






Figure 3. Initial Engagement of Faculty and Student Participation




Figure 4. Screenshot of the re-entry plan of Ms. Precious Amor Beso-Ferrer.

Context	One of the important industries concerned in addressing food insecurity in the Philippines and its neighboring Asian counterparts is poultry production. Nowadays, poultry industry is one of the most agricultural profitable businesses in the Philippines that provides nutritious meat and eggs for human consumption within the shortest possible time. Recently, the native, and freerange (improved) chicken production has been practiced by Filipinos to augment their income from other sources (Satori, 2018). This industry allows the contribution of the rural poor Filipinos in the production of high-quality chicken products that are sold with quality prices (Mananghaya, 2017). Recently, there has been an increase in the demand for native and improved chicken meat in the market which is attributed to the rising consciousness of the consuming public on organic and chemical-free meat products (Gil et al., 2000). Hence, the free-range chicken production should be improved and developed without sacrificing its natural and organic attributes. With the ASEAN Integration, the industry has great potential for growth and development. However, it is also faced with great challenges such as high production cost; health threatening benefits to humans such as Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) and Antibiotic Residue (AR); and high product demand but low supply due to emerging diseases, high feed cost and lack of knowledge on the new techniques and innovations in poultry production. In this scenario, backyard raisers need to undertake drastic changes that will help them cope with the pressing needs of this time. Re-tooling of poultry raisers, updating of techniques in poultry industry and reviving the native and improved free-range chicken farming should be given time and effort especially for small scale/ backyard chicken farmers so that they will be able to meet the new demands of the consumers/production and compete in the global arena. SOCCSKSARGEN is a region of the Philippines, located in Central Mindanao, and is officially design



This place is a melting pot of cultures and traditions and included here is their love for raising poultry animals specifically chickens. It is a place that is suitable for this enterprise because the weather is good and rural areas are still vast. Marketing is also on the rise. It is a national scenario that the demand for chicken meat and eggs is increasing. The only problem is that the large capital and accessibility of the farmers (Backyard Raisers, professionals, Indigenous People, Others) who want to venture into poultry raising, to training facilities or such activities where they can be taught on the techniques and advanced technologies and innovations used in poultry management and health practices for improvement of production and profit.

University of Southern Mindanao (USM) and its four-fold function: Instruction, Research, Extension, and Production, is found in the middle of this Region especially in the Province of North Cotabato. It is also good to note that the College of Veterinary Medicine (Center of Development in Veterinary Medicine awarded by CHED) is in this campus, thus availability of technical expertise is assured. The college is also mandated to perform extension activities especially that in its vision and mission, it includes molding not just student graduates that are competent Veterinarians in the future but a community around it that are able to respond to the needs of time especially in the field of veterinary science. It is a service-oriented program that is both community based and culture sensitive.

A Community-based Poultry Production Project ("Promoting NFCP (Naturally-grown Free-range Chicken Production: Empowering Backyard Raisers of North Cotabato") is therefore a good extension project of the University of Southern Mindanao- College of Veterinary Medicine. It will be done in cooperation with partner agencies of the College (Provincial Veterinary Office, Local Government Units of the Province and Department of Agriculture Reg. XII) so that more beneficiaries can avail of the opportunity to grow in terms of knowledge, skills and production.

In addition, a research proposal will be submitted to funding agencies such as Department of Science and Technology and Department of Agriculture for funding to ensure sustainability of the project and to validate the application of the competencies gained from the training. Faculty members and students of disciplines including animal science, veterinary medicine, practical agriculture, and veterinary technology in the University will be trained on innovative poultry production. Inclusion in the curriculum of sustainable and innovative strategies in poultry management and production will also be considered.

Objectives

Main Objective:

To provide a start-up livelihood project and venue for skills training and development to individuals (backyard raisers, out of school youth and Women) who are poultry raisers or interested in putting up their own backyard chicken farm in the region.

Specific Objectives:

- To provide basic knowledge, new advances and technical skills in free-range chicken production and health management among different stakeholders;
- To provide parent stocks and support in the establishment of the housing facility; and
- To establish a demo poultry farm in Cotabato Province to be managed by the recipients.



She also underscored the importance of:

- Providing clean water at all times to ensure optimal egg quality and overall flock health
- Practicing record-keeping, which is often neglected by raisers, as a critical tool for monitoring flock performance and making informed decisions. Records also help track profitability. If egg production falls below 70%, farmers may need to replace their stocks
- Implementing strict biosecurity measures and proper health management to maintain a healthy and productive flock
- Combining passion with profitability in managing layer chickens
 In her message, Dr. Debbie Marie B. Verzosa, Vice President for Research, Development, and Extension, expressed her gratitude;

4.3. International Linkages of PhD Agricultural Sciences Major in Crop Science

The core faculties of the PhD in Agricultural Science Major in Crop Science were able to engaged in the different international organizations and agencies in different countries such as New Zealand Institute for Plant and Food Research (PFR), New Zealand; Global Green Growth Institute-BIMP-EAGA-Republic of Korea Cooperation Fund (GGGI-BKCF), Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines (BIMP-EAGA) and South Korea; Center for ASIAN Mission for the Poor-Asia (CAMP ASIA), Seoul, South Korea; Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), South Korea; Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (UN FAO); Department for Industry, Ministry of Investments, Trade and Industry, Kenya; United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO); International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), Switzerland; and Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR), Australia (Table 4).

