Purpose: Provide a responsive library collection and space to support the varied lifelong learning and leisure needs of the Shir Tikvah community.

Deliverables for 2023:

- 1. Review backlog of donations
- 2. Plan for new acquisitions
- 3. Create topical reading lists
 - a. Recommendations for holidays, themes Shavuot is coming!
 - b. Queer and trans materials
 - c. Reading lists for teens
- 4. Collaborate with Rabbi Joey on book-based chavurot.
- 5. Hold time and space for the Shir Tikvah community to have unstructured, unprogrammed time in the library, while providing volunteer support
- 6. Work with leadership to request speakers to donate a copy of any books they might have published to the library
- 7. Re-establish communications with Adult Ed committee
- 8. Reach out to Forrest and JAMI teachers to navigate the library, bring classes into the library
- 9. Research interest in adding low-tech, low cost maker-space materials

Responsibilities:

- Hold regular volunteer-facilitated open hours in the library. Tentative schedule:: Sunday mornings 9:30-11:30 AM and Wednesday evenings 6:30-8 pm during the academic year; every other Sunday morning June-August 2023
- Assign individuals to take on tasks such as ordering new books and create reading lists, catalog new materials, withdraw materials

Expected Time Commitment: Committee members meet in person roughly 2-3 times a year to check in and plan our work. Depending on interests and availability, folks usually volunteer for about 2-3 hours roughly every couple of weeks on-site to handle basic collection management like checking books in and reshelving, processing donations and new acquisitions, etc. Depending on interests and availability, individual volunteers may also champion programs such as reading groups, outreach to the adult and youth education programming, or connections with the Torah study folks.
