



Ethan Bear

Ethan is a professional hockey player from Ochapowace Cree Nation. He currently plays for the Edmonton Oilers in the National Hockey League. Growing up he found his passion for hockey through his older brother Everett, but also looked up to other Native players like Carey Price and Jordin TooToo. As his playing career developed he began to understand the stereotypes that Indigenous hockey players face, like being considered lazy, but that only motivated him to work harder and prove people wrong. He played four seasons with the Seattle Thunderbirds in the WHL. During his time there he

broke a Thunderbirds record to become the highest scoring defensemen in team history. In 2017 he was also recognized as the WHL Defenseman of the Year. Ethan was drafted in the fifth round of the 2015 NHL Draft by the Edmonton Oilers and made his NHL debut on March 1, 2018. He is one of only a handful of Indigenous players in the NHL, and the first player to grow up on a First Nations reserve and suit up for the Oilers. Ethan is a fan favourite and his jersey can be seen throughout the crowd at Oilers home games. Indigenous fans from across the country have also purchased his jersey to show their support. Ethan has also worked hard to be a role model and positively influence Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth. In the summers, he gives back to his community by running a hockey skills camp for Ochapowace youth. Christi Belcourt



Christi Belcourt

Christi Belcourt is an award-winning artist and activist. She is Métis, and her family originates from Manitou Saskhigan or Lac St. Anne. Christi's art is guided by her deep respect for the natural world and the traditional knowledge of her people. The Métis are known for their vibrant floral beadwork patterns, and Christi's art has reimagined that art form using acrylic paint and tiny dots. Her paintings tell stories, and she is most known for creating spectacular works with intricate floral designs. Her work can be found in permanent installations all across Canada. Christi was responsible for initiating the Walking With Our Sisters project, a commemorative art installation to honour and raise awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous women. Over 1,700 moccasin vamps (uppers) were created by artists from across

Turtle Island, and there were even a few submissions from other countries. Each pair of vamps represented one woman, and the unfinished moccasins were said to represent their unfinished lives. Children's vamps were also included and dedicated to children who did not return home from residential schools. Christi has been involved in several other initiatives centered around Indigenous peoples. She has been a vocal and passionate advocate for Métis people. She created art in support of the Water is Life movement. She helped found The Onaman Collective with other Indigenous artists and environmentalists. It is an Indigenous, land based initiative that shares traditional knowledge and language with youth. Christi was also involved in the Resistance 150 movement which was created in opposition to the celebration of Canada's 150th birthday and as a means to inform the general public. The movement was created through acts of resistance, and a refusal to celebrate 150 years of colonization in Canada.


Maker of Monsters: The extraordinary life of Beau Dick