As the international collaborations and engagement of the University widens. visibility, research, development, extension and student support expands. The forged partnerships with international organization (https://www.usm.edu.ph/usm-and-korean-based-ngo-sign-mou-to-support-durian-indust) ry/) has opened the opportunity for support with the International Academic Institution such as Hanyang University of South Korea (Hanyang University Delegation Explores Collaborative Opportunities with USM). The USM through its capacity, was able to establish strong international relations that may contribute to boost the agriculture industry (USM, MinDA, and UNIDO Partner to Boost Mindanao's Fruit and Vegetable Industry) and enable to provide linkage opportunities to its PhD students that are engaged in the Agricultural sector. It also capacitate streamline science-based research through workshops and capacity building supported by international agencies (USM Attends Workshop for ACIAR-PCAARRD Funded Projects).

4.3.1. Accomplishment Highlights of the International Linkages of the PhD Agricultural Science Major in Crop Science

1. Faculty and Student Engagement with International Agencies and Organization

PhD Agricultural Science core faculties were engaged with international Agencies. Mel Chrisel A. Presentations were done by Dr. Harem R. Roca, and Khris Jhun Callano (Annex 5). Crop Science graduate students were engaged with the said visit to include Lea Patrimonio Mamades, Harvy Gusinalem and Jun Fred Escoton, taking MS in Agricultural Science major in Crop Science (Figure 12). Dr. Efren E. Magulama is doing an engagement with International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), Switzerland as Project Technician and Dr. Ardniel A. Baladjay is working on the project "Developing soil knowledge, information and capacity to improve the productivity and sustainability of key cropping systems in Philippines" with PCAARRD in partnership with Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR).

2. Project Grants, as an Output of the International Linkages

PhD Agricultural Science core faculties engaged with International Agencies, were granted with a total of P 16, 541, 776.90. Dr. Mel Chrisel A. Sales, PhD on her implemented project of a BIMP-EAGA and South Korean Agency, "Developing Land

Management Options for Diverse Cacao-based System in Mindanao" of the Global Green Growth Institute-BIMP-EAGA-Republic of Korea Cooperation Fund (GGGI-BKCF), Seoul, South Korea was granted \$136,310.24 or P7,160, 376.90 (Table 4 and Annex 2). The project implemented by Dr. Efren E. Magulama was provided with P 334,350.00 by the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), Switzerland and the project "Developing soil knowledge, information and capacity to improve the productivity and sustainability of key cropping systems in the Philippines" wherein Dr. Ardniel A. Baladjay with PCAARRD in partnership with Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR) was granted P 9,047,180.00. These international collaborations were part of the faculty's deliverables and initiative, and the projects were proposal driven, hence the core faculty with its ability and skills managed to acquire.



The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is a neutral, independent, humanitarian organization whose mandate is to protect and assist victims of armed conflict and other situation of violence. The ICRC endeavours to alleviate suffering by promoting and strengthening humanitarian law and universal humanitarian principles. principles.

Object and scope of the agreement

The present Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) intends to formalize the co-operation between University of Southern Mindanao and the ICRC (each a "Party" and together the "Parties") in the development of the second phase of a Seed Multiplication Pilot project as part of the project implemented by the ICRC in the community of Barangay Saniag-Municipality of Ampatuan Province of Maguindanao del Sur.

The concerned activities and services are intended to improve food production of rural communities in one Barangay of the province of Maguindanao Del Sur by supporting 20 farmers in the production of good maize Open Pollinated Variety seeds (USM var 10) based on Philippine Quality Standard. Moreover, the project intends to strengthen the availability of seeds at local level by providing good seeds to the most vulnerable farming computities. farming communities.

5. Duration

The duration of this agreement is eight (8) months, from 27th of June of 2024 to 28th of February of 2025

The agreement may be renewed or extended in writing and by mutual agreement by the parties for such term as they deem appropriate for the performance of the activities in pursuance of the principal object, or which result therefrom.

6. Termination

Either of the Parties is entitled to terminate the present MoU at any time by giving 30 days' notice in writing in case of partial or complete non-fulfilment of the obligations of one of the parties. Prior to this, however, consultations should take place between the parties to discuss such cancellation.

