- *In a certain way, poverty may be more realistic in the morning, when you wake up to it. At night, a version of optimism can take hold, perhaps aided by drink.
- *Embarrassment is an underrated motivator of social change. There are certainly considerations about morals or self-interest, but for the most part a prejudiced society changes its ways because its embarrassing to reveal the truth to those on the outside.
- *It's hard to fear anything from a conventional, mundane person. You certainly can't expect surprises. But this makes them harder to rally behind a new cause or idea.
- *A good way to learn about how you've spent time is to look back and ask did I say anything worth saying? Do anything worth doing?
- *It's a very lonely feeling to know you don't want to be at home when the phone doesn't ring.
- *It's pretty easy to do the ugly things in protest throw a brick, smash a window, or devise a new type of improvised bomb. It's easy because it requires very little imagination.
- *Sympathy and empathy are important qualities to develop because they demand imagination, perhaps one of the singular human qualities.
- *People end up dealing with repossession because the only way to feel better about not being able to afford to buy things is to buy things.
- *A great bouncer trick is to just grab someone by the skin near the belly as hard as you can.
- *People will pay very close attention to someone else's vote of no confidence, and give it extra weight to calculate their own self-worth.
- *People with unusual names are often unamused with jokes at their expense.
- *A violent place always has the simple version of local history people killing other people.
- *People aren't very good at relating to economically depressed areas, unless they personally know someone who lost a job.
- *The dead are often easy to love.
- *People on the outside sometimes struggle to see the differences that are so obvious to those embroiled in conflict. Indeed, in most places long-running disputes are defined by characteristics that have slowly blended and melted together over time.
