<p><u>Introduction to the Ceramics Course</u></p>	<p>Combines the visual arts foundational element of form with an introduction to ceramic artwork to guide students in a successful understanding and exploration of creating ceramic artwork as well as the use, function and decorative aspects of ceramics through societies and cultures.</p>
<p><u>Understanding Three Dimension</u></p>	<p>Focuses on guiding the students to understand and apply the Element of Art, form, in relation to three dimensional artwork and sculpture relative to creating forms and understanding three dimension purpose and function throughout art.</p>
<p><u>Clay Bodies, Glaze and Firing</u></p>	<p>Focuses on understanding the use, function and technical skill of tools needed in the ceramic making process.</p>
<p><u>Overview of Handbuilding Techniques</u></p>	<p>Combines the foundations of form and three dimensions with an understanding of ceramics in the technical and creative process.</p>
<p><u>Exploring Functional and Decorative Ceramics</u></p>	<p>Focuses on an exploration of function and decorative ceramic use and expression while creating ceramic artwork.</p>
<p><u>Exploring and Expanding on Techniques</u></p>	<p>Explores and expands on the creative and technical art making process in ceramics through personal expression and original ideas.</p>
