What are you most proud of from your local climate action campaigning?	<p>Enfield - launched 2020 then got overtaken by Covid. Low income area. As a group, struggled to build relationship because roles in the Council haven't been centralised in terms of climate. Unsure whether to be confrontational or encouraging those who are sympathetic. Lots of local things happening like food group, etc. No communication from Borough - no newsletters about climate eg. Traffic reduction was included but, parking reductions cause a lot of controversy. Don't know. Controversy whether campaigning brings conflict. Prob. is Council is fragmented on climate.</p> <p>York - new group. Just a year. Good relationship with Council. CE declared 8 yrs ago. Now labour. Most proud of action this week - invited four of the Council leads and have 50 people coming and are invited to ask questions. Being held next week. Those councillors very approachable. There are staff for climate functions and there is a CE manager. There's a climate newsletter - monthly. More about talk than pushing an agenda. Positive place. Difficulty is the complexity of processes. Some of the great things in the Plan 'now require some funding' so they are more intentional than action. Councils so strapped for cash</p>

Climate Action Plan yr ago. 5 themes each with comm. Councils. FOEs on each. Prob. with active travel - pushback Asked 5 leads of work groups to come to next meeting</p>

It's going to be big!</p> <p>Amble, Northumberland: continue to extend Green Hub membership</p> <p>Enfield - not sure what our next step is. Like idea of liaising with councillors. Don't know whether to campaign because of tendency to polarise or whether to be supportive. Difficultly is that climate is spread over so many staff - no clear people to target. The climate manager has no authority and has to stand in the queue. Need to network, go gently and be friendly. So struggling with what</p>

	<p>the right approach is. And very strapped for cash.</p> <p>York - much of what is said (Enfield) is familiar. Working groups set up - like Calderdale - not sure where they're going apart from discussions. Not sure of their approach either - 'campaign' isn't quite right for this work. Key is can we get in the room with decision makers - have been successful at that. Although a recent meeting with an MP - he took umbridge at what he thought was being said. The big question meeting coming up next week, will invite people to the next FoE group meeting to ask them what issues they want to push forward with. One campaign - no weed-killer on our streets - and we'll look after the weeds. FoE might try to host a meeting with various parties to facilitate this discussion.</p>
What is one thing you plan to do with your group as a next step for your campaign?	<p>TW: increasing engagement with the council. First ever Lib Dem council and MP! Sadly lost a really engaged councillor. MP has pledged support for Climate & Nature Bill</p> <p>Hull: raise awareness and use leverage of Hull Green Fair and inaugural Youth Environment Conference to ramp up engagement.</p> <p>Amble: Getting support from new Northumberland Wildlife Trust officer and collaborate with other groups and gain MP support</p>

Hard to have a direct effect as a local group.</p> <p>Hull: Often feel overwhelmed by the amount of big issues in the area, including Drax, BECCS, Pensana Fuels West Newton fracking, Humber Freeport and East Coast cluster, to name a few.</p> <p>Sue: Bit of a difference of views as to whether an info network or campaigners. Hard not to get into political realm.</p>

	<p>But frustrated that longterm campaign to stop airport expansion having no effect.</p> <p>Loggerheads with Council. Council waiting for tech fix eg EVs. Setting 2050 as target.</p> <p>I did find the working with the minorities difficult.</p>
What have you learnt from this?	<p>Set objectives - have clear objectives May have to rely on new leadership. Climate and Nature coalition is beneficial - something for everyone! Individuals can make a difference.</p> <p>Hull: A lot about positive engagement!</p> <p>Sue: has started a 'Greener Amble' group. Hoping to develop ways to push the climate agenda but need to take people along gently.</p> <p>Learnt to have different expectations.</p>

What are you most proud of from your local climate action campaigning?	<p>T + R/T - have kept going for years (since 2008 at least) and built up good relationships with councilors and officers. Both have Climate Emergency Plans and target of Net Zero by 2041 and 2043. Commitment to divestment of pension fund</p> <p>D has formed a good local network since 2019. Good submission on minerals plans thanks to grant from FoE to employ expert.</p>
What have you found difficult?	<p>T - Council's lack of resources. Sadiq Khan now more reluctant to act at Londonwide level. Need for action on private rented sector. Lack of relevant buildings skills and training.</p> <p>D - lack of resources, no climate emergency, no climate plans, no targets. Two tiers of local authorities and a lot of meetings to engage in.</p> <p>R/T - Plan in no way sets actions that would meet the 2043 target - must act to ensure all properties get off gas as 70% of local CO2 emissions are from buildings. Londonwide target of Net Zero by 2030 is impossible.</p>
What have you learnt from this?	<p>All - it's a long haul!</p> <p>R/T - have brought in people in the industry to talk to councillors and officers as they have more credibility and expertise.</p>

What have you found difficult?	<p>Cement and lime production in Derbyshire dominates emissions.</p> <p>Hillingdon has lost its dedicated Climate Change officer and now the role is just part of somebody's job.</p> <p>Hillingdon is a Tory council run by climate sceptics that is likely to water down its Plan.</p> <p>Not planning, not found practical ways of doing.</p> <p>Hard for councils to exert influence over non-council emissions in their area</p>
What have you learnt from this?	<p>Need to determine what they should be doing not let down UK plc (actions that should be taken that are proxies for achieving emissions reductions e.g. homes brought to heat pump readiness.</p> <p>Having a list of non-confrontational questions to drive. Applaud (what little!) has been done.</p>
