Suggestions:

- 1) Survey parents to determine access to devices and WiFi at home.
- 2) Survey educators to determine level of understanding and comfort with technology tools for online learning / eLearning.
- 3) Determine technology tools to use & that can be supported by the school - five familiar tools that provide a wide range of support
- 4) Support teachers in developing at least a two week plan for remote / eLearning
 - a) Include various elements within the plans and utilize different digital tools and platforms if needed
 - b) Each unit should be able to be completed without the requirement of technology (remote learning) however enhanced through the use of digital tools & online learning platforms such as those below.
 - c) Inquire with and recruit your school and community libraries for supporting texts and literature.
 - d) Include your technology directors and IT support teams with any new devices, digital tools or technology needs
 - e) Keep in mind parent & guardian needs - create flexible schedules and completion dates if adults are required to assist in learning
