Storm of Steel by Ernst Junger

Based on Junger's Wartime diaries. The book is unique because, while he did see heavy fighting throughout the entire war, Junger still saw the war as a positive experience.

Memoirs of George Sherston by Siegfried Sassoon

A fictionalized version of Sassoon's life. It starts off with him growing up in England, then follows him into the war and follows his experience there.

<u>Company K</u> by William March

March's *Company K* takes an interesting narrative structure. Instead of having a single narrator, the book presents 113 vignettes from the different soldiers of the eponymous company. It was based on March's wartime experiences.

Not So Quiet by Helen Z. Smith

Initially tasked with writing a parody of *All Quiet on the Western Front*, the author instead wrote a semi-biographical piece based on the wartime diaries of ambulance driver Winifred Young. It is considered a classic of feminist fiction. One of my (/u/TFielding38) favorite books. *All Quiet on The Western Front* by Erich Maria Remarque

The classic of WWI fiction, was banned in Nazi Germany for being very Anti War. Testament of Youth by Vera Brittain

This was the Autobiography of Brittain, who served as a nurse for much of the war. She also lost her Fiance, brother, and several close friends.

Goodbye to All That by Robert Graves

The autobiography of Robert Graves, it details the time he spent serving in the Royal Welch Fusiliers. He took part in the Battle of Loos and the Somme before he was wounded in action on 20 July 1916.

A Farewell to Arms by Ernest Hemingway

About an Ambulance driver during the war

**Birdsong** by Sebastian Faulks

A Novel that tells the story of a man before and during the war, along with his granddaughter in the 1970's

The Good Soldier Svejk by Jaroslav Hasek

An unfinished dark comedy novel about a Czech soldier during the war. It is based on the Authors experience during the war. He died in 1923 of Heart Failure

Journey's End by RC Sherriff

A three act play about a few officers in the days preceding Operation Michael, a large German Offensive. All the action takes place in the officer's dugout, and as such, is a dialogue driven play. It was adapted into the film *Ace's High*.
