Hearing Each Other's Experiences

Thank you to the folks who answered my request for them to share today! These individuals aren't experts - they have as many questions as you do, so will focus on sharing their experience, as of today, from their respective sites.

Abbey Palmer- Michigan State University Extension, Chatham, MI

- 1200 student visitors per year. 20 days of programming per year.
- Major Adaptation: We're closed. We've postponed our spring tours, opened additional dates. Giving myself permission to not know, and tell people, "I don't know!"
- Seed library inventory has gone online. Seed orders can be packed and picked up curbside! Not accepting returns of seeds, but yes, still distributing them at this time.
- Michigan schools are closed through April 6. Interested in speaking with teacher friends at this time about whether Abbey could be incorporated into their plans
- Resources: University of Florida Extension has great one-pagers Food safety, food banks, farmers' markets, community gardens.
- National young Farmers Coalition covid-19 response
- National Young Farmers Coalition survey (Economic side as well as the emotional side
- Other favorite resource was that I was looking forward to this community check-in!
- Some friends are having "happy hour": one hour per week to get together and zoom. A time to chat, get together to work together / be together...
- Communicating a lot right now at the farm through signage on doors and gates of the farm. In emails, as well, trying to be encouraging to people

George Conklin - Shelburne Farms, Shelburne, VT

Shelburne Farms - We're an education organization, but also a dairy, cheesemaking operation, inn, restaurant, market garden, children's farmyard, store, and maple sugaring. We're definitely feeling the impact, though our farming operations are continuing at this time.

• Our biggest adaptation - not hiring seasonal staff! Just got the word that we won't be hiring the staff we had interviewed and offered positions to for the Children's Farmyard

- Another adaptation protecting the vital activities at the Farm, to make sure we can come out of
 this at the other end. We've closed visitation to any of the farm production areas to keep those
 farmers safe.
- Innovative Resources:
 - There's a flood of videos around connecting people to the farm virtually. Trying to be as inviting and engaging.
 - The resources have been overwhelming so it's time to look at what others are doing, and help us whittle down the ideas of what we as Shelburne Farms can do really WELL, and be intentional about that, rather than throw out programming that others are already doing well.
- Walking trails have remained open. Being open is important being a place of joy and relaxation is critical right now. We're using signage to tell people where they can't go, and will need to be adding more
- We've made offers to our seasonal farmyard educators two weeks ago, so we will be in touch with them today, keeping kindness and warmth at the forefront of our communications as with them as we tell them this hard news.

Jocelyn Tidwell - New Haven Land Trust, New Haven, CT

- Urban site manages 50 community garden spaces and nature preserve
- In CT, we're down to no gatherings over 10 people. Grocery stores and pharmacies are still open.
- We're triaging since we're on the leading edge of these closures.
- We're recognizing the benefit we have of all this open space, and want to offer that to manage people's physical conditions and emotional conditions that will be supported outdoor time
- Our main priority is making sure that the spaces that we have have equitable access! All people need access to it.
- Whatever we're offering, we're limiting the maximum number of people on the properties to 5 people (1/3 of an acre). We can keep people in different quadrants of the gardens.. For the community gardens and urban farms we're asking how is it possible to do community gardening? We are seeing a pathway forward to help people continue to be the space.
 - o If you're the first person to arrive, opening all the doors then sanitizing, then using gardening gloves, and spraying down any tools you touch. Also maintaining social distancing while you're in the garden.
 - One thing we've thought of is to create videos for solo work. Possibly using Facebook live and putting them on shared drive at work.
 - We have a lot of high school staff, people who are paid 3-5 hours per week. If we shut that down families will really strain. And we want to find ways for folks to continue to...

Melanie Douty Snipes - Snipes Farm, Morrisville, PA

- Melanie is the Director of Education, Melanie and Jonathan Snipes Director of the organization
- We have three seasons of field trips, gardens, CSA and farmers market, summer camp, events.
- Bizarre summed up in a word...

- Adaptations: we've been part of a farm market every two weeks in the winter. In May it becomes
 every week. Our Farm Market will be open and outside starting in May. Vendors will be using
 gloves, food will all be pre-packaged. Other standards expected to be shared.
- All our spring educational programming so far is cancelled or suspended. We had received three grants to fund that. But hoping to provide a lot of that programming in the fall, hoping funders will extend funding
- How we're communicating with the public: summer camp is our biggest concern. The ACA has been fantastic. <u>The CEO put out a poignant letter.</u> Camp community is a resilient one. Kids come to camp unwell/with communicable disease every year, we see disease. The letter they provided was really inspiring.
- Registrations for Camp came to a screeching halt in early March
- Still planning to interview camp counselors at this time.
- Bleaching everything... trying to be as absolutely safe as we can
- There are a number of loans available right now, maybe they will turn to be grants. Important to look to your county economic development corporation.
- Overall, yes, we're worried about payroll and keeping people employed.
- An inspiration that could come: I hope our roles as food producers and farm-based educators
 can be so much clearer through this. People may begin seeing local food as the best source of
 food. This could be an opportunity for small farms.
- CSA registrations are continuing to come in.

Jesse Pyles / Jamie Lombardo - Smokey House Center, Danby, VT

- Jamie leads all community farm activities!
- Jesse Director of Smokey House, a 5,000 acre protected landscape and community farm
- Community Farm Project to grow food with and for the community is our pillar activity
- Considering the ways to be more controlled in the environment and how we can go out into the community - volunteer groups and through the schools and provision of the food will need to change.
- Adaptations: Because we have relied so heavily on the school groups, we're discussing how we can get this food grown in the same capacity. Do we have the opportunity to staff up, or are there other practices we might need to think about. Using more plastic, for example.
- Innovation Farmers in our very rural community are embracing new market channels. Farm stands, under utilized farm stands are getting heavy use, which is exciting to see
