. It often begins in childhood and may run in families, although many factors – both genetic and environmental – play a role.

People with this condition experience rapid elongation of the eyeball, which leads to quick and drastic loss of vision. Sufferers also have significantly higher risk of retinal detachment or bleeding in the back of the eye due to abnormal growth of blood vessels. Degenerative myopia may also increase the risk of developing cataracts.

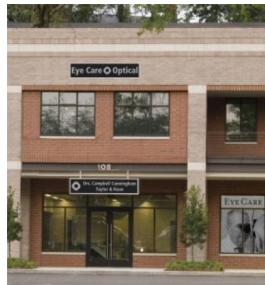

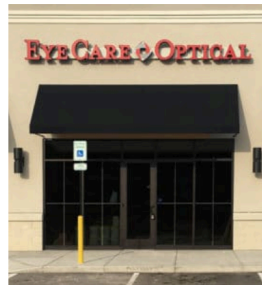

NOTICE OF PRIVACY PRACTICES

Body Content

This Notice describes how medical information about you may be used and disclosed and how you can get access to this information. Please review it carefully. You have the right to obtain a paper copy of this Notice upon request.

Patient Health Information

Under federal law, your patient health information is protected and confidential. Patient health information includes information about your symptoms, test results, diagnosis treatment, and related information. Your health information also includes payment, billing, and insurance information.

How We Use Your Patient Health Information

We use health information about you for treatment, to obtain payment, and for health care operations, including administrative purposes and evaluation of the quality of care that you receive. Under some circumstances, we may be required to use or disclose the information even without your permission.

Examples of Treatment, Patient, and Health

Care Operations

Treatment: We will use and disclose your health information to provide you with medical treatment or services. For example, nurses, physicians, and other members of your treatment team will record information in your record and use it to determine the most appropriate course of care. We may also disclose the information to other health care providers who are participating in your treatment, to pharmacists who are filling your prescriptions, and to family members who are helping with your care.

Payment: We will use and disclose your health information for payment purposes. For example. We may need to obtain authorization from your insurance company before providing certain types of treatment. We will submit bills and maintain records of payments from your health plan.

Health Care Operations: We will use and disclose your health information to conduct our standard internal operations, including proper administration of records, evaluation of the quality of treatment, and to assess the care and outcomes of your case and others like it.

Special Uses

We may use your information to contact you with appointment reminders. We may also contact you to provide information about treatment alternatives or other health-related benefits and services that may be of interest to you.

Other Uses and Disclosures

We may use or disclose identifiable health information about you for other reasons, even without your consent. Subject to certain requirements, we are permitted to give out health information without your permission for the following purposes:

Required by Law: We may be required by law to report gunshot wounds, suspected abuse or neglect, or similar injuries and events.

Research: We may use or disclose information for approved medical research.

Public Health Activities: As required by law, we may disclose vital statistics, diseases, information related to recalls of dangerous products, and similar information to public health authorities.

Health Oversight: We may be required to disclose information to assist in investigations and audits, eligibility for government programs, and similar activities.

Judicial and Administrative Proceedings: We may disclose information in response to an appropriate subpoena or court order.

Law Enforcement Purposes: Subject to Certain restrictions, we may disclose information required by law enforcement officials.

Deaths: We may report information regarding deaths to coroners, medical examiners, funeral directors. and organ donation agencies.

Serious Threat to Health or Safety: We may use and disclose information when necessary to prevent a serious threat to your health and safety or the health and safety of the public or another person.

Military and Special Government Functions: If you are a member of the armed forces, we may release information as required by military command authorities. We may also disclose information to correctional institutions or for national security purposes.

Workers Compensation: We may release information about you for workers compensation or similar programs providing benefits for work-related injuries or illness.

In any other situation, we will ask for your written authorization before using or disclosing any identifiable health information about you. If you choose to sign an authorization to disclose information, you can later revoke that authorization to stop any future uses and disclosures.

Individual Rights

You have the following rights with regard to your health information. Please contact the person listed below to obtain the appropriate form for exercising these rights.

Request Restrictions: You may request restrictions on certain uses and disclosures of your health information. We are not required to agree to such restrictions, but if we do agree, we must abide by those restrictions.

Confidential Communications: You may ask us to communicate with you confidentially by, for example, sending notices to a special address or not using postcards to remind you of appointments.

Inspect and Obtain Copies: In most cases, you have the right to look at or get a copy of your health information. There may be a small charge for the copies.

Amend Information: If you believe that information in your record is incorrect, or if important information is missing, you have the right to request that we correct the existing information or add the missing information.

Accounting of Disclosures: You may request a list of instances where we have disclosed health information about you for reasons other than treatment, payment, or health care operations.

Our Legal Duty

We are required by law to protect and maintain the privacy of your health information, to provide this Notice about our legal duties and privacy practices regarding protected health information, and to abide by the terms of the Notice currently in effect.

Changes in Privacy Practices

We may change our policies at any time. Before we make a significant change in our policies, we will change our Notice and post the new Notice in the waiting area and each examination room. You can also request a copy of our Notice at any time. For more information about our privacy practices, contact the person listed below.

Complaints

If you are concerned that we have violated your privacy rights, or if you disagree with a decision we made about your records, you may contact the person listed below. You also may send a written complaint to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The person listed below will provide you with the appropriate address upon request. You will not be penalized in any way for filing a complaint.

