Course Description

This is an introductory course on formal logic. You might think to yourself, “Hey I’m very logical. This course will be a breeze.” If you’re thinking this, just know that there are many who failed this course thinking the same thought.

This course is very similar to a math course. Yeah, I know it satisfies a humanities requirement. You might have registered thinking you could BS your way through it like other philosophy or religion courses. There is no possible way to BS this course. This class is about learning how to use an abstract formal language in order to model and understand how reasoning works.
