N.B. All of Josephina's books appear well-researched, however their evidence is highly selective and the arguments a tad flimsy to say the least.

'Letters to the Prophet' (1833) - out of print

A collection of Josephina's letters to the Prophet about blood superiority or complaining about muggles. Includes a 10 page essay on the dangers of telegraphs, a 1000 word rant on the growing use of chloroform, and a rather haughty foreword.

'Memoirs of Josephina Flint' (1840) - out of print

Written to as guidance for young ladies. Was stocked by most bookshops, however didn't sell well and most copies were brought by her husband for fire kindling.

- Given as gift to every female relation of Josephina's for Christmas 1840

'The Incompatibility of the species' (1865)

'Research' into how mixing magical and muggle blood creates stupid children, which was surprisingly successful

'The muggle interference: Our greatest threat' (1868)

Sequel to the above. Josephina's first best-seller.

Expands on her theory of magic being affected by muggle telegraph poles and other muggle inventions. Blames chloroform, along with other muggle inventions, for causing squib births.

'The Premises of Purity and Other Essays' (1877)

Published two months after magic was discovered, sold out immediately. Basically a compilation of letters, essays and articles Josephina has written about blood purity etc.

'The Veela Problem' (1885)

A two-tome publication summarising the historical threat veela have posed throughout history, the moral implications and the biological ones, namely tainting the bloodline/creating generations of promiscuous spawn/causing a complete moral breakdown of society. Summarises with a 15th century account of a veela hunt with clear implications.

'The Integrity of Blood' (1885)

A short book about the supposed ill-effects of mixing muggle and magical blood, including halfbloods being more susceptible to insanity, spontaneous combustion and being eaten by dragons. Includes an eight-page list of the advantages pure

blood contains, and heavily implies muggleborns are all part of a muggle conspiracy and are engineered in a lab or something by the government.

'The History of Purity' (1885)

A very selective history of magic, designed to prove the natural superiority of pure blood. Particular emphasis on an Ancient Egyptian Pureblooded cult, the practice of muggle-hunting and the need for separatism from muggles. Given to all members of Black's for Christmas 1885.

'Threatened from within' (1885)

A short book, heavily suggests blood traitors and muggleborns are in league with a muggle organisation plotting to kill all wizards or enslave them and harness their powers for their own good. Uses highly selective evidence. Given to all members of Black's and The Lady Morgana for Christmas 1885.

'Excellence of Blood' (1885)

An 'educational' pamphlet book written for younger women/mothers basically trying to persuade them that all marriages to non-purebloods are cursed to be unhappy and to produce deformed/murderous/squib children, and that pureblooded marriages can avoid all that.

'A Wizard's first Alphabet' (1886)

An illustrated children's book, because it's never too early to press the importance of blood purity. Includes revised fairytales, nursery rhymes, and a magical themed alphabet, from 'A is for Abbott' and 'B is for Blood-traitor' to 'Y is for Yaxley' and 'Z is for Zealous Purity'. Copy given to all students at The Flint Institute

'Stature and Magical Stunting' (1886)

A massive middle finger to Barney. Claims short wizards haven't grown to their full potential and thus their magic is also stunted. Links short stature and weak magic to men being scared of women, to try and shame those in favour of banning women from duelling/whatever.
