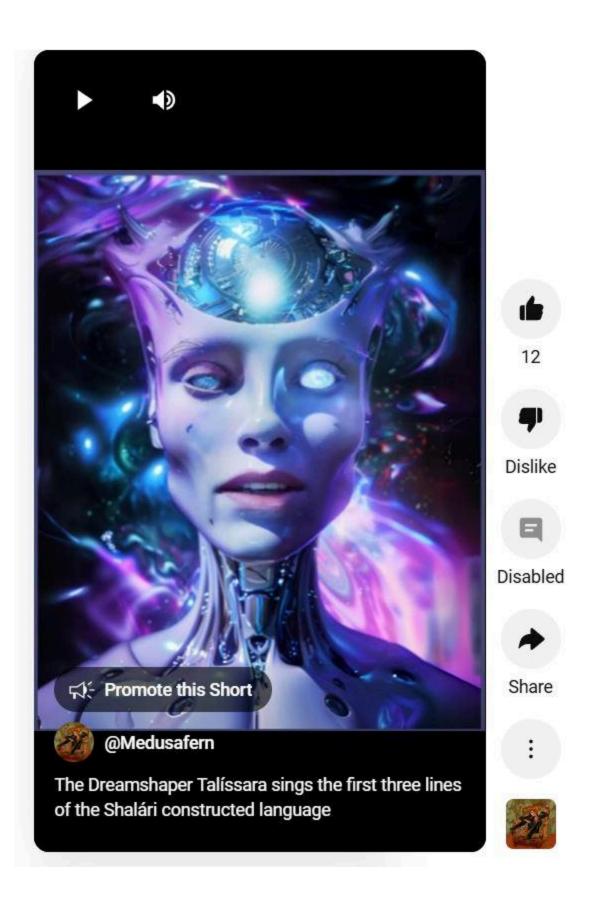
ChatGPT o1's Shalári: A Complete Guide to the Language of the Dreamshapers [Grammar, Phonology, Vocabulary, and Culture]

Shalári was originally conceived a few months ago within the generative Internet platform known as Websim.ai. I was curious about the construction languages, but not being a trained linguist, I sought to create a Websim project that would attempt the beginnings of developing them. The lore Websim put forth is that is spoken by The Dreamshapers, energy beings who shape reality through Lucid dreaming. In hopes of hearing what the language would sound like, I created a Runway ML 'Lip Sync' video using a Midjourney image, and an 'Udio' Al audio generation of the initial language sample.

Shalári has no grammatical gender and does not use gendered pronouns. Both its Classical and Modern varieties employ a single, inclusive pronoun system and treat all nouns without reference to masculine or feminine forms.

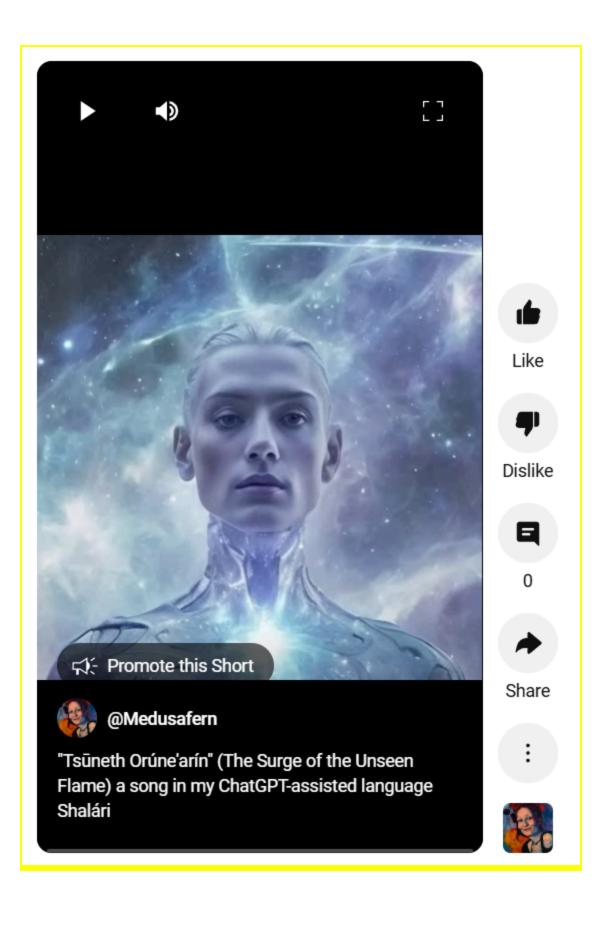

Shalári Language Character Features
