GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. **ELIGIBILITY:** Products should be produced by the student as part of his/her regular Supervised Experience Program (SAE).
 - a. Students regularly enrolled in agricultural classes during the school year.
 - b. Students enrolled the previous school year in approved high school or junior high agricultural class(es) in Section 4.
 - c. Same as (a) and (b) except that the student has completed all of the agricultural classes he/she is eligible to enroll in, or has an approved sequence of study according to IAVAT agricultural education policy.
- 2. The Ag teacher of the high school or junior high which the student attends must verify that the student and the project comply with the rules.
- 3. Any exhibitor and/or family causing any unnecessary disturbance will forfeit their rights to any premiums won and may be asked to leave the fairgrounds. All fair committee and judge's decisions are final.
- 4. All exhibits will be housed, penned, or displayed according to the fair committee.
- 5. Livestock must be owned by the student by May 1st. If a student has a double entry in the same class, the second entry must be exhibited by an eligible student as per rule (1). No Breeder or Fitter tags will be accepted.
- 6. Collection of entry fees and electronic posting of entries <u>@ www.ilaged.org/connect/fairs/</u> is the responsibility of each school's Ag teacher. All entries should be made no later than 12:00 noon on the Friday prior to the fair. Entry fees will not be refunded after entries have closed.
- 7. The most recent Illinois health regulations will be adhered to. Consult the Illinois State Fair Book or website, current year, for up-to-date health requirements for ALL areas, and species.
- 8. All animals exhibited as purebred will require registration papers. These papers must be in the student's name, only. No partnerships or group registrations. No Breeder or Fitter tags will be accepted.
- 9. The fair committee reserves the right to combine classes having less than three entries.
- 10. All breeding animals will show only in breeding classes.
- 11. Unmanageable animals have a 3-strike rule to where after 3, they can be asked to leave the premises and not show, forfeiting entry fees.
- 12. Exhibitors will be released by their Superintendents at the conclusion of their species show.
- 13. No showing off of a trailer. Trailers are to park in designated area.
- 14. Total entries allowed for each particular show department.
 - a. All Species/Divisions (except horses) can show up to 12 entries per Species/Division
 - b. Horses and Pony Division can show up to 13 entries.
- 15. All animals of beef, swine, sheep and goats will be shown by weight classes. Animals will be placed into weight divisions and classes of generally equal numbers of animals based upon weights made at weigh-in. All class breaks will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 16. Entry fees will be charged for all classes.
- 17. If you miss your weigh- in time, you forfeit your entry fee and ability to participate in the show.

Beef Rules

- 1. All Beef classes will be separated into PUREBRED and UNREGISTERED/CROSSBRED and will be weighed to split classes.
- 2. Registration papers are required for purebred heifers and steers.
- 3. A student can show 6 female animals in any combination of classes 110, 120, 150.
- 4. A student can show a maximum of 6 steers in any combination of classes 130, 140, 160.
 - Each student may nominate any number of steers for Class 160. The same steers may be shown in class 130 or 140, and 160.
- 5. All animals will be identified by tattoo, ear tag, neck chain, brand, or other means of identification and will correspond to the animal's health papers.
- 6. All animals shown as purebred will be registered in the student's name only.
- 7. All animals with the exception of Production Cow/Calf must be born on or after 01-01 of the previous year.
- 8. Production cow/calf (Class 150)
 - Calves born after 01-01 of the present year or after.
 - The calf must be nominated and weighed within 15 days of birth with an official entry form submitted to the Section 4 Fair Chairman prior to the fair.
 - o Calves will be weighed at the fair and placing will be determined by weight.
- 9. Rate of Gain Steer (Class 160)
 - All steers must be properly identified and nominated on a preliminary steer entry form submitted to the Fair Chairman prior to posting entries for the Fair.
 - Each steer must be weighted and nominated, on correct form, before March 1, of the current year.
 - Only two steers per student will be allowed in the class.
 - All eligible steers will be weighed at the fair, money, ribbons and placing will be based on average daily gain.
 - Each exhibitor may weigh up to four steers at the fair, premium money will be paid on only two entries.
 - An entry fee will be charged for Class 160.

- 1. All Swine classes will be separated into PUREBRED and UNREGISTERED/CROSSBRED and will be weighed to split classes.
- 2. Registration papers are required for purebred gilts and barrows.
- 3. A student can show 6 female animals in any combination of classes 210, 220.
- 4. A student can show a maximum of 6 barrows in any combination of classes 230, 240, 250.
 - Each student may nominate any number of barrows for Class 250. The same barrows may be shown in class 230 or 240, and 250.
- 5. All swine must be identified by ear notch, tag, or tattoo. This identification must be on the health paper.
- 6. Rate of Gain Barrow (Class 250)
 - Pigs should be weighed by May 15 and weighed the day of the fair. An official weight and nomination form should be submitted to the fair chairman prior to making entries for the fair.
 - Only two barrows per student will be allowed in the class.
 - All eligible barrows will be weighed at the fair, money, ribbons and placing will be based on average daily gain.
 - Each exhibitor may weigh up to four barrows at the fair, premium money will be paid on only two entries.
 - o An entry fee will be charged for Class 250.

