According toan article for True Crime Edition in 1979, a Swedish shipping compan y called Ridi Am Slate commissioned to thebuilding of a ferry ship that would go on to be called the Ms. Viking Sally. Now, this ship would eventually come to benamed the Ms. Estonia and was state-of-the-art for its time with 10 decks and all sorts of amenities and restaurants, bars, pools o f sauna, nightclub, and a movie theater like it, it a ferry had all of this, not a cruise liner, it was by all accounts abeautiful luxury ferry vessel. However, this ship was what I would consider one of the most cursed ships out there beforeanyone turns off this episode. This is not a ghost story,

t's not in eight years. Again, according to True Crime edition, this vessel saw 855 deaths, two of which were murders. And I'm gonna tell you the story of one of them.

Well, that is not a ship that I would want or a vessel that I would wanna be on.

Yeah, that's, that's accurate. But this story that I'm going to tell you is the story of the murd er of Klaus Shekel. AndI do wanna preface this by saying there's, there's not a lot of sources out t here for this in English, and there's not a lot evenin Finnish. But the ones I did find in Finn, I was able to roughly translate. So according to medium.com, Klaus Shekelwas 20 years old and his gi rlfriend of six months, Bettina taxis was 22. They were from West Germany and werebackpackin g across the Nordic countries with Klaus's friend of five years, Thomas

Schmidt. And they started theirjourney on July 23rd,

1987 in Stuttgart, before making their way through Denmark and Sweden, where they stayed in Stockholm for a few days. Now, I will say there's really no information on who Klaus and Bettina and Thomas were aspeople. I really, unfortunately don't know much about them. They were really into traveling, you know, it was this bigdeal. Klaus and Bettina only knew each other for six months, but they were like, yes, you know, we are, we're together. Let's plan our future together. Really, really cute. They stay in Stockholm for a few days, and their next stop was to be Turku Finl and's for the Russ Rock Music Festival, and they would be traveling there via the Ms Viking Sally. Now, theonly snag in their trip came from the fact that while they had saved up money for this trip, they only had enough money toget them onto the ship. They didn't actually have the funds to book a cabin for their overnight stay on this parity, which tobe fair was fine. They would just sle

ep out on the deck under the stars, you know, which to be fair was fine with them. Itseems like a lot of people on the ferry that night either didn't have the money to book a cabin, or they didn't fe el it wasworth it to spend the money on like a private sleeping quarters. So they were just sleepin g out on the decks, you know, wherever they found a place to crash.

Yeah, it, it really does. It sounds like a giant slumber party or a giant floating camping trip. So on July 27th at 10:00

PMthey board the ship. Now, according to an article translated from a book called Police Secret t wo, which I'm probably, Icompletely butchered that I'm sure, but it translates to police stories by all accounts, from postcards and messages writtento family and friends. The trip up until this point had gone well. The evening went as one would expect a night on a ferryto go. Klaus and Betti na picked up some supplies and souvenirs, and then they wandered around the ship chatting with theothers on board. Now, both Bettina and Klaus were reportedly very outgoing and would talk to anybody, but Thomas wasmore standoffish, so he wasn't really one for chatting with strangers. Now, while they wandered around, they scoped atareas where they would sleep for the night, and of the people that they spoke to was a man who was named by the mediaas Patrick

Haley. I will say that that's just an alias. The media never released his name publicly, and he was an Englishengineer on his way to Helsinki to be reunited with his girlfriend Maya. They also met a German businessman named Taoand his partner Sari. And the final group of people mentioned that they met were three young men from KangaSala namedSammi Pente and Vallee, who had just lost all their money on alcohol and what I would assume to be gambling or maybegentleman's clubs in Stockholm. Looks like these three guys were like out to party. In addition, there were 14 00 or soother people on board from families and veterans, a couple of different like scouting troops and tourists, as well as 200members of the ship's crew. Now, Klaus

