ABOUT HIGHLAND PARK ELEMENTARY

Highland Park Elementary is a designated International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme (PYP) school for grades Pre-K to 5. Our students learn to think and act globally as they explore complex issues, take action to solve problems and reflect on what they've learned.

We offer specialized coursework in Spanish, art, physical education, science, and music; we challenge students to explore science by asking questions and exploring problems. We also provide artist-in-residence programs to inspire students in the visual and performing arts. Other learning activities include EDL, Lego League, Girls on the Run, spelling bee, Math Masters, and special-interest teams and clubs. Our entire school staff takes pride in promoting the success of each student, and provides all students with opportunities to see themselves as members of a local, national, and global community.

Initially authorized in 2003, we were the first school in the Midwest to be designated as a Primary Years Programme School by the prestigious International Baccalaureate organization. This year we are proud to celebrate our 21st year of programme implementation, and we are extremely proud of how far we have come in the past 21 years. Being an IB school means that our students think globally as they ask questions (inquire), explore issues hands-on, and take action to solve problems. Also important to the Primary Years Programme is the learner profile. We embed the learner profile into the curriculum and the school climate. Students are encouraged to exemplify the learner profile and attitudes on a daily basis in order to become open-minded global citizens.

The small size of our school makes room for lots of personal attention, and we take warm interest and pride in our students.

Big-World Focus with Small-School Attention

We're a school of approximately 400 students, located in the beautiful Highland Park neighborhood of St. Paul. As a St. Paul magnet school for areas D and F, we welcome all our students and love our diverse community of learners. The size of our school allows us to give students true personal attention while bringing a global perspective to education with the IB-PYP curriculum.

IB FDUCATION

At Highland Park Elementary IB World School, we organize our teaching and learning around six global themes that incorporate all the different subject areas, the Minnesota State Standards, and the St. Paul Schools scope and sequence.

We create units of inquiry that explore big ideas and concepts that are relevant and global. The students learn and acquire knowledge by asking questions, observing, investigating, and researching.

These Learner Profile attributes are the heart of our PYP program. Each attribute is specifically taught, practiced and acknowledged.

Students ask lots of questions at HPE. The teachers help students organize their questions with the key concepts. Because of this, our units of inquiry look somewhat different from year to year, because the lessons and learning are driven by students' questions, background knowledge, and interests.

Another difference you will notice about Highland Park is not only students asking questions, observing and inquiry skills, but also our emphasis on students showing action. This is a way for students to communicate their learning. It can be as small as bringing something in from home that relates to what they are learning in class, or something a bit larger, like connecting with a local or global cause that is relevant to the students and coming up with a plan to make a difference. We have had students share interests and hobbies, students put up posters and bulletin boards to raise awareness of topics, students have organized fundraisers for organizations that they are passionate about, and many students have researched intriguing questions, and then shared their new knowledge and findings with others.

It is exciting to have grade-level traditions for students to look forward to, like every year, the second graders make an edible landfill, but it is also fun to discover new knowledge differently than the students of the past. It gives our families with multiple children opportunities to share their learning and new experiences while reminiscing about activities from the past.

HPE has a strong history of students being immersed in engaging and relevant learning experiences.



FINDING SUCCESS AT HPE

At Highland Park Elementary, we believe that being a learner means being safe, being respectful, being responsible, and being focused on learning.

As an IB-PYP school, we work to create essential agreements to support these ends. With our students, we have conversations about our values and explore how those values look in action. From there, we teach and reteach expectations, connecting often with our values and our shared commitment to ourselves.



POSITIVE SCHOOL CULTURE



Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is an educational, preventative, and restorative approach to behavior. This approach helps schools create and sustain effective and culturally-inclusive environments that support academic and social success for all students. All Saint Paul Public Schools use PBIS to teach schoolwide expectations to all students and recognize students who meet those expectations. Small group and individualized supports are also provided in this approach.

