
PROGRAM - What Are Lapidary Arts - Geoff Carton

Linda Ostovitz said the District Governor was scheduled to be today's guest speaker, but was unable to attend because of a family emergency. Geoff will take his spot, talking about lapidary, which is essentially the art of cutting gems and creating them into either objects of art or jewelry. The person who does it is a lapidary, and the process is also referred to as lapidary.

Jeff described the different types of lapidary arts, including tumbling, cabochon cutting, carving, faceting and sphere cutting. The process to be followed is based upon how hard the stone is and what you can do with it. In tumbling, rough stones are put through a series of grits to mimic natural processes. It's important to use the right grits so the stones slowly get rounded out. It can take weeks or months and makes a mess that you don't want to put down your drain.

In the cabochon cutting process, a big rock is sliced open like you would cut a loaf of bread, using a diamond saw. As you're looking at the rock, you try to visualize the design within it and see if you can create a picture to work with, using a grinding process to shape it, then sanding and polishing. "A beginner can start from the slab and get to a finished product in about an hour, hour and 15 minutes," Geoff said. "It's really not that difficult, and it's rewarding for somebody just starting out."

Geoff said carving, where layers of stone are ground down to reveal a design, is a technique to be admired. "There's a guy from Germany, he's fifth generation, and he's able to visualize inside a solid piece of rock what will come up," he said. "I've seen dogs that he's done where there will be like a white chest, but the rest of the dogs are brown. How he's able to visualize what's going on inside that stone, to be able to bring that out as he's carving ... I don't know how he does it or how long it takes. It's amazing."



Geoff explained the faceting process, where flat pieces of stone are cut to reflect light and create a polished surface, and said the angle at which the stone is cut ensures light reflection. "Depending upon the stone, the angle that you cut it at is important, because you've got the light coming in, bouncing around," he said. "If you have the wrong angle, it's dead. The light comes in and either passes straight through or bounces at a weird angle." He showed examples of faceted stones and explained the progressive steps involved in faceting.

Lastly, Geoff discussed sphere cutting, where a big chunk of stone is cut and shaped into a sphere to get the flat spots out. He also passed around various interesting stones including Icelandic spar, coprolite (essentially fossilized fecal matter, supposedly dinosaur), a piece of meteorite, "fools gold" (pyrite), iron pyrite, rough turquoise and laboratory-grown crystals.