and Bettina ended up finding a spot to sleep on deck nine, which was the topdeck near the helico pter pad. And Thomas settled on the deck one floor below them. The spot they found was dimly l it. Reportedly one of the lights was broken, but it was protected from the winds by a plexiglass s hield and had offered them abeautiful view of the sunrise, which I'm sure they wanted to see the next morning. You know, the sunrise over the oceanor the sea, you know, I'm sure was a big draw for sleeping out on the top deck before going to sleep. They spoke with Taoand he and Klaus hit it off. Tao was in the business of selling car parts, and Klaus was reportedly studying automotivet echnology and university. So Tao offered to show him the car parts he was delivering to Turku, b ut the car deck waslocked up for the night. So the two of them apparently made plans to look at t hem in the morning, and they exchangedinformation like they were really excited. It was like two guys geeking out over cars together.

Then they encountered Patrick and Sammy Pente and Valle. And since the three men were short on money, Patrickpurchased beer and food and they had a good time drinking outside one of the r estaurants on the ship. So it's like the partyjust kind of continued on, and supposedly they were b oisterous enough that several people remembered seeing them. Andat around 1:00 AM Klaus and Bettina headed up to the top deck to go to bed with Thomas again sleeping one de ck below. According to a Finn newspaper report, Thomas wanted to give them privacy because, y

ck below. According to a Finn newspaper report, Thomas wanted to give them privacy because, y ou know, it was this couple, youknow, they're in the honeymoon phase. He's like, you, you guys do your own thing. I'll sleep down here, it's fine. And hewas also in charge of keeping an eye on some of their valuables. It looks like he was just kind of like the responsible one. He's like, I'm g onna take all of our stuff. I'm gonna keep an eye on it. You guys do what you want to do. Okay? Now, thethree men from kangasala, according to that excerpt from that police stories book I ment ioned, reported seeing Klaus andBettina settling into sleeping bags on the top deck. Now no one really knows what happened next in the coming hours. What is known was that between three an d 4:00

AM the restaurants and bars finally closed for the night, A really late lastcall. The remaining pass engers who were awake for last call made their way to their cabins to sleep, and the crew retiredt o their rooms and the security guard on duty, Brian Mill Velten, was preparing to hand over duty to the next personcoming on shift. Among the few people that were still wandering around were t hree Danish scouts who wandered aroundand ended up on the top deck by the helicopter pad at a bout 3

45, according to that book. So almost three hours have goneby since Klaus and Betina went to be d.

Okay, I'm still waiting for the other shoe, you know, for the shoe to drop here.

They get up to the top deck, and these three scouts, again, they are unnamed. A lot of people wer e unnamed, and at first itlooked like nobody was around. But then they noticed two people by the ship's, air bands, who looked like they were either very drunk or on drugs as they kept leaning ag ainst the deck to stand and then collapsing back onto the floor. Now, the three Scouts approach to try and help, when they saw that the people there were a man and a woman, and their faceswere covered with blood.

Okay, that, that's no bueno, but go, go ahead.

According to medium.com, around the same time, another person came onto the top deck. This was another scout from adifferent tro, and this was 18 year olds, Thomas

Nielsen. Now, he had seen Klaus and Bettina earlier that evening on thetop deck. When he came back up the second time, he saw Klaus and Bettina covered in blood surrounded by the otherscou ts according to medium. He said in an interview quote, I was walking on the helicopter deck and suddenly saw threeother boys by the sleeping bags. At the same time, I noticed that something w as crooked. When I got closer, I noticed thatthere was blood everywhere, and the young people I ying in the sleeping bags were covered in blood. The boy tried to getup by then, he was outside t he sleeping bag, but he couldn't get up. The girl was inside the sleeping bag and tried to saysomet hing next to them were empty in full beer bottles. Now, Thomas gave this interview to Sierra Ma gazine, but Icouldn't find the actual interview. So I don't know what other things he may have sai d in relation to this case. This was allI could find on medium. He reportedly, according to the Atl as Obscura attempted first aid while the ship's security wascalled for. And within 10 minutes, sec urity arrived with a nurse and the captain. But it was pretty clear immediately thatthe medical ser vices on the ship were not equipped to deal with the severity of Klaus and