- Highland Park Elementary creates clear and consistent expectations school wide and in the classroom to promote positive behavior. These expectations, which reflect our community and culture are defined, taught, modeled, reinforced, and (when necessary) retaught).
- Highland Park Elementary works to identify students in need of additional support and match them to the appropriate level of intervention and support.
- Highland Park Elementary aims to be a positive and equitable place behaviorally, socially, and academically.



Social-Emotional Learning

Social and Emotional Learning is how we learn to manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. At Highland Park Elementary, we support and promote social-emotional learning.



Mental Health and Wellness

Mental Health and Wellness refers to the continuum of emotional supports available to students and staff. These supports strive to create a safe learning environment, maximize collaboration between students and adults, provide students with choices, create trusting relationships, and empower students to do their best.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING

Arrival and Dismissal

School hours are 7:30 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. Students will not be allowed to enter the building before 7:15 a.m. Because there is no supervision either inside or outside the building prior to 7:15 a.m., students should not be on school grounds unsupervised. All students must be picked up no later than 2:15 p.m. on Saunders Ave. We invite families to walk their students to the door, but we ask that students work with staff and themselves to get from the entry to their classroom.

Attendance

School attendance is a proven factor of academic success. Saint Paul Public Schools has an attendance policy that will be strictly adhered to by Highland Park. A student who is not in his/her classroom by 7:30 is tardy. Any student who arrives at school after the 7:30 bell must report to the office for an admit pass. If your child is tardy or absent, you must call the school or send a note with your child regarding the reason for tardiness or absence. If we do not receive a call or a note prior to the absence, your child will be marked unexcused.

After 3 unexcused absences, an alert letter will be sent home. Then after 2 more unexcused absences, you will receive a phone call from the school. If there is more than one additional unexcused absence, the family will be referred to the Family Truancy Intervention Program (FTIP) and then it is turned over to Ramsey County. To avoid these consequences, please call the attendance line at 651-744-2583 and report the reason for the absence every time your child is absent from school.

Back-to-School Forms

iUpdate was the district's online family and student information database. It is now known as Back-to-School Forms. All families must fill out the information in the forms for each child in the family. <u>Back-to-School Forms</u> can be found online at https://www.spps.org/families/campus-parent-portal-onestop. If you do not know your username or password, please call the office at 651-293-8770.

Behavior Expectations

HPE teachers and principal have set expectations for student conduct that are in accordance with Saint Paul Public Schools rights and responsibilities. All students have a right to a safe learning environment, and we will strictly enforce safe behavior on the part of all students. All classrooms have Essential Agreements to which students collaboratively agree to adhere. Our goal is to have all students in class learning, and we will give students every opportunity to stay in class and return to class after a short break.

Breakfast

All students at Highland Park Elementary are entitled to a free breakfast. Breakfast is served from 7:15 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. every day. Students arriving late may get breakfast until 8:30 a.m.

Bus Behavior Expectations

Each transported student has the right to a safe and enjoyable ride to and from school that is free from intimidation, threat, or harassment. Good conduct of all transported students while waiting for the school bus and while traveling to and from school is primary to a safe and enjoyable ride for all students. Transportation is a privilege and not a right. Below are some of the bus behavior expectations we hold at Highland Park Elementary:

- Sit in your assigned seat, face forward with your back against the seat and feet directly in front of you.
- Remain seated until the bus stops at school or at your stop.
- Use a level 1 (quiet) voice
- Keep your hands, feet, and body to yourself
- Keep food and drink away while on the bus
- Respect the driver.

When a student is not riding safely and/or respectfully, the driver sends a behavior report directly to the principal. Each time the principal receives a behavior report there is a consequence. The consequences are outlined in the district's Rights and Responsibilities Handbook

(https://www.spps.org/rights_and_responsibilities), which is attached to this sheet for your reference. After three referrals, students will begin having their bus privileges suspended.

