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# JUSTICE RESTREPOMU ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

Washington D.C. --- Justice RestrepoMU, a Liberal member of the Court who authored key opinions on abortion access and executive power, announced that he intends to retire from the Supreme Court. His announcement is expected to set off a scramble within the new Presidential administration to replace him.

Restrepo is the longest serving justice currently on the Court, having been appointed prior to President Donald Trump's resignation in 2018. He served under two Chief Justices, and saw several Presidents come and go. As the court became increasingly Conservative under President Gunnz, he went from a middle of the road to a reliably left wing vote. The Court, which currently has a 4-3 conservative majority, recently issued their first ideologically split decision, with Junior Justice Ibney writing the majority opinion in the so-called NRA cases. Justice Restrepo, joined by the two other Liberal Justices, wrote a concurrence. The decision was speculated to herald a new era of divided jurisprudence on the Court. His replacement is

expected to be as, if not more, liberal than him, and will therefore likely not alter the makeup of the Court dramatically.

Restrepo announced in a statement that he would retire on July 15th, or upon confirmation of a successor, whichever comes first. He is expected to immediately resume his position on the mACLU Board of Directors. There are also rumors that he might be in line for a position with the newly inaugurated Zero administration. The current front runners to replace Restrepo include Vice President Dewey Cheatem, current Supreme Court Clerk Shockular, and Lincoln State Supreme Court Chief Justice High-Priest-of-Helix.

Prior to being appointed to the Court, Restrepo was President of the mACLU and US Ambassador to the United Kingdom. He was perhaps best known for his opinions strengthening abortion rights nationally. There are a number of cases currently before the Court. Justice Restrepo signaled his intention to remain an active Justice up until his retirement.