The ICRC expressly reserves the right to terminate this MoU without prior notice if it should have to leave or change the scope of its activities in the territory.

7. Due diligence

ICRC conducts a due diligence process as part of its standard operational practices to select reliable and trustworthy partners. The due diligence process is intended to ensure that external partners working with or on behalf of the ICRC comply with a number of standards that the institution has set for ethical behaviour, integrity and compliance with applicable law. Put simply, it is a matter of knowing the Parties with which the ICRC works. Ultimately, the aim of this process is to protect the people assisted by the ICRC, as well as the staff and good name of the institution.

ICRC undertakes not to use confidential information provided for purposes other than its due diligence process and to take reasonable precautions to prevent disclosure of confidential information to other third parties.

The due diligence process must be completed successfully before the ICRC can sign this agreement. Due diligence will be updated every three years or when there are significant changes in the project or our partner.

The document that satisfactorily validates the due diligence process performed by USMARDC becomes part of this Agreement and is included in Annex A.

8 Clause of confidentiality

USM shall ensure that the staff assigned to, or collaborating with, the ICRC are bound by and comply with a duty of discretion and professional secrecy. This duty of discretion imposes to refrain from disclosing any confidential or privileged information obtained or produced by the said staff as a result of their activity with the ICRC to any person not working for the ICRC or not assigned to the ICRC, unless they are directly involved in the works covered by this MoU or are acting as judicial or other authority according to the law.

9 Public communication

Without prejudice to exceptions provided by this MoU each Party undertakes not to disclose to the public or any third party the content of information exchanged in confidence under this MoU without prior written consent of the other Party, unless this information is already in the public domain or such disclosure is required by law.

The Parties shall mutually agree on any public communications regarding their joint initiatives to avoid any interference with their respective mandates and operations.

The ICRC might have to share this MoU with external parties such as donors or auditors. The USM may provide information regarding this MoU to auditors and other controlling, supervising or hierarchy bodies in cases determined by law.

10. Prevention of fraud, violence, sexual exploitation, and abuse

Each Partner shall take all possible measures to prevent and effectively address all forms of fraud, corruption, violence, exploitation and/or sexual abuse by its respective members, staff and volunteers, as well as by their agents, contractors and subcontractors engaged in the implementation and performance of the Agreement, or any sub agreements concluded thereunder.

The Partner shall immediately report to the ICRC any allegation of fraudulent activity or any misconduct related to the funds, goods or services provided by the ICRC under the Agreement, and any sub-agreements concluded thereunder, using one of any reporting means available, including by notifying the ICRC's Global Compliance Office (qva_globalcomplianceoffice@icrc.org). The Partner commits to cooperate with auditors and investigators from the ICRC or appointed by the ICRC in response to any alleged misconduct.

Failure by the Partners to comply with any of their obligations under this article, including any material omission or misrepresentation of information by the Partners in relation to allegations of, or demonstrated, fraud and corruption, may constitute cause for immediate termination of the Agreement."

11 Force majeure

In case of Force Majeure (caused by conditions beyond its control including, but not limited to natural disasters, Governmental restrictions - including the denial or cancellation of any import or other necessary license, and/or any other cause beyond the reasonable control) or such as serious security problem for the ICRC staff, the ICRC retains the right to terminate this MoU or delay its commitment.

12. Privileges and Immunity

Nothing in the present MoU shall be directly or indirectly interpreted as a waiver on the part of the ICRC, of the privileges and immunities the ICRC and its staff enjoy under national or international law, including under the Headquarters Agreement between The ICRC and The Government of The Philippines signed on 30.04.1985

The parties agree that nothing in this Memorandum shall affect the ability of the ICRC to carry out its humanitarian activities in a neutral, independent and impartial manner.

13. Use of the ICRC Emblem

The ICRC emblem is protected under the Geneva Conventions, and no one shall use the ICRC emblem in any way without the prior written approval of the ICRC.

14. Governing Law

The Agreement shall be governed by the Law of Philippines with respect to the ICRC privileges and immunities provided by the international law and the Headquarters Agreement between The ICRC and The Government of The Philippines signed on 30.04.1985.

15. Dispute settlement

Any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or in relation to this Agreement including the validity, invalidity, breach or termination thereof, shall be settled by mutual agreement between the parties.

16. Amendments and annexes

In order to be valid, any amendment or annex to this Agreement shall be made in writing, by mutual agreement, and signed by the two parties involved. A similar procedure shall apply to any proposed amendment to this letter





CONSULTANCY AGREEMENT

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

This Agreement entered into by and between:

TROPIC BIOSCIENCES UK LTD – PHIL. BRANCH, a corporation duly organized and existing under Philippine laws, with principal offices at 40th Floor PBCOM Tower, 6795 Ayala Avenue Cor. Rufino Street, Makati, herein represented by its duly authorized representatives, Mr. Gilad Gershon, Chief Executive Officer of Tropic Biosciences UK Ltd – Phil. Branch., hereinafter referred to as the "COMPANY".

