They worked everything together, chemistry grew, traveled the roads together, and Gus was even the best man at Hector's wedding. Officially hanging up the boots in two-thousand and five though, the two thought they had a decent run. Not hall of fame worthy, but they made well enough to retire. Gus had gone to open a gym, "Suplex Athletics" while Hector had gone to open a wrestling school to prepare the next generation of talents. They looked like they could have bridged the gap into their twilight, or at least that was the plan. But life never goes according to plan because before you know it, rents increase, inflation happens, and global pandemics destroy your post-career plans...
