- ☐ Benefits of Job-Embedded Collaborative Time
  - □ What is Job-embedded professional development (JEPD)? JEPD refers to teacher learning that is grounded in day-to-day teaching practice and is designed to enhance teachers' content-specific instructional practices with the intent of improving student learning (Darling-Hammond & McLaughlin, 1995; Hirsh, 2009). It is primarily school or classroom based and is integrated into the workday, consisting of teachers assessing and finding solutions for authentic and immediate problems of practice as part of a cycle of continuous improvement (Hawley & Valli, 1999; National Staff Development Council, 2010).
  - ☐ JEPD is a shared, ongoing process that is locally rooted and makes a direct connection between learning and application in daily practice, thereby requiring active teacher involvement in cooperative, inquiry-based work (Hawley & Valli, 1999). High-quality JEPD also is aligned with state standards for student academic achievement and any related local educational agency and school improvement goals (Hirsh, 2009).
  - ☐ In JEPD, teachers primarily draw from the professional knowledge that exists in their own school and among their colleagues (Wei et al., 2009), which is informed by other professional development opportunities that help teachers learn research-based practices (Killion & Roy, 2009; Lieberman, 2000). JEPD may consist of departmental, cross-departmental, grade-level, or "vertical" (i.e., across grade levels) teams of teachers engaging in "interactive, integrative, practical, and results-oriented" work (Fogarty & Pete, 2009, p. 32).
  - Powerful and practical connections also can be made between district and school improvement plans and JEPD, resulting in greater coherence across the system.

There is also evidence that certain programs are not effective.<sup>6</sup> Onetime programs, such as assemblies, do not provide enough exposure to the messages of suicide prevention, nor do they allow monitoring of student reactions. Programs that use media depictions of suicidal behaviors or speeches by young people or adults who have made suicide attempts should not be used, as they could have modeling effects for at-risk youth.