Calendars

As events are planned throughout the year, we will add them to our website's building calendar. Our weekly newsletter will also include information about upcoming events. Cell Phones

When possible, please support us in keeping cell phones at home. If you send your student to school with a cell phone, they will be asked to keep them away in their backpacks during the school day. Highland Park Elementary will not be responsible for items that are lost, broken, stolen, loaned, or traded. If your student is using their cell phone during the day, we may ask to meet with you and your student at our site to discuss a plan for staying engaged in learning.

Clothing and Dress

Students have the right to choose their manner of dress and personal grooming unless it presents a clear danger to the student's health or safety, causes an interference with school work or creates classroom or school disorder. Clothing should be comfortable and students should wear shoes in which they can easily walk

and run. Students will go out for recess unless the weather is very wet or severely cold. Warm coats, snow pants, gloves or mittens, hats and boots are a must in the winter. On days when students have physical education, court shoes are required. Clothing that is associated with guns, weapons, drugs, or alcohol is prohibited.

Communication

Communication between our school and families is crucial. We have several modes of communication that should keep you on top of everything related to Highland Park Elementary including a weekly newsletter through email, regular communication from your teachers, updated information on our website, and text messages and automated calls for urgent happenings. Please ensure that your information remains current by notifying our office (651-293-8770) if contact information changes and by completing Back-to-School Forms (https://www.spps.org/families/campus-parent-portal-onestop) annually.

Dismissal Procedures

Students are dismissed at 2:00 p.m. Students who are assigned to ride a bus are expected to ride their assigned bus on a daily basis. Unless we have documented notice from a guardian, students who ride the bus will be put on the bus at the end of the day. Students who walk will be assigned a patrol line and will meet the patrols at 2:00 every day unless we have documented notice from a guardian. The office will not be able to process changes to dismissal after 1:00 p.m. daily. Students must be picked up by 2:15 p.m. on Saunders Avenue.

Drop-Off and Pick-Up Sites

Drop-off and pick-up is on the South side of Saunders Avenue only. Do not drop off or pick up students on Rome Avenue, in the parking lots, or on the North side of Saunders. Rome Avenue is for buses only. All drop-off and pick-up traffic should drive up Saunders, heading East.

Discovery Club

Highland Park Elementary is a Discovery Club hub for SPPS. Discovery Club is a fee-based program that offers students academic, recreational, and cultural activities to support learning and social development before and after school. Students at Highland Park Elementary have access to after-school Discovery Club only, daily from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. To enroll or learn more, visit the SPPS Discovery Club webpage (www.spps.org/discoveryclub).

Extended Day Learning (EDL)

EDL provides enrichment opportunities for students in grades 3, 4, and 5 after school from 2:00 p.m. - 3:45 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays. To sign up for EDL, enter it in the <u>Back-to-School Forms</u> (https://www.spps.org/families/campus-parent-portal-onestop) or pick up a form in the office.

Emergency Information

It is very important that the school clerk has the most current information for how to contact families in an emergency. Please inform the secretary of any changes in phone numbers or addresses during the year.

Entrances to School

The main entrance on Saunders is the only one entrance to HPE during operating hours. Families and students must be buzzed in during school hours. During major school events and arrival and dismissal, the doors on Rome will be open.

Family Engagement Plan

Our Family Engagement Plan outlines our commitment to families during the year. It serves as a guide to help families navigate family involvement at HPE. A link to our Family Engagement Plan is on our website.

Family-School Compact for Achievement

A family-school compact for achievement is an agreement that parents, students, and teachers develop together. It explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all students get the individual support they need to reach and exceed grade-level standards. Links to our compacts are on the website.

Food Services

All families should fill out a form for educational benefits (free lunch) even if you do not believe you qualify. Breakfast and lunch will be free for all students this year.

Field Trips

We love parent chaperones and parents are always welcome to accompany their child and the class on a field trip. However, you must contact the teacher at least two days in advance to let them know that you plan on joining the class, so that the teacher can plan accordingly. All students must have field trip permission included in the Back-to-School Forms (https://www.spps.org/families/campus-parent-portal-onestop).