This notice describes how medical information about you may be used and disclosed and how you can get access to this information. Please review it carefully.

Your Rights

Get an electronic or paper copy of your medical record

- You can ask to see or get an electronic or paper copy of your medical record and other health information we have about you. Ask us how to do this.
- We will provide a copy or a summary of your health information, usually within 30 days of your request. We may charge a reasonable, cost-based fee.

Ask us to correct your medical record

- You can ask us to correct health information about you that you think is incorrect or incomplete. Ask us how to do this.
- We may say “no” to your request, but we will tell you why in writing within 60 days.

Request confidential communications

- You can ask us to contact you in a specific way, for example, home or office phone, or to send mail to a different address.
- We will say “yes” to all reasonable requests.

Ask us to limit what we use or share

- You can ask us not to use or share certain health information for treatment, payment or our operations.
- We are not required to agree to your request, and we may say “no” if it would affect your care.
- If you pay for a service or health care item out-of-pocket in full, you can ask us not to share that information for the purpose of payment or our operations with your health insurer.
- We will say “yes” unless a law requires us to share that information.

- Where required by applicable law, we obtain individuals' consent for storing and receiving information collected via technologies such as cookies and pixels to keep track of your activities on our website.

Get a list of those with whom we have shared information

- You can ask for a list or accounting of the times we have shared your health information for six years prior to the date you ask, who we shared it with, and why.
- We will include all the disclosures except for those about treatment, payment and health care operations and certain other disclosures, such as any you asked us to make.

Get a copy of this privacy notice

- You can ask for a paper copy of this notice at any time, even if you have agreed to receive the notice electronically. We will provide you with a paper copy promptly.

Choose someone to act for you

- If you have given someone medical power of attorney or if someone is your legal guardian, that person can exercise your rights and make choices about your health information.
- We will make sure the person has this authority and can act for you before we take any action.

File a complaint if you feel your rights are violated

- You can complain if you feel we have violated your rights by contacting us using the information at the top of this page.
- You can file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office for Civil Rights by sending a letter to 200 Independence Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20201, calling 1-877-696-6775 or visiting hhs.gov/ocr/privacy/hipaa/complaints/.
- We will not retaliate against you for filing a complaint.

Your Choices

For certain health information, you can tell us your choices about what we share. If you have a clear preference for how we share your information in the situations described below, talk to us. Tell us what you want us to do, and we will follow your instructions.

In these cases, you have both the right and choice to tell us to:

- Share information with your family, close friends or others involved in your care
- Share information in a disaster relief situation
- Contact you for fundraising efforts
- If you are not able to tell us your preference, for example if you are unconscious, we may go ahead and share your information if we believe it is in your best interest. We may also

share your information when need to lessen a serious and imminent threat to health or safety.

In these cases we never share your information unless you give us written permission:

- Marketing purposes
- Share information in a disaster relief situation
- Sale of your information
- Most sharing of psychotherapy notes

In the case of fundraising:

- We may contact you for fundraising efforts, but you can tell us not to contact you again.

Our Uses and Disclosures

How do we typically use or share your health information? We typically use or share your health information in the following ways:

Treat you

- We may contact you for fundraising efforts, but you can tell us not to contact you again.
- Example: A doctor treating you for an injury asks another doctor about your overall health condition

Run our organization

- We can use and share your health information to run our practice, improve your care, and contact you when necessary
- Example: We use health information about you to manage your treatment and services

Bill for your services

- We can use and share your health information to bill and get payment from health plans or other entities.
- Example: We give information about you to your health insurance plan so it will pay for your services.

How else can we use or share your health information? We are allowed or required to share your information in other ways – usually in ways that contribute to the public good, such as public health and research. We have to meet many conditions in the law before we can share your information for these purposes. For more information see:

Help with public health and safety issues

- We can share health information about you for certain situations such as:

- Preventing disease
- Helping with product recalls
- Reporting adverse reactions to medications
- Reporting suspected abuse, neglect or domestic violence
- Preventing or reducing a serious threat to anyone's health or safety

Do research

- We can use or share your information for health research.

Comply with the law

- We will share information about you if state or federal laws require it, including with the Department of Health and Human Services if it wants to see that we are complying with federal privacy law.

Respond to organ and tissue donation requests

- We can share health information about you with organ procurement organizations

Work with a medical examiner or funeral director

- We can share health information with a coroner, medical examiner or funeral director when an individual dies.

Address workers' compensation, law enforcement and other government requests

- We can use or share health information about you:
 - For workers' compensation claims
 - For law enforcement purposes or with a law enforcement official
 - With health oversight agencies for activities authorized by law
 - For special government functions such as military, national security and presidential protective services

Respond to lawsuits and legal actions

- We can share health information about you in response to a court or administrative order or in response to a subpoena

Our Responsibilities

We are required by law to maintain the privacy and security of your protected health information.

We will let you know promptly if a breach occurs that may have compromised the privacy or security of your information.

We must follow the duties and privacy practices described in this notice and give you a copy of it.

We will not use or share your information other than as described here unless you tell us we can in writing. If you tell us we can, you may change your mind at any time. Let us know in writing if you change your mind.

Changes to the Terms of this Notice

We can change the terms of this notice, and the changes will apply to all information we have about you. The new notice will be available upon request in our office and on our web site.
