

Subject: English - Communication Skills

Grade level: Grade 3

Topic: Verbal and Nonverbal Communication

Learning Objectives:

1. Students will be able to identify different types of communication
2. Students will be able to demonstrate effective verbal and nonverbal communication skills
3. Students will be able to apply their communication skills in different contexts

Materials:

Examples of verbal and nonverbal communication

Whiteboard and markers

Communication worksheets or graphic organizers

Reference materials (such as a communication book or chart)

Procedure:

Introduction:

Begin the lesson by asking the students what communication is and why it is important in our daily lives.

Explain that communication is the act of exchanging information, ideas, and feelings between people through various means.

Introduce the concept of verbal and nonverbal communication and provide examples of each.

Instruction:

Display examples of verbal and nonverbal communication on the board or projector.