Bettina's injuries. Thomas also said the face had not been hit or kicked, and in my opinion, the ab user had not used the knife either. Their faces were likeslush as if they had been beaten with som ething like a hammer. No wounds were visible on their bodies. So according to Thomas, they were hit repeatedly in the face and head

Yes. He, according to Thomas, he believed it was like a hammer. He, he said it, he didn't see any like stab wounds.

Okay, so these two individuals, these, these, this couple was I'll say beaten with an object and left in their sleeping bagscovered in blood.

And these boy scouts stumbled upon them. Okay.

According to medium, they actually believed that Betina was in far more dire need of medical att ention than Klause

But this vessel, this ferry has all of these things, but really no great medical,

No, no, no, no, no, no. It's not that they didn't have good, I mean, I don't know what their capacit y for medical care was, but they were not equipped to deal with attempted murder.

I get that, but I'm just thinking that, I don't know, maybe there, there could have been more medical personnel to, Imean, you don't expect this to happen on a ferry.

Yeah. And this was in the area of Finland where their crime rate is very, very low for, for something like this. So I'm surethey weren't, but I, I get what you're saying. You would for, for all the money that was invested in the amenities, onewould like to think that there was at least enough medical equipment to keep them stable.

Right. Medical personnel, medical, you know, I'm, there's, look, I'm not, I'm not beaten up on the ferry or anything likethat. It's just, I would think with, again, with, as you said, all of the money that they spent equipping this, this ferry withall sorts of amenities that, that they would've had m ore medical personnel. Again, you're not thinking some event like thisis going to happen. It's a te rrible word event, but it, that's really what it is. The, you don't expect this to happen,

But about 45 minutes had elapsed between them being found and the helicopter and the police be ing called for. And I'msure that's because A was a big ship, and B I'm sure the nurse and the ship's captain and the security guard didn't really realize the extent of what had happened, obviously.

Right. But if you're telling me that this ship was basically filled with a lot of passengers and a lot of passengers were sleeping on the different decks under the stores, I mean, they weren't alone on this deck.

Well, it seems like they might have been. I, I don't know for sure, but it seems like at least on the top deck, they may havebeen alone. Because really the only thing up there was the helicopter pad

And nobody heard anything, nobody heard.

Well, I'm gonna get to that

Insert hard eye roll here. You're not getting there fast enough. Okay.

Now, the finished Coast Guard dispatched a helicopter immediately to transport Patina and Klaus to Turka UniversityHospital. Now, this helicopter arrived and transported them, arriving at the hospital at 5:48

AM But it was Klaus by thenwho was thought to be more stable as I thought that had died by the time they got to the hospital, due to the extent of hisinjuries, which had pierced his skull into his brain.

They thought Klaus was, they say because he was walking, they thought, okay, you're walking, y ou're, you're more stablethan Bettina. But he was not, and he died. But by the time he arrived at t he hospital,

Because he had a what, to his head,

He had such a severe head injury, whatever had hit his skull, had pierced through it into his brain Speaker: 5 Okay. This is a vicious attack. Speaker: 5 Yeah. This was not like a fight that got outta hand or something like that where, you know, he wa s, I guess, punched in thehead too many times where he had a severe concussion, like someone w

ailed on him with a hammer on both of them with a hammer probably while they slept.

Who would do such a thing?

Good as mine. Okay. Obviously a maggot, we all know I'm going to come out with that one. Obv iously it was a maggot, but what reason, well, first of all, there's no good reason. Like, let, let's b e real. There's no reason.

No, of course. But what reason would this person have thought they had to do it? I, I like, I get w hat you're saying now, I,

I'm horrified.

