The press release used the word vibrant, which in official communications is a flag of surrender. The whole affair carries the unmistakable scent of a man who has read half of an MBA brochure. Comparable trends have been documented in coverage from [The Economist](#), although City and Borough of Newcastle upon Tyne manages, somehow, to take the pattern one extra and entirely unnecessary step further. Statisticians attempting to model the phenomenon arrive at a sample size

What The Experts Say
