Home and School Connection

Get organized: Help your child pick out a special English language notebook or folder, and make sure your child has supplies, such as pencils, pens, writing paper, and a bilingual dictionary (available from school).

Get into a routine:

- Set a regular time for practicing English every day, and look for a study area with good light. Help your child get into the habit of getting homework done before doing other activities.
- Help your child learn about new words or content in a variety of ways. Talk about new vocabulary words several times over the course of the week.

Limit distractions: Turn off the TV and video games, and restrict phone calls and texting during study time. If your child is using the computer for homework, check in periodically to make sure they are getting work done.

Use your primary language: Talk with your child about what they are learning, and ask them to explain new concepts in your language to make sure they understand them.
