Week 7-Fiction Focus: Inferences/Conclusions/Theme & Word Work Focus: Snap Words, Contractions

We can use story clues and our own experiences to help us understand story events/situations and characters/people. As we are reading, we can make inferences and draw conclusions to help us figure out a theme/lesson from what we read.

- Inference: text clues (it says...) + prior knowledge (what I know...) = inference (so I think...)
- Conclusion: an opinion or judgement that is formed by using multiple inferences
- Theme/Lesson: stories have common themes and can help the reader learn life lessons

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Monday	 Read the passage, The Ant and the Grasshopper. As you are reading, think about Grasshopper and complete the chart below the passage. Practice this week's Snap Words by doing the following: Read it!, Study it!, Spell it! Cover, Write and Check It! Use/say it in a sentence! (This week's Snap Words: several, begin, before, great, either, excited, while, old, usually) 	
Tuesday	 Reread the passage, The Ant and the Grasshopper. Pretend to be Grasshopper. Write a note to Ant, explaining the lesson that you learned and how it will help you. Contractions are made when two words are joined and one or more letters are replaced with an apostrophe. (ex. do not = don't, she will = she'll, he is = he's, I have = I've) How many contractions can you find in the passage, The Ant and the Grasshopper?	
Wednesday	 Read or listen to a fiction book. As you are reading, think and share! What inferences can you make based on what a character does, says, thinks? What conclusion can you drawwhat kind of character/person talks and acts like this? What theme/lesson can you learn from this story? Practice this week's Snap Words by doing the following: Chant It!, Write It! Take a Mind Picture!, Sing and Clap It! (If a word is challenging for youfigure out the hard part, think of a trick to help you remember it and write the word over and over.) 	
Thursday	 Read the passage, The Elephant and the Ape. As you are reading, think about Ty, Bo and Li and and the theme/lesson that you can learn from them. Talk about it with a family member. Write a note to Li, explaining what lesson you learned and how it will help you in life. Find the underlined words in the passage. Change the words into contractions. Write sentences using the contractions. 	
Friday Kim Be Kind! Use your Imagination! Make good choices!	 Read the passage, Panda and Tiger. As you are reading, think about Panda and Tiger and the theme/lesson that you can learn from them. Talk about it with a family member. We've learned a lot from our characters this week! What can others learn from you? "Sadly, music does not fill one's belly," Grasshopper sighed.

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
