What is this?

I am currently in the process of revisiting all the **Tarot of Plants** work I've created in the last decade and bringing it into (yet) another form.

I'm doing a deep dive into tarot meanings, plants and their connection to each other in order to prep for writing the final version of this guidebook. But because i get so many questions on why i connected a certain plant to a specific card i thought it might be helpful for you, dear human, to have access to this information in the meantime.

this information is not set in stone

this is a google doc so it will change and transform over time. information may become more or less coherent. parts may be missing and then added in, and parts that never quite fit in the first place may be let go. I dump a lot of webpages that seem like they might have promising tidbits to go back and reference later. sometimes i pull out text from sources to fact check my own writing, and sometimes i use it so i can begin to write.

this is quite a personal phase of the writing process, and as i invite you in, remember **you are witnessing something that isn't done unfolding...**

So are there Card Meanings here?

yes and no.

this the **working file** for a future guidebook. so if the meaning you're looking for is written and complete, you'll probably find what you're looking for. if it's a card i'm still in the process of working on— the information you're looking for might be a little more loose. there can be disjointed and unfinished sentences. lots of links but no writing. a sentence that just reads "i wish i knew more about this plant." Some cards I haven't even gotten to at all so they're not available yet, and you won't find a meaning for those— yet.

i am actively working on this so check back and see what is new. this is a living, breathing document that i will be dabbling away at for the next few months.

every story has a beginning. a starting point a place where something spontaneously becomes something. reality is complex, but we need a simple staring point. everything has a beginning. everything has a point where life becomes infused. and while complexities inherently build, and acknowledgements of events happening before this "start" point float into our peripheries—we're not at that moment yet. for now we are clearly, and solidly in the present. a state of being that is interlocked with the small sliver of time that is now.

that is the realm that the Fool begins in : card number 0 in the Tarot. it is the start of a story. the start of an adventure. a place where we are invited to let the sun hit our face and exist in a forward motion. the exact direction we're going in is still to be determined. but that's not the point is we're moving.

and much like the Fool, the Dandelion is a plant that marks the beginning of something coming to life after a period of quiet rest. Dandelions show their sunny faces when the warmth of Spring is clearly in the air. They put on a much needed show of life after a season of stillness. There is a cheeriness that we can feel within ourselves when we see it's yellow blooms—an impressive feat for something we humans love to label as a weed. But Dandelion wasn't always an America's Most Wanted villain. It arose as a friend and a caretaker long before it's rebranding as a nuisance.

PLANT NOTES

- Ghost pipe is a plant that doesn't produce its own chlorophyll. It actually connects with other plants through the mycelial network and receives what it needs to survive through that. Connecting with others and mutual aid is how the Ghost Pipe survives.
- It is a rare plant, only appearing for a moment, and then goo-i-ly turns to black mush and returns to the forest floor. Oftentimes folks will mistake this fleshy plant for a mushroombut if you look into it's little cupped face you can see a flower. But it does resemble the being it gains help from. A plant-mushroom hybrid in a kinda way.
- Ghost Pipe belongs to the heather family of plants, which also means it prefers the acidic forests of the east and northwest.
- Ghost Pipe is rare, so best to not wildcraft it. However it has been used from time to time as a powerful nervine for PTSD or intense nerve pain. It is a plant that should only be used at last resort and harvested ethically. It is also one that is a poison if taken at too high a dose another warning to use this medicine wisely. However it is one of the only plants that does the trick for these very specific and deep-rooted nervous system based pains.
- So Ghost Pipe reminds ourselves that in the heart of darkness we do hold the medicine
 within ourselves to heal. We can ask for support from our community we are
 interconnected with. We are unafraid of darkness and decomposition. In fact we call
 upon these powers in order to survive.

CARD NOTES

- This little ephemeral pairing is one of my favorite. It offers some light in the midst of this really dark card.
- The ten of swords is the end of our adventure in this suit and it seems to find us in a place of rock bottom. In the Smith-Rider-Waite illustrations it shows a body on the ground with ten swords poking from his back. This person has been defeated, back stabbed, is left for dead, and it is time to move on.
- Sometimes the end of a storyline in our own lives doesn't have a happy ending. Sometimes things are just over, and there is some silver lining to that you don't have to deal with this pain and suffering anymore. It is only up from here.
- Just like the death card, this isn't telling us death is the solution. Or that death is even the end of the road. But all this pain will soon be over that's what the ten of Swords reminds us. This is the ending of one chapter and moving to the next. We can feel relief in this loss. And the ten of swords points no fingers towards anyone being at fault: sometimes life is painful and that's just a part of it. That's something I find reassuring of this card it shows you things just suck sometimes and the only thing you can do is wrap up and move on.