Goodies and Treats

All classroom treats must be store bought and in the original packaging and individually wrapped. Avoid bringing cakes and other foods that need to be cut and served. Students are not allowed to have soda pop at school. Inform the teacher in advance to let him/her know when you will be bringing treats. Bring all treats to the office and they will be delivered to the classroom.

Health Services and Medication

Families of students who need to have medication administered during the school day must speak with the nurse and fill out the appropriate forms. Students may not take prescription or over-the-counter medications on their own, and may not carry them or store them in a desk or locker. All medications must be labeled and be kept in the nurse's office. The nurse's direct phone number is 651-888-7632.

Homework Policy

Teachers will communicate their homework policies to parents, and homework assignments for students in grades 1-5 are written in the student's planner or in homework folders. We always suggest a minimum of 20 minutes of reading, either independently or with a parent, per night regardless of grade.

Illness

Let's help everyone stay healthy! Please keep your child home with the following conditions:

- Fever
- Vomiting/diarrhea
- Strep throat
- Other contagious diseases

Students must be free of symptoms or be on antibiotics for at least 24 hours before returning to school.

Interpreters

If you need an interpreter for family conferences or any other reason related to your child's education, please let us know and we will arrange for one.

Leaving School Early

If a student needs to leave school early for any reason, a guardian must notify the school of the need to leave early. Upon arrival, the parent or guardian must come directly to the office to notify the clerk and sign the student out. The clerk will call the student's classroom and ask that the student be sent to the office. Do not go directly to the classroom to pick up a child. Please notify the office no later than one hour before dismissal.

Library Books

The library has a great selection of books for students in all grades. Kindergarten students are able to check out one book at a time for a week. Students in grades one through five can check out two books for a period of two weeks. Students will receive reminders about overdue books. Please help keep books clean and dry - no food or liquids near books. If a book is beyond repair or lost, the student and family are responsible for paying for the book. LibraryGO is an excellent option for checking out books this year. All students have LibraryGO accounts. You can sign up for LibraryGO in the back-to-school forms.

Lost and Found

The lost and found is located by the Rome Avenue bus doors near the gym. Please check the lost and found periodically for items that might belong to your child(ren). All items left in the lost and found are donated to Goodwill several times during the year. Please put your child's name on all outerwear, including sweatshirts and lunch boxes.

Parent's Right to Know Teacher and Paraprofessional Qualifications

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act, parents have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of their student's classroom teachers and paraprofessionals. Parents who would like to receive this information should write to the Human Resource Department, Attn: ESSA Teacher Qualifications, Saint Paul Public Schools, 360 Colborne Street, Saint Paul, MN 55102-3299. You have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teacher(s).

- Information about whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction;
- Information about whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived;
- Information about whether the teacher is teaching (subjects or content) in which proper certification is held by the teacher;
- Information about whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.

Parent-Teacher Association (PTA)

The PTA sponsors and supports events and activities throughout the year that enrich our students' lives, provide them with learning opportunities, artists-in-residence experiences, evening events, and fundraising. The PTA meets virtually monthly and is open to all parents. Free child care is provided for all in-person meetings. The dates are listed on the school calendar. Primary Years Programme (PYP)

Highland Park Elementary is an accredited IB International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (IB PYP) world school. Our Primary Years Programme focuses on the development of the whole child, in the classroom and in the world outside, and through other environments where children learn. It offers a framework that meets children's academic, social, physical, emotional, and cultural needs. It does so through the development and reinforcement of a set of student profiles and attitudes. At Highland Park Elementary, students are supported in becoming, caring, communicators, inquirers, knowledgeable, open-minded, principled, reflective, risk-takers, and thinkers.

Questions

If you have questions regarding any aspect of your child's education at Highland Park Elementary, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher. The best way to reach a teacher is by email. All Highland Park Elementary staff email addresses are listed on the website.

Safety and Security

For the safety of everyone in the school, all doors are locked during school hours. To gain entrance, use the main entrance on Saunders Avenue and push the button marked OFFICE during school hours, and DC during Discovery Club hours. When you hear the click, pull the door open. During major school events, the main doors will be open. During school hours, all visitors, including parents, must come directly to the office to sign in and get a visitor's badge. All visitors must sign out and return the badge when leaving.