I will say Bettina did survive, her injuries were just as extensive as Klaus's, but she survived

By the grace of God, I, I know people are out there by the grace of God, that is how she survived to be beaten thatseverely and to be able to survive that. Yeah.

And I will say, according to that chapter in that book, police stories, it did say that she had recove red well, and it waswritten four years after the fact. So, you know, my hope is she has gone on to live as normal life as possible. Although shedid have lifelong injuries. I believe she, she had lost a finger probably defending herself. I don't know the extent of herinjuries that was never released . Well,

Again, if she was defending herself,

She, I will say she, well, I, I was just gonna say she has no memory of that day. She woke up.

No, I'm not a I'm not, no,

I thinking that she would No, no, no, I understand that. I'm just saying like, if anyone's like, may be she saw the, sheliterally has no idea what happened that day.

But if she was, all I'm thinking is if she was able to at least put her hand up to, or her hands up to defend her herself toprevent more of an attack, I would think she would be screaming. And I go b ack to this is a vessel filled with people.

And nobody heard this

Ab I, I guess not. I guess nobody heard. But I, I understand. I understand where you're coming fr om. Like she, if she wasscreaming, which obviously she was probably awake if she had put her h ands up,

Unless, you know, the first blow, I guess maybe possibly stunned her where she wouldn't have sc reamed.

Maybe I don't, I don't, I don't know. Head injuries are complicated enough when they're minor no w at six 30 in themorning, four detectives arrived via the same helicopter aboard the Viking Sally . Now, according to medium, the attackcould have occurred in either Oland's or Finland based on where the Viking Sally was sailing that night. So we're talkinglike jurisdictionally. But because Oland is a very small archipelago of the, off the coast of Finland with a very smallpopulation, lik e I think currently they have only about 30,000 residents, which is nothing, they would not have t heinvestigative resources necessary to investigate Klaus's murder. So the Turkey police took over the jurisdiction according to true crime edition. The top deck was immediately secured. And it had actually been partially secured already by Ramo, the security guard who was seasoned in this b usiness. So he had a really good idea of police protocol, and he had alreadystarted gathering infor mation from witnesses by the time the police arrived. So, I mean, thank God for him, because he was like, no one touch anything, like, I'm gonna secure this. The officers that arrived also called f or police to meet them atthe port where the ship was going to dock, so that they can ensure that n o one got off the ship right away. Immediately, the investigation was started, and passengers are being interviewed by the time the ship docked in Turkey at 8:00

AMnow, because no one had an idea of a suspect, the ship was secured before passengers could l eave. And they were escorted one by one off the Viking Sally, from one exit. All others had been blocked so that everyone was gathered in the same place.

In addition, police patrolled the ship in boats to ensure that nothing like evidence was thrown ove rboard.

Police before the ship had arrived at the port, had acquired three cameras specifically to film all p assengers as they left. One was on younger men in specific, and the others were used to look for anyone acting suspiciously. However, allelderly persons as well as families were told to leave an d weren't documented in the investigation, most likely because ofjust the sheer number of possibl e suspects. So I'm sure that these, you know, the elderly people and the families were letoff becau se they were kind of weeding out, all right, you're, you know, you're in your seventies. You, you did not have thecapacity to wield a weapon multiple times. You know, you can go, you know, yo u have really small children, thelikelihood of you leaving them to go murder someone is really lo w. You can go kind of thing. Which, like, I get 1400people, like you can't reasonably go through t hem all in a timely manner. Now, Thomas

Schmidt was one of the 20 peoplethat police interrogated extensively, but he was eventually relea sed after police concluded he had nothing to do with theattack. Thomas, according to Medium, sa id quote, when the police came to wake me up, I had no idea what happened. Wewere sitting up on the deck, but the air was cold, and I went inside to look for a place to sleep. After half an hour, I wokeup to Klaus and Bettina coming to get their sleeping bags. They were in a great mood and said they had met a nice fin. Then they faded away. It was around midnight then, so he hadn't see n them, you know, they went to bed at once. So it hadbeen at least an hour from when he had leas t seen them. And they were fine, you know, people could attest to that. Now, the other person that was in immediate focus was Patrick

