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## INTRODUCTION (Times New Roman, 11pt, Bold, Capital)

The introduction is presented in an integrated manner, without subtitles, in the form of paragraphs of 15-20% of the length of the article, containing Background or research rationale, theoretical foundation (brief literature review), formulation of research objectives. The introduction, without subtitles, contains the background of the problem, a brief literature review, and the problem and research objectives. It should be written in Times New Roman, 11 pt, with 1 (one) space between lines. Each paragraph begins with a word that protrudes 1 (one) tab from the left edge of each column.

## METHOD

Methods used are described in detail, with references provided for unusual methods. Includes the research design or design used, research objectives, data collection techniques, and tools describing data analysis techniques.

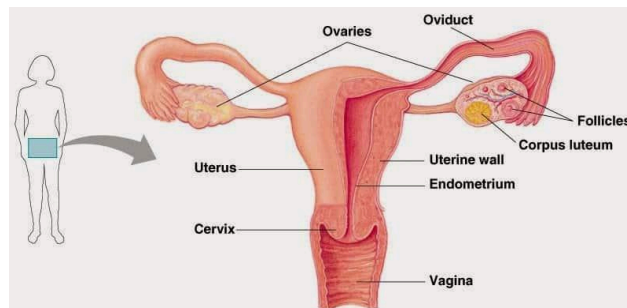
## RESULT

Results may be presented in the form of graphs, charts/figures or tables, typed 1 space, size 10. Numbers should follow the order in which they are mentioned in the text. The maximum number of tables is 6. All non-standard abbreviations are explained in footnotes. Numbering can be in the format A. 1. a. 1). a) etc.

## REFERENCES

The bibliography should be written in APA (American Psychological Association) style, typed 1 space, size 11. All references referred to in the text of the article must be listed in the bibliography. The bibliography must include references from primary sources (scientific journals 80% of the total bibliography) published within the last 10 (ten) years.

Each article contains a minimum of 20 (twenty) references. Write a reference system in the text of the article and write a bibliography. References from scientific journal articles must include the DOI.

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