School Continuous Improvement Plan (SCIP)

Our SCIP this year focuses on student climate and culture, attendance, math outcomes, and reading outcomes. A family-friendly copy of our plan can be found on our website.

School-Family Directory

The Highland Park Elementary PTA publishes a school directory with contact information for students by grade level. To be included in the directory, you must complete the Google form by the published due date. The link to the form will be emailed to families and included in November's school newsletter. Families should provide only the information they want published in the directory. If you do not want to have your information published in the directory, do not complete the form.

School Events

All families are encouraged to attend school events. The calendar of events is included on our website. If you need transportation to any of the events, please call the school at 293-8770 to arrange for cab service.

School Closing and Procedures

School will never have a delayed opening or close early due to weather. If school is going to be closed for the day due to weather, you will receive an automated call, email, and/or text from the district and information about digital learning for that day. Closings are also broadcast on the major local television stations and radio stations. If you do not see or hear that Saint Paul Public Schools are closed, then Highland Park Elementary will be in session.

School Patrol

The school patrol walks students within one-half mile of HPE along a small handful of different routes. Please let the principal know if your child will be walking to and from school. The patrol walks every day as long as the temperature is above zero. If the temperature is below zero, the school patrol will not be responsible for walking students.

Testing

The dates students will be taking the state-wide standardized tests in April and May 2024 will be published on our website as well as in the monthly newsletter. Please do not schedule vacations, doctor's appointments or anything that can be scheduled on alternate dates on testing dates. It is very important that all students complete the tests.

Technology Release

Technology release is included in the <u>Back-to-School Forms</u> (https://www.spps.org/families/campus-parent-portal-onestop). Please make sure your information in the forms is current.

Transportation

The transportation department does its best to have buses running on time, but on any given day, buses can be running late both in the morning and in the afternoon. Students should be at the bus stop 5 minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive in the morning. The transportation department requests that you wait 10 minutes after the normal pick-up time to call transportation. If the bus does not show up, call transportation at 651-696-9600 and they can tell you when the bus is due to arrive. Similarly, in the afternoon, if the bus does not show up at your stop at the scheduled time, and you have waited an additional 10 minutes, you can call transportation and get an update on when the bus will arrive at the stop. The MySPPSBus app also gives you bus alerts and an estimated time of arrival. If the bus does not arrive at the stop on time in the evening, do not leave the stop, because as soon as you do, the bus may arrive and drop off your child. Call transportation at 651-696-9600 and ask them for the time the bus will arrive at your stop.

Families who need transportation to attend family events and/or conferences at Highland Park Elementary can receive transportation by calling the school at 651-293-8770. The clerk or parent liaison will schedule taxi service for conferences or school events upon request.

Valuables and Money

Help support students in keeping valuables at home when possible. If students are bringing money to school for a specific reason, please put that money in a labeled envelope. Highland Park Elementary staff will not be responsible for money or valuables that are lost, damaged, stolen, traded, loaned, or spent.

Volunteer Opportunities

Volunteers are always welcome at HPE. We host many opportunities to be involved in various aspects of school life. These opportunities include providing tutoring, helping teachers in the classrooms, chaperoning field trips, and helping with PTA events and fundraisers. If you would like to volunteer, please email our family liaison or contact your student's teacher. All volunteers must be cleared through a background check process prior to work on site.

Visitors

We welcome visitors during the school day. All visitors must sign in and get a badge upon entering the school. Visitors must also sign out and return the badge when leaving. If you are planning to visit your child's classroom, arrange your visit in advance with the teacher to make sure it is an appropriate time (e.g., not testing, not on a field trip, etc.). We ask that you keep classroom visits to 30 minutes or less, unless arranged differently in advance. The purpose of classroom visits is to observe teaching and learning, and it is not a time for conferencing with the teacher.
