Course Description:

The medieval and Renaissance origins of modern science covered by studying the history of alchemy. Emphasis on practical aspects of alchemy's origins, performance and the goals of its practice along with the Islamic, Jewish and Christian components of alchemical philosophy and its contribution to science.

Course Objectives:

Students will become familiar with the history of alchemy and the origins of modern science particularly chemistry. Students will read original alchemical texts as well as current scholarly works. Students will show their proficiency through a series of examinations and research papers.

CSLOs: This course addresses these important student outcomes.

CSLO1: Demonstrate basic standards of historical literacy and perspective.

CSLO2: Articulate an interpretive framework of the complex and interrelated causes, courses, and consequences of historical events.

CSLO3: Perform sophisticated skills in examining, exploring, comparing, and critiquing a variety of sources and viewpoints: written, non-verbal, artistic, symbolic.

CSLO4: Critically and comparatively analyze individual cultures within national, regional and global contexts.

CSLO5: Demonstrate well-developed written and verbal skills in dissecting and creating

nuanced analyses of historical events and historiographical interpretations of those events.

Quick Guide for writing the research Papers:

Note: Make sure you are present for the class (either second or third week) in which the writing assignments will be discussed in detail. Your grade depends upon it. All papers are to be typed, double spaced and follow Chicago Manual of Style formatting for college term papers with footnotes *not* parenthetical citations. Use 12 pt type and simple type face. No artwork is required except if you create an original chart or graph to illustrate your argument. However, you MUST have a bibliography of at least ten (10) sources for the longer research paper (internet sources can be used but do not count towards the ten mandatory sources, see class discussion).

Make sure your paper has a thesis/argument.

No papers may not be turned in electronically!

Plagiarism: a very serious offence, this is taking someone else's work—like downloading something from Wikipedia, and claiming it as your own writing. If you do this, you fail the course. See the Kean homepage for details.