DR. TAMIE SOLPOT, of legal age, single, Filipino and a resident of A3D1, 1st Block, USM Housing, Poblacion, Kabacan, Cotabato, hereinafter referred to as the, "CONSULTANT",

WITNESSETH: That -

WHEREAS, the COMPANY requires an Institutional Biosafety Committee's (IBC) Scientist-Member for TR4 Banana Trial to perform certain functions to support its regulatory activities;

WHEREAS, the CONSULTANT represents himself to be in possession of the needed qualifications and scientific expertise rendering him fit to be engaged by the COMPANY as a consultant and is offering his services to the COMPANY:

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing premises, and the mutual covenants of the parties herein, the COMPANY hereby engages the services of the CONSULTANT and the CONSULTANT commits to render his services for the COMPANY subject to the following terms and conditions:

- I. Responsibilities of the CONSULTANT:
 - 1. Provide the best scientific recommendation in the risk assessment of the project;
- Ensure the soundness of the experimental design, determine the possible impact of the trial to the biological and ecological integrity of the trial site, propose mitigation measures;
 - 3. Provide the relevant regulatory guidance to ensure regulatory compliance of the project; and
 - Contribute to the report making of the project, endorse to IBC members and sign off.
- II. The CONSULTANT shall attend the meeting and/or project inspection whether virtual or physical as called by the IBC Chair or such a time that his presence maybe requested by the Company.
- III. For performing his duties and responsibilities, the CONSULTANT shall receive a consultancy fee of PhP 5,000.00 per meeting, net of the applicable withholding tax. Payment of the CONSULTANT's fee shall be made on a monthly basis at the third week of the succeeding month. The CONSULTANT shall be entitled to per diem of PhP 750.00 and travel expenses for preapproved travel. Receipts are required for all reimbursable expenses.
- IV. The CONSULTANT is not an employee of the COMPANY and shall not, aside from his consultancy fees stipulated above, receive any other benefits from the COMPANY including those

INDEPENDENT RESEARCH GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN

WORLD COFFEE RESEARCH

AND

DR. TAMIE C. SOLPOT

(UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN MINDANAO)

This Independent Research Grant Agreement is made by and between World Coffee Research ("WCR"), a California nonprofit mutual benefit corporation, and Dr. Tamie C. Solpot ("Grantee"), and sets forth the terms of the Grantee's relationship with WCR as follows:

- Research Services. Effective May 1, 2022, WCR shall retain Grantee and Grantee shall
 provide WCR with the research products (hereinafter described as the "Research Grant"), such
 services which shall include, without limitation, completion of the research proposal as described
 in Appendix A. The nature of the Research Grant may be modified by WCR in writing at any
 time, with the written agreement of Grantee.
- Term. This Agreement shall remain in effect from May 1, 2022, until March 31, 2023 (the "Term"), unless terminated earlier by one or both of the parties as set forth herein.
- <u>Fee.</u> In consideration of the performance of the Research Grant, WCR shall pay Grantee a fixed fee of \$ 8,500 USD, payable during the Term of this Agreement and according to the payment schedule in Appendix A.
- 4. <u>Termination</u>. WCR or Grantee may terminate this Agreement with or without cause (i) by the written agreement of both parties, or (ii) with 30 days' written notice to the other party. Upon termination of the Agreement, WCR's obligation to pay the fees described in Paragraph 3 herein and to reimburse Grantee for the expenses described in Paragraph 6 herein shall cease, effective as of the date of termination. WCR shall have the authority to demand a full return of the fees paid by WCR if the grantee deliberately fails to deliver the output.
- <u>Control</u>. Grantee has the right to control and direct the means, manner and method by which the Research Grant research is performed.
- 6. Equipment and Materials, Expenses and Insurance. Grantee shall furnish all equipment, materials and labor used to perform the Research Grant. Grantee shall pay all ordinary and necessary expenses arising from its performance of the Research Grant. WCR shall not provide insurance coverage of any kind for Grantee or name Grantee as an additional insured on any of its insurance policies.
- 7. <u>Independent Contractor Status.</u> The Parties agree and acknowledge that Grantee is an independent contractor. Nothing herein shall be construed to create any partnership, joint venture or agency relationship of any kind between the parties. Grantee has no authority to enter into any agreements or contracts on behalf of WCR, or to bind WCR in any way, and shall not represent, either explicitly or implicitly, that he possesses any such authority. Grantee is not, nor shall be, deemed to be, for any purpose, an employee or agent of WCR. WCR shall not be responsible to Grantee, or to any governmental authority, for the payment or withholding of any federal, state or local income, unemployment or other employment-related taxes in connection