<u>Class</u> 540	 CLOVERLEAF BARRELS There is a running start of 30 feet from the start line to the first barrel. The distance between the three (3) barrels is 75 feet. Riders may start on either the right or left barrel, but when starting on the right barrel there will be one right turn and then two left turns and vice versa when starting on the left barrel. After completing the turn around the third barrel, riders must pass between the first and second barrel as they ride to the finish line.

<u>Class</u> <u>541</u>	• The distance from the starting line to the first pole and between poles will be twenty-one (21) feet. 	 Rider will be disqualified for: Crossing back over the starting line before the run is complete. Breaking the pattern. If a pole is knocked down and the rider does not follow the weave/bend pattern around the original base position of the fallen pole, it is considered a broken pattern. 		
	 FLAG RACE Two barrels will be placed 100 feet apart, if arena permits, and 100 feet from the start/finish line. Two buckets of equal size filled with dirt will be placed on top of each barrel. The rider starts with a flag in one hand and deposits it into the first bucket, proceeds to the second bucket removing the flag and riding to the finish line. Patterns may be run starting to the right or left. 		
<u>Class</u> <u>542</u>	Rider will be disqualified for: A flag does not remain in the bucket. The rider misses the flag. The rider drops the flag; The rider circles the barrel. Knocking over the bucket and/or barrel. Hitting the horse with the flag		
<u>Class</u> <u>543</u>	PLUG RACE Race Rules • Plug Race Pattern will be set to fit the arena, with one barrel used to run at. Barrels may not be closer than 15' from any fence. Riders may run left or right. Horse/pony must go around the barrel. Riders may touch the barrel in an attempt to prevent it from falling over. Barrels must stay in the same place for the entire class, or the entire class must be rerun, including original no times. Disqualifications: Contestant is disqualified for knocking barrel over, breaking pattern or separation of rider and horse/pony during the timing period.

FIELD CROPS (Grain Fair) Rules

- 1. Only one entry will be allowed per lot unless otherwise stated.
- 2. Grain: The exhibit may be a one quart grain display in a two quart container and a completed official crop tag
- 3. Forage crops: The exhibit may include, a flake of hay, a 5 gallon bucket of chopped hay or silage and all forage crops need a completed official crop tag.
- 4. Not conforming to the rules will result in a lowering of placing one placing per violation.
- 5. A Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be awarded to each class

Mechanics Rules

- 3. The project exhibited must have been constructed during the immediate year previous to the fair.
- 4. Class 804 shall consist of 5 different tools, common hand tools found in most shops, sharpened, refitted, reshaped or having been given new handles.
- 5. The division between major and minor is weight, major projects are approximately 75 pounds or more.
- 6. Students may enter two mechanics projects, except class 804, any combination of two will be accepted, with the exception of one in 804.
- 7. If a project cannot be displayed, pictures and the correct bill of materials etc., may be substituted, but the student will receive no higher than a "B" rating

Baked Goods Rules

- 1. Students will provide their own foam or plastic plate, baggie, or clear container to display their baked goods in accordance with the guidelines in each category.
- 2. All exhibitions will be sampled by the judge.
- 3. All entries should provide (1) complete baked goods unless specified by a specific quantity in parentheses after the entry name.
- 4. Students may enter up to 12 entries in the baked goods classes with the following criteria:
 - Only (2) entries will be made in each baked goods class for a combination of no more than 12 entries.
- 5. An entry tag provided by the fair will accompany each entry.
- 6. All "A" placings will compete for Best of Show Baked Goods.
- 7. Examples of the following may be entered into a class but **MUST BE** labeled with a fair tag with the type. Items not listed in a class below must be approved by the Fair Manager or Committee Chair. Example: If you wanted to make a Fruit Pie NOT listed.
 - Cakes Frosted, White, Chocolate, Yellow, Carrot, Chiffon, Angel
 - Cupcakes White, Chocolate, Other Flavors
 - Pies Apple, Apricot, Black Raspberry, Cherry, Combo Fruit, Peach, Rhubarb, Sugar-Free
 - Cookies Soft Sugar, Peanut Butter, Chocolate Chip, Oatmeal, Snickerdoodle, Thumbprint, Brownies
 - Bread (Yeast) Cinnamon Rolls, Loaf of White, Rye, Wheat Breads
 - Bread (Quick) Muffins, Zucchini Bread, Banana Nut Bread, Pumpkin Bread
 - Candies or Sweets Peanut Brittle, Chocolate Fudge, Turtles