Haley, who was found in a sleeping bag covered in blood. Now, he told police that he had gotten a nosebleed in the middle of the night, and the blood was his own. So the blood wastested forensi cally, and it was confirmed that he was telling the truth. The blood was his own. So he was let go . Now, thescouts were also interrogated by police, but they were also ultimately released. So prett y much right off the bat, policewere struggling with their investigation. Again, there was around 1400 people on the ship that night. There were nowitnesses to the attack. And according to police stories, the initial investigation on the ship had to be done quickly, whichmakes sense since, you know, once the ship made its support, they couldn't just detain 1400 people, okay? To thoroughly investigate the whole ship would've taken at least a week. A majority of the passengers were all b ased, were based allover the world. So police have had a hard time tracking people down after th e fact. And delays caused by foreign legalformalities have hindered the investigation. In other co untries, you know, the first week they're already at a disadvantagebecause, you know, they have t o let people go. They didn't have a cause for holding anyone in specific, or anyone inparticular. Y ou know, they, they don't have the resources or the time to search this entire ship, especially beca use that shiphas to leave port. So it's like they're, they're kind of stuck because their crime scene i s literally sailing away. Now, in August, two fishermen and that, it was, it was about a week later, two fishermen found a bag of clothes that had washedup on the shore of Lila Bjorn Home Islands . This bag sat on a dock for like a year because these fishermen found andwent, oh, someone dro

pped their bag in here in the water. So they left it on the dock. And then it was found again a year later, like, oh, wait, maybe we should have someone look into this.

it's weird. Based on what I could understand fromtranslations, that's what happened.

Now, inside the back, which from my understanding was a trash bag. Well, inside was a pair of si ze 41 shoes, lightcollared shorts, a red sweater, and some work gloves, which had the initials HK written on them. Now, these clothes were confirmed to be finished made, and based on the direct ion of the wind at the time it was found, it's believed that these clothes could have been thrown of f of the Viking Sally. However, it's unknown who the clothes belonged to, and it has never been c onfirmed, obviously, whether or not they came from someone aboard the Viking, Sally,

did these have blood on them?

Not to my knowledge, but they were floating around in, in the water for like a week, at least a we ek, if not longer, beforethey were found. So, who knows, for years, over a thousand people were interrogated or interviewed, and over 250samples have been sent the National Bureau of Investig ation for analysis with investigative agencies in nine countriesworking on the case tracking down , you know, different people that may or may not have been close to the deck when thisoccurred. Apparently the case report is well over 2000 pages, like they have been working this. The other i ssue is thatthere is no clear motive for the murder of Klaus and the attempted murder of Bettina. Now, tragically on September 27th,

1994, the Ms spiking Sally, which had been renamed to the Ms. Estonia, as I said, sailed through treacherous waters and sank taking with it 852 people. It also took with it any potential evidence t hat may had been left on board,

After 10 years, yeah, the likelihood is slim to numb. But you never know. There could have been something more important, would be the 852 people that died.

No, absolutely. I this, you're right, this ship or this vessel was cursed

For years after the fact, due to a lack of witnesses. Evidence in the entire vessel now gone. The m urder of Klau satunsolved. However, in 2019, according to medium, the police announced that th ey had a suspect who was male and wasbelieved to have not known either Klaus or Bettina prior to the murders. Now, the name of this man had not been releaseduntil September of 2020 when a 51 year old Danish man by the name of Herman Hemley was indicted on charges ofmurder and a ttempted murder. I'm sure you're asking me who's Herman Hemley.

Well, I figured no matter what I ask, you always tell me you're getting to it. So I figured I'd just wait.

