

Simile: making a comparison between two unlike things using "like" or "as."

Metaphor: making a direct comparison between two unlike things without using "like" or "as."

Personification: giving human traits to non-human things.

Hyperbole: extreme exaggeration for effect.

Onomatopoeia: sound words (buzz, crash, bang, etc.)

Alliteration: repeating consonant sounds at the beginning of a word.

Oh, how I love to bake a scrumptious chocolate cake.





Idioms

An **idiom** is a figurative phrase that has a meaning outside of the literal meaning. Different languages and cultures have different idioms. Idioms can cause a lot of confusion if you don't understand that they are figurative language!

Terms to Know

A <u>stereotype</u> is an oversimplified idea about a group of people (how they should look, act, or be).
Stereotypes can be positive or negative.

EX: All people with glasses are super smart.

A <u>bias</u> is an unfair belief about a group based on a stereotype.

EX: If a company only hires people with glasses, they show a bias towards the stereotype that all people with glasses are super smart.

Think About It




