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## Nimu Valley, Ladakh



Nimu (also spelled Nimo or Nyemo) Valley is a picturesque and culturally significant region located in the union territory of Ladakh in northern India. Nestled at an altitude of approximately 3,140 meters (10,300 feet), Nimu is situated about 35 kilometers west of Leh, the capital of Ladakh.