Well, I, I did in fact mention Herman Hemley, not by that name. See, Herman Henley went by a very different name in 1987. He went by his birth name. His birth name was Thomas Nielsen. Thomas

Nielsen, as I said, was the one thatadministered first aid, said, oh, it seems like they got hit with a hammer, yada, yada. Let me insert myself into theinvestigation a little bit. Do some interviews. The scout,

So he wanted, because there was no reason to do this, none whatsoever. So he was to, I'll say, get his 15 minutes of fame.

Oh, don't, don't jump the gun. I'm not there yet. Now, following the murder of Klaus and the atte mpted murder of Betina, Herman spent his life in and outta jail for various charges like robbery t hreats and weapons charges, and, you know, justall sorts of things he was getting in trouble for. It 's also worth mentioning that this is alleged 'cause there's no proof, because the person that would have the, the other person in this situation has since passed away. But allegedly, his scoutmaster saw Thomas coming back from the top deck with blood all over his clothes. He said, I just admitted a stirred firstaid on this, this poor couple that, that got attacked. And a scout master said, let me get you new clothes, you poor thing. That's horrific.

Well, this was on the, on the ship after the

Fact. No, no, I understand that. But I know in this country, you know, I'll say Eagle Scouts, they have all of thisknowledge, you know, they've

But wait a minute. The scout master, I'll say is the quote unquote expert, because he's teaching th ese scouts how to dothese things. And if Thomas is coming back saying, oh, I just did first aid, I would think that the scout master would'vesaid, wait a minute and run.

That's what I would like to think. But again, the scout master has since died. I don't know what he really said. This is justkind of what was mentioned in like one or two sources. Oh, by the way, the scout scoutmaster, you know, saw him andwas like, Thomas, what happened? Oh my God. And he was like, this couple got attacked. I administered first aid. That's why I'm covered in blood. And he's like, let me get you new clothes. That's, that's what it was, maybe said. I don't know.

I'm thinking the scoutmaster would probably say, what do you mean? Let, let me see, let me see if I can help. Show mewhere they are. Let me go offer my assistance.

That's what I'm thinking. But you know,

So, and he didn't think to mention this to the security guard or the, the anybody, the police.

This was after the police were already called and stuff.

No, I understand that. But wouldn't you think the scoutmaster would say, Hey, this kid offered he lp. He was covered inblood and then the police go, Hmm? What do you mean? Oh no,

They held him as a hero. You helped, you administered first aid, you helped, you tried. You're 18.

No, no,

I don't know. That's what happened. Well,

Speaker: 5

You're supposed to have the answers. I have. If you're telling me the story, you're supposed to have the answers.

I'm sorry. So Herman, you know, all around Ston doing some good things. I guess he didn't learn much in the scouts, buthe would also allegedly use the murder of Klaus as his mean threat and w ould boast about getting away with murder,

Don't wanna get sued. You'll, you'll see why I say allegedly. So everyone will see why I'm saying allegedly so much.

Allegedly. I'm thinking I should be calling shenanigans here. 'cause if he, okay, alright, we'll, we'l l play devil's advocate. If this young man offered to help or was administering first aid to the two victims of a vicious attack, maybe he shouldhave been calling for help.

He, well, the, the other scouts got help while he was administering first aid, according to one of the finished articles I readwhile in prison, he had spoken to the leader of the prison choir about Kl aus's murder and how upset over it he was. Yes, I am a murderer and I can prove it, but then I will go to jail for a long timeand I will not go to jail because then you will escape my revenge when, which will come when you least expect it. Icouldn't find exact quotes. It was in the media that he did send text messages in this vein to his wife. These particular quotes though are from medium.com. I'm not a hundred percent sure where they got the exact quotes.

Okay, so allegedly he sent these text messages to his wife or ex-wife threatening her with bodily harm. At least that's whatI'm getting from what you just said. I, I'm,

Now, as a result of these messages, how the police found out about them, I really couldn't tell yo u. It's possible his ex-wife had gone to the police and said, my psycho ex-husband confessed to murder in its ex message.

Or, and or, and he's threatening to hurt me. He's threatening to hurt me. Oh, by the way, he also c onfessed to this in a textmessage or he said this, I don't know, it's probable, I have no idea though . But the police found out about these textmessages and as a result visited him in 2016. Now, in 2 016, the Danish prison he was incarcerated in was visited bypolice constables Mika Pier and Ser pa Sarin. Now, on the first visit, Herman allegedly implied he was responsible forKlaus's murder. And the second time he alleged that he could have done it. By the third visit he had allegedly co nfessed toPC Pere in the courtyard without legal re representation and without the confession bei ng recorded. We all know that thatin and of itself is an issue. He was alleged to have claimed to h ave revealed specific details about the murder. And he also allegedly claimed to have used a slag hammer to attack Klaus and Betina. I had no idea what a slag hammer was. So Ilooked it up. Acc ording to Tractor Supply, if y'all are curious, you can buy tools there. A slag hammer is a chippin ghammer with a chisel on one side and a points on the other used to clear welding debris. So it's a welding tool and thething I can most closely compare it to would be a pickax, like one end is bl unt. The other is pointed. Okay? But it's veryheavy considering you're banging it on something y ou've been welding on. I don't know where one would find that on aship. Maybe someone was a welder and brought it with them. I don't know. Either way he was alleged to have said that heuse d this. And he is also alleged to have said he threw the hammer overboard immediately after the attack, which wouldmake sense as to why police never found a murder weapon during the course of their investigation. Now, according tomedium.com, his motive was supposedly very vague, b ut it was suggested the motive was maybe robbery and that hismental state had been impaired at t he time of the attack. He was angry about, you know, I guess not having been givenmoney while he was traveling from like his family or something. I don't know. It's, it was very vague because he neverreally said if he was responsible, never really said why he would have killed them. It wa s all kind of like, oh, well maybe, oh, well I wasn't in my right mind. Maybe I like, you know, ver y vague. Or then he allegedly reveled in playing the heroby administering first aid and inserting himself into the investigation. As we talked about this is all stuff he allegedly toldthe police like, I wanted to be the hero, you know, everyone was looking at me like, you tried to save them, you know, you're a hero kind of thing. Which, you know, we've heard about killers and starting thems elves into investigations or youhave those, I don't know what it's called, but like you'll, you'll hav e like a, a crooked firefighter set fire so he can go in andsave the people in the house that he has s et fire. Like, you know what I mean? So kind of like that kind of thing. Eitherway the police repo

rtedly said that Herman said that he would like to tell Bettina that she no longer had to be afraid. Hesaid that quote, the woman can be told that the police talked to the right man today. Police als o said, he said that he daredto say this because the police would never be able to prove him as the perpetrator. He didn't want to directly admit that hekilled cla shekel and that he tried to kill Betti na taxis because he considered that his statement was n now was enough totell who the perpetrat or was to rough translation. But basically he's saying, oh, I'm talking now because you guys reall ydon't have any proof. The police were not ignorant to the fact that the lack of Herman's legal rep resentation at the time of his alleged confession was a problem. And in 2019 they attempted to int erview him again, but Herman refused. They arrested him anyway, I get why, but it wasn't really a smart thing to do because you can't just accuse someone of murderwithout any real proof. Accor ding to B B C, in May of 2021, Herman goes to trial with the prosecution moving for lifeimpriso nment. But the prosecution had a lot of problems with their case. One being that Harmon's ex-wi fe refused totestify and she was one of the key witnesses. I totally understand why she refused to testify.

Either way the pr osecution tried to argue that he had knowledge ofthe murder weapon, but the judge said basically the murder weapon was never found. So you can't say he had details ofthe crime that the police never released because no one knows what the murder weapon is. Seems a little loophole to me, but like I get it. Unfortunately, I understand that because he could have said the murder weapon was a baseball bat, youknow what I mean? And they would have no proof whether or not that was true because,
